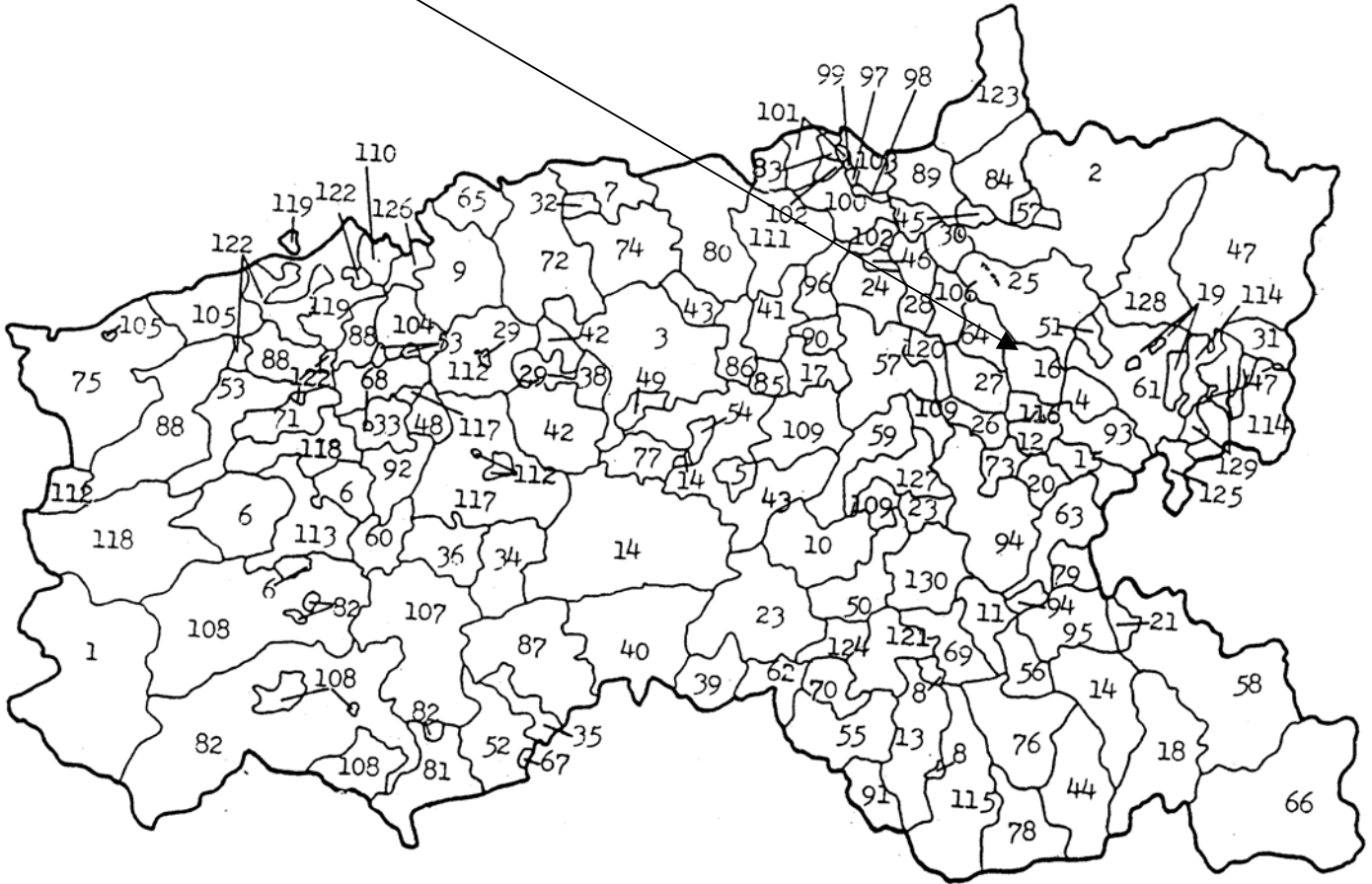

Situated about 8 miles S.E. of the City of Limerick. It is bounded E. by the Ph. of Agliscormick; N. by Caherconlish; W. by Inch St. Laurence and Caherelly; and S by Rathjordan.

This parish is about 3 miles long and 2 broad, with a flat surface. The principal road is that leading N. by S. through the centre of it from Caherconlish to Herbertstown, etc.

Ballybrood Td. (contd.)

Situated in the E. end of the Ph. of Ballybrood, and is bounded on the E. by Caherconlish Ph.; W. by Ballyhobin Td.; N. by the tds. of Rockfarm and Caherline; and S. by Mountminnett Td.

This td. contains 358 acres which are arable without limestone. Soil partly light & some rocky, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Saml. Maunsell, Esq. of same, has it let to 23 tenants, 8 with leases of 3 lives or 31 years at £3 to £2 per acre, and in farms of 30 to 2½ acres. Co. Cess generally 1/2 to 1/8 per acre half yearly and tithe 2s. to 1s. per acre. Bog used for fuel is very scarce. In this td. is a Police Barrack and also quarterly fairs. The prevailing name is "Connolly".

