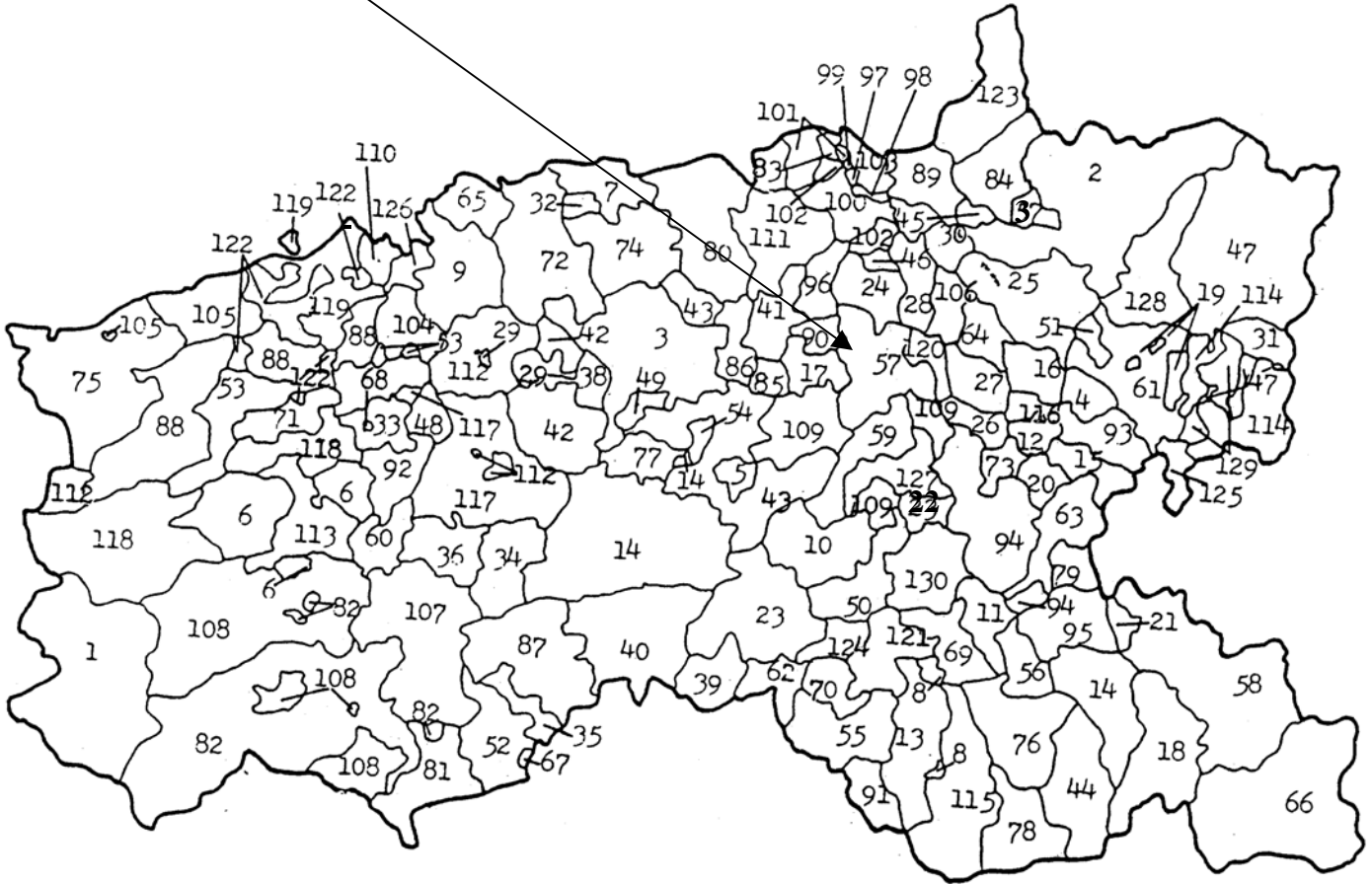

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This parish is situated in the N.W. of the County of Limerick. This, the Small County section, contains 5,837 statute acres. The village of Fedamore is in this section.

