Situated about 10 miles S.E. of the City of Limerick, partly in the barony of Coonagh and partly in the barony of Small County. It is in two parts: - the first part is bounded on the N. by the Ph. of Aglishcormick, on the W. by Rath Jordan Ph., on the S. by Ballinard and Ballinlough Phs., and on the E. by Kilteely in Coonagh Bary.; the second part is bounded on the W. by the latter parish, N. by the same, S. by Ballinlough Ph., and E. by the County of Tipperary.

The first of these portions is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles long & 1 mile broad; and the second, which is nearly circular, is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles in diameter, and about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile E. of the first portion. There is a road leading through them from Emly to Herbertstown.

This townland contains 362 acres, arable, with lime-

stone in it. Soil is partly deep, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor John Massy, Esq. has it let by a lease for ever to Wm. Anderson, Esq., and he again to 20 tenants by leases ending in 1845, &c., at £2 14s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre half yearly generally 1s.4d. to 1s.8d. Tithe not paid since 1834. Bog used for fuel is in plenty. The prevailing names are Magrath and Horan.

This townland contains 225 acres, arable and without limestone. Soil deep, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Wm. Anderson, Esq. has it let to Jeremiah Scully, Esq. by a lease of 1 life at £1 5s. per acre, and the latter sublets to 7 tenants by leases ending in 1844, etc., at £2 16s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre half-yearly 1s.4d. to 1s.8d. Tithe not paid since 1836. Bog for fuel is very scarce.

This Glebe contains 1½ acres, which are arable. Built on some of it are 14 houses, which constitute part of the village of Kilteely. The proprietor the Revd. George Madders, Rector, has the houses let to 6 tenants by leases of 1 life at the gross sum of £20 per annum, Co. Cess and Tithe included, and these tenants sublet to the other 8 for the same tenure and at £4 to £2 per house.

Ryan, Esq. at £1 7s. per acre, and he again to 4 tenants at £3 per acre. Co. Cess per acre half yearly 1s.4d. to 1s.8d. Tithe 2s. per acre. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

This townland contains 555 acres, which are arable and without limestone. Soil light and gravelly, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor John Massy, Esq. has it let by a lease for ever at 4s.6d. per acre to Wm. Anderson, Esq., and the latter sublets to 6 tenants by leases ending in 1850 at £2 3s. per acre. One of these subtenants, James Scully, has has a lease of 1 life at £1 3s. per acre, has the remainder let to 17 tenants by leases ending in 1845 at £2 10s. to £1 10s. per acre, and in farms of 40 to 3½ acres, besides about 15 other poorer sort with ½ an acre. Co. Cess per acre half yearly 1s.7d. Tithe 3s. per acre. Bog for fuel is very scarce.

The proprietor Maurice Crosbie Moore, Esq., has it let at will to 4 tenants at £3 3s. per acre. Co. Cess per acre half yearly 1s.4d. to 1s.8d. Tithe 2s.4d. per acre. Bog used for fuel is in abundance.

This townland contains 525 acres, which are arable with limestone in it. Soil light, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor Lord Henry Walker has it let to Mr. John Synan, who has part of it in his own possession and the remainder let to 17 tenants by leases of 3 lives or 21 years at £3 to £2 10s. per acre.. and in farms of 22 to 12 acres, besides 19 others under them at will. This td. contains 751 acres, of which about 20 acres are rough and boggy ground, and the rest arable with some limestone in it. Soil partly light, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors the Governors of Schools etc. have it let to Michael Lloyd Apjohn, Esq., and he again to 37 tenants by leases ending in 1847 at £1 18s. to £2 15s. per acre, in farms of 38 to 3 acres. Co. Cess

This townland contains 253 acres, which are arable and without limestone. Soil very light and part gravelly, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors the Governors of Schools &c. have it let to Michael Lloyd Apjohn, Esq., and he again to 21 tenants by leases ed ending in 1847 at £1 175. per acre, tithe included. Co. Cess per acre half yearly 1s.4d. to 1s.8d. Bog used for fuel is very scarce. Prevailing Names: Ryans.

This rock, which is limestone, is about 2 chains long, 1 chain broad, and in height about 12 feet. It got its name, it is said, because fierce, savage animals, such as welves, wild cats, &c., formerly lurked about it and caused the natives to dread passing by it

Kilteely Village -- J. O'D.

This village contains about 40 houses, the chief part mudwall, and none two story high except the National School, which was built in 1834 at the expense of £170 by the parishioners. Its daily number of pupils vary according to the visissitudes of the year from 120 to 40 boys per day and from 80 to 30 girls. The Master of the boys receives about 20 per annum, of which £8 is paid by the Board of Education and the remaidder by the scholars. The Mistress of the girls is paid about £12, including £8 from the Board. In this village are 4 licensed public houses, six houses with petty groceries, a police barrack, and a Roman Catholic Chapel built in 1800 at the expense of £600 contributed by the parishioners. The Chapel is in the form of a cross, and is capable of containing about 700 persons. There is one fair per year here, with a market one day previous to the fair.