This td. contains 265 acres which are arable, partly deep and wet without limestone, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor William H. Gabbett Esq. has it let at will to 9 tenants in farms of 40 to 9 acres at £3 5s. to £2 10s. per acre. Tithe included. Co. Cess generally 1/2 to 1/8 per acre half yearly. Bog used for fuel is in abundance. The prevailing name is "Ryan".

Situated in the N. end of the parish. Bounded on the E. by Caherconlish Ph.; W. by Doonvullen Lr.; N. by Inch St

Caherline (contd.)

Contains 354 acres of which about  $\frac{1}{3}$  is bog; the rest arable with some limestone. Soil partly deep & wet, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Mr. Gabbett has it let to 8 tenants, 4 with leases with 3 lives and all at £3 15s. to £1 10s. per acre in farms of 90 to 5 acres. Co. Cess generally  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{1}{8}$  per acre half yearly and tithe included in the rent. Bog used for fuel is in abundance. The Prevailing Name is Connolly.

Situated in the W. end of the parish, and is bounded on the E. by the td. of Caherline; W. and N. by Inch St. Laurence Ph.; and S. by Doonvullen Up. Td. Bishop Land.

Contains 256 acres which are arable. Soil chiefly deep and wet without limestone, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor, Archbishop of Cashel, has it let at 10s. per acre to William Gabbett Esq., and he again to 8 others at £2 12s. per acre. Co. Cess generally  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{1}{8}$  per acre half yearly, and tithe  $\frac{1}{6}$  per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce. The prevailing names are Keoghs and Hays.

Situated in the W. end of the parish and is bounded on the E. by Ballyhobin Td.; W. by Caherelly Ph.; S. by Rath-jordan Ph.; and N. by the Td. of Doonvullen Lower.

Contains 350 acres which are arable. Soil partly deep and wet without limestone, and producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor the Archbishop of Cashel has it let to Wm. Gabbett and Timy. O'Brien, Esqrs. at 10s. per acre, and they again to 8 others at £2 to £2 10s. per acre. Co. Cess generally  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{1}{8}$  per acre half yearly, and tithe  $\frac{1}{6}$  per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce. The prevailing name is "Keogh".

Situated in the S. end of the parish and bounded on the E. by Mountminnett Td., and S., W., and N. by the townland of Tantore.

Contains 42 acres which are arable. Soil partly deep without limestone. The proprietor is the Revd. George Madder, in whose occupation it is. The Glebe House, which is situated near the centre thereof, was built in 1816 by the proprietor at the expense of £600 by himself besides £1,500 from the Board of First Fruits. It is a handsome edifice placed on rising ground and 3 story high.

Contains 195 acres which are arable. Soil partly gravelly, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors Wm. & Thos. Gabbett, Esqrs., have it let to tenants by leases of 3 lives at £2 to £2 5s. per acre. Co. Cess generally 1/2 to 1/8 per acre half yearly, and Tithe 2s. per do. Bog used for fuel is in abundance.

Contains 286 acres which are arable. Soil partly deep without limestone, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor General Bourke has it let to Wm. Gabbett, Esq.

Contains 60 acres which are arable. Soil partly deep with some limestone, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Wm. H. Gabbett, Esq., has it let to one tenant by a lease of one life at £3 per acre. Co. Cess generally 1s. to 1s.8d. per acre half yearly. Tithe 2s. to 1s. per do. Bog used for fuel is in abundance.

Situated in the S. end of the parish, and bounded on the E. by Mountminnett Td.; W. by Ballyhobin Td.; N. by Ballybrood Td.; and S. by Mountminnett Td.

Contains 185 acres which are arable. Soil partly light with some limestone, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Wm. Henry Gabbett, Esq., has it let at will to 7 tenants in farms of 56 to 2 acres. Co. Cess generally 1/2 to 1/8 per acre half-yearly, and Tithe 2s. per acre in-

cluded in the rent. Bog used for fuel is in plenty.

Ballybrood Church -- Inhabitants 12

Situated in the centre of Ballybrood Td. and W. of the road leading through same.

This church was built in 1807 at the expense of £500 from the Board of First Fruits. It is capable of containing 400 persons.

Ballyvourneen Chapel -- Inhabitants 13

Situated in the N. point of Rockfarm Td.

This chapel was built in 1838-9 at the expense of about £800 now expended, and it is yet in an unfinished state. It is expected that it will, when complete, have cost £1,500. It is a strong and handsome building, and is capable of containing about 1,100 persons.

This house was built some time prior to 1760. It is 3 story high, and is at present (1839) the seat of Mr. Saml. Maunsell.

Situated in the W. end of the parish, and is the boundary between same and the parishes of Inch St. Laurence and Caherelly.

Is the name of a ditch, the boundary of the parish, extending upwards of 3 miles and forming a kind of passage for the peasantry. It is about 6 yards wide and extends along a flat valley, for the most part a tract of black earth, from which it probably derived its name.

End of the Parish of Ballybrood