Fedamore Ph. (contd.)

It is a vicarage in the Diocese of Limerick, valued in the King's Books at £5 1s. 6d. The greatest length of the portion of the parish in the Bary. of Small County from North Friarstown in the N. to Cloghnamanagh in the S. is $4\frac{3}{4}$ st. miles; and its greatest width from Skool td. in the E. to Kilcaskin td. in the W. is $2\frac{1}{2}$ st. miles.

This townland is situated in the S. of the parish, $476\frac{1}{2}$ acres. It is traversed by roads in various directions.

It is the property of Col. Wyndham, Petworth, London. Agent, Thomas Crowe, Esq., Ennis, Co. Clare. It is let to 28 tenants at will; rent from £1 7s. to £6 per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly from 2s. to 3s.5d. Tithe per acre from 3s.9d. to 4s.6d. Size of farms from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 44 acres. Soil, good arable land, producing wheat, oats & potatoes. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names - Bennett and Hannon. There is a school here, containing 60 boys and 40 girls, all Roman Catholics. It was established in 1810. The teacher is paid by the pupils at the following rates:- Spelling 1s.6d., Reading and Writing 2s.6d., Arithmetic 3s., Grammar 6s, and Geometry 7s.6d. The River Camogue waters this td., and over it is a bridge of 5 arches, called Glenogra Br. It was built in 1754, the Revd. Richard Steers being overseer.

In this td. is part of Fedamore Village, containing 2 publicans, 2 shoe-makers, 2 smiths, 5 hucksters and 2 carpenters. There is a R. C. Chapel capable of accomodating 2,000 persons, erected in 1830 at the expense of the parishoners. There are 5 forts in the td., one of which is called Rathnagreine. There is a spring well, called Tobar Rath na Greine. There is also a remarkable stone, called Gearaun Baun, about 7 feet high, 4 feet broad, and 1 foot thick; it is almost perpendicular. There is a police station here, consisting of 1 sergeant

and 3 subconstables. A Dispensary is open on Tuesdays & Fridays. It was established in 1834, and is supported by voluntary subscriptions and a County presentment.

There is a school here, containing 40 boys and 30 girls, all Roman Catholics. It was established in 1832. The teacher is paid by the pupils; rate per quarter - spelling 1s., reading and writing 1s.6d., arithmetic 2s.6d. There is one fert in this townland.

Agent to Charles Pearson, Captain Sayers, Limerick. Co. Cess per acre yearly from 2s. to 3s.4d. Tithe per acre, 2s.6d. to 3s.4d. Size of farms from 2 to 50 acres. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. There is a school here, containing 30 boys and 20 girls, all Roman Catholics; quarterly rates, 1s.4d. to 2s.6d. and 5s. according to subjects. There is a burial-ground here, called Fanningstown Church, and adjoining it are the ruins of a building, called Doon.

Tithe per acre, 2s.9d. to 4s.6d. Size of farms, from 4 to 19½ acres. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel plenty. Prevailing Names - Mangle and Byrne. The River Camogue waters this townland. St. John's Holy Well is situated here. There is a Protestant Church here, built in 1740, capable of accomodating 40 persons. There is a burial ground annexed. Part of the village of Fedamore is situated here, in which are 1 cooper and 1 publican.

Situated in the north extremity of the parish, and contains 314½ acres.

