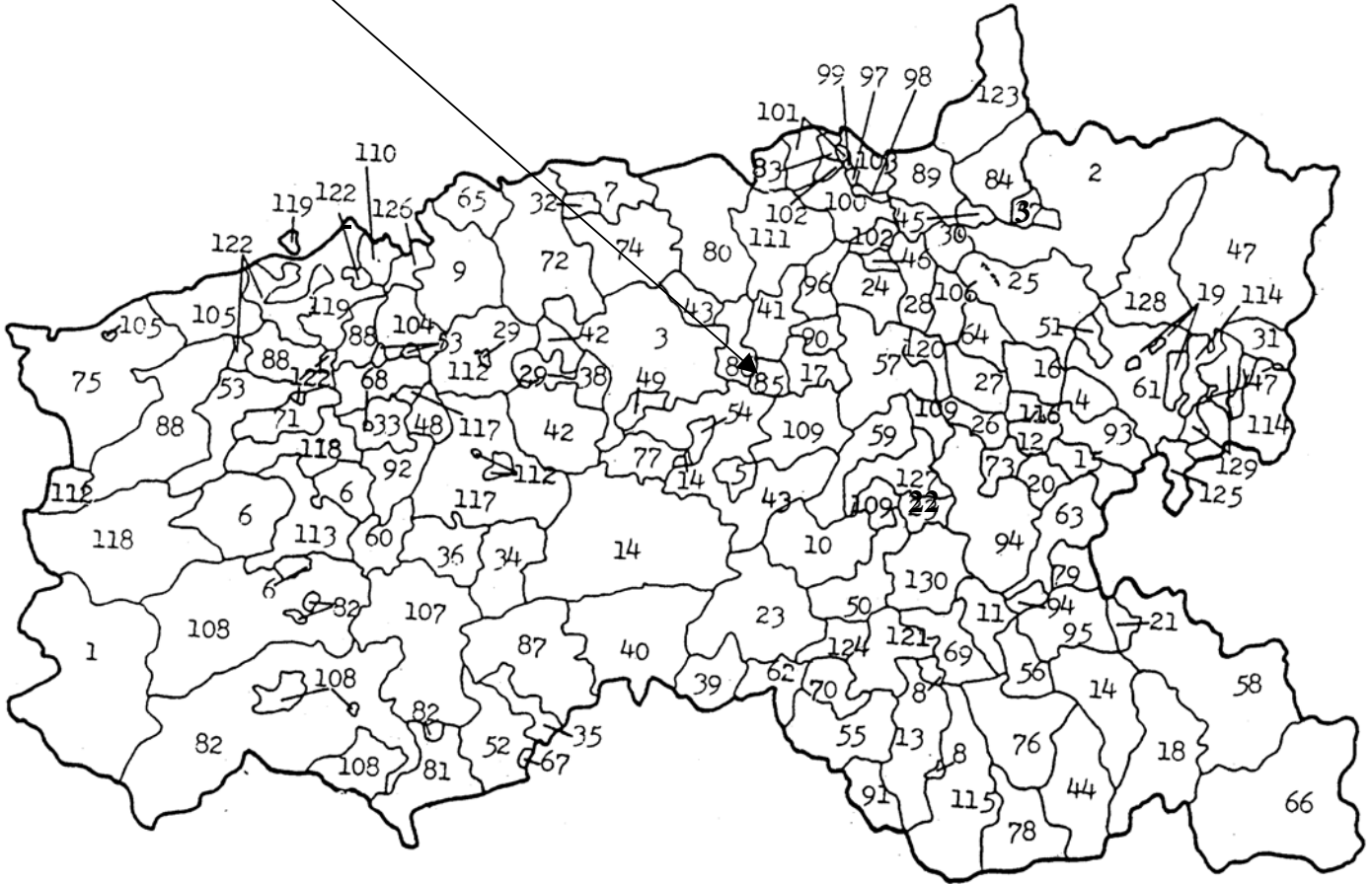

This parish is situated in the north portion of the County of Limerick, in the baronies of Coshma and Pubblebrien. Area of the Coshma section, 104 acres; of the Pubblebrien section, 754 acres. It is bounded on the N. by the parish of Crecora; S. by Croom Ph.; E. by Ballycahane Ph.; and W. by Killanahan Ph.

It is of rectangular form. Its greatest length from the td. of Killanahan in the North (at a point where a road crosses the Parish Boundary) to the td. of Killeenoghty in the South (at its junction with the tds. of

Killeenoghty Ph. (contd.)

Ballygriffin and Coologe (Croom Ph.) is $1\frac{1}{2}$ statute mile; and its breadth from Dromloughan North Td. in the East (at its junction with the tds. of Ballycahane Middle and Ballycahane Upper) to Fearoe Td. in the West (at the junction of Killanahan and Ballylusky Tds.) is one statute mile.

Situated in the S.W. of the parish, in the barony of Coshma. It contains 103 acres.

The property of Henry Hartropp, Esq., London. Agent, Sir David Roche, Caherass, Limerick. Middleman, Thos. Grady, who holds during his own life at a rent of from 16s. to 20s. per acre, and who sublets to 10 tenants during his own tenure at a rent of from 23s. to 40s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly 3s. to 3s.3d. Tithe per acre 20d. to 2s. Size of farms - 3 to 21 acres. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names: Fitzgerald and Griffin. There is one fort here.

Situated in the east of the parish, and in the barony of Pubblebrien. Contains 143 acres.

This townland is the property of Mr. Newenham, Cork. Agent, Mr. Newenham, Limerick. Let to 2 tenants on a lease of years at a rent of from 30s. to 40s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly from 2s. to 3s. Tithe per acre 20d. to 2s. Size of farms - from 50 to 60 acres. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names - Enright and McNamara. There are 4 forts here.

Situated in the S.E. of the parish, and in the barony of Pubblebrien. It contains 68 acres.

It is the property of Mr. Newenham, Cork, and is let through his agent to 3 tenants on a lease of years at a rent of £2 2s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly 2s.6d. to 3s. Tithe per acre 20d. to 2s. Soil heavy clay, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names: Bridgman.

Situated in the west of the parish, in the barony of Pubblebrien. It contains 146 acres.

The property of Henry Hartropp, Esq., London. Let through his agent to 7 tenants at will; rent per acre 20s. to 22s. Co. Cess per acre yearly 3s. to 3s.3d. Tithe per acre 20d. to 2s. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Size of farms - 5 to 20 acres. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names: Grady and Hall. There was a school established here 1st. March 1839, containing 45 boys and 30 girls, all Roman Catholics. The teacher is paid by the pupils.

Situated in the north of the parish, in the barony of Pubblebrien. Contains 197 acres.

The property of William Norris Lees, Esq., London. Agent, David Fitzgerald, Esq., Limerick. Middleman, Jeremiah O'Grady, who rents on a lease of lives and years at 24s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly 2s.6d. to 3s. Tithe withheld. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Size of farms - 50 acres. Fuel scarce.

Killannah (Contd.)

Prevailing Names: O'Grady. The house of Bettyville, the residence of the Middleman, was repaired in 1834. It is 1 story high and slated, with a suitable set of offices, a garden and some trees. There is one fort here.

Situated in the south of the parish, in the barony of Pubblebrien. Contains 200 acres.

The property of Mr. Newenham, Cork. Let per his agent to 3 tenants on a lease of years at a rent varying from 41s. to 46s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre yearly 2s.6d. to 3s. Tithe withheld. Soil argillaceous, producing wheat, oats and potatoes. Fuel scarce. Prevailing Names: Kilbride. The ruins of Killeenoghty church and burial-ground are situated in the south of this townland. There are two forts here.

Teampal na Sgeach is a local name, signifying 'the church of the white thorn bushes.' It received this name because several large white thorn bushes stand here.

Situated in the td. of Killeenoghty.

These ruins are about 46 feet long and about 20 feet broad. The walls are razed to the ground. There is a small graveyard around them.