The property of the Revd. Richard Maunsell, Drehidtrasna, Adare, who lets to Vere Hunt, Esq., Friarstown, on a lease of lives renewable for ever, at a rent of £104 2s. 5d., including quit rent. Mr. Hunt occupies a part himself, and sublets the remainder to 15 tenants, 14 of whom have leases of 3 lives, and one is a tenant at will; rent per acre from 18s. 5d. to £2 15s. 4d. Co. Cess per acre yearly, from 2s.2d. to 12s. 2d. Tithe, £2 11s. 5d. per acre. Size of farms - from ½ acre to 106 acres. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. The ruins of Friarstown Abbey stand here. It was formerly a place of interment for Roman Catholics, but it is now entirely abandoned. Fuel is plenty in this td. Prevailing Names - Hunt and O'Brien. There are 14 forts here, of which many curious legends are told. One of them is called Rathnagreine. There was a large stone found here, which is yet on the premises. It is 7 feet high, 5 feet

broad, and one foot thick, supported by small stones which stood on the edges. When these were removed, human bones of an extraordinary size were found underneath. Friarstown House, the residence of Vere Hunt, Esq., is situated here. It is two stories high, and has annexed to it a good range of offices built by the present occupier in 1816.

According to local tradition, the name of this townland is derived from SCEOLAN, a judge who reigned in Skule Castle.

This townland is situated in the south-east of the parish, and contains 293 acres.

It is the property of Henry O'Grady, Esq., Grange. A portion is let to a man named Wheelan, at a rent of £2 10s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly from 3s. to 3s.6d. Tithe per acre 2s. to 2s.6d. Soil loamy, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel scarce. The River Camogue waters this townland.

The ruins of Skool Castle stand here. It was besieged and taken by Cromwell (?) and conferred on Hugh Ingoolsby Massy as a reward for his services. From Massy it passed to the present proprietor. Others say that it was built by the Geraldine family.

It is the property of Henry O'Grady, Esq., who occupies the townland. Co. Cess per acre yearly from 3s.6d. to 4s. Tithe, 2s.9d. to 4s.6d. per acre. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. There is a school here, established in 1827. It contains 80 boys and 72 girls, 151 of whom are Catholics and 1 Protestant. The school is in connection with the London Hibernian Society and is patronised by H. O'Grady, Esq., and some of the pupils pay at the following rates:- spelling, 1s.6d.; reading and writing, 2s.; arithmetic, 2s.6d.; Grammar, 4s.; all per quarter. There is one fort here.

Situated in the td. of Cloghadooloorty Sth.

This is a fort at the east boundary of the townland.

Others affirm that it was built by the Geraldines. Only part of the walls is standing. The south wall is still 22 feet high, and the north wall is 10 feet.

 This Chapel consists of a nave, transept and sanctuary. It was built in 1830 at the expense of the parishioners, and is capable of accomodating 2,000 (?) persons.
- Kilcaeskin (burial-ground) -- Local 36

 Situated in the townland of Kilcaskin.
 This is a small burial ground about the centre of the townland, but latterly there have been no burials in it. There is a large ash tree growing on the west side, which is visible from a great distance away.

 Situated in the south boundary of the parish.

- Sixmile Bridge -- Local 38

- Glenogra Bridge -- Local 39

 This bridge was built over the River Comoge, on the line of road connecting Limerick and Bruff, in the year 1754. It consists of 5 arches, the centre one of which is about 13 feet above the water.
- Glebe House (of Castle- -- Revd. James Bennett 40
quarter)
 Situated in the Glebe of Castlequarter No. 1.
 This is the residence of the Revd. James Bennett, the present incumbent. It is 2 stories high and in good repair. There is a good set of offices annexed.
- Cloghanfar Bridge -- Local 41
 Clochá n na bhFear, the stepping-stones (in a ford) of the men. J. O'D.
 Cloghaun/na/var -- J. O'D.
 Situated at the junction of Friarstown North, in Fedamore parish, Bary. of Small County, Boherload, in Fedamore parish, Bary. of Clanwilliam, and Raheen, in the parish of Caheravalla.
 This is a small bridge built over a stream, which crosses the line of road connecting Limerick and Bruff.
- Fanningstown Cross -- Local 42
 -- J. O'D.
 Situated in the townland of Fanningstown.
 This Cross is the junction of 4 roads.
- Carnaun Rock -- Local 43
 Carnán, a heap.
 Carnaun Rock -- J. O'D.
 This is a large rock in the td. of Carnaun; but there seems to be nothing particular connected with it.
