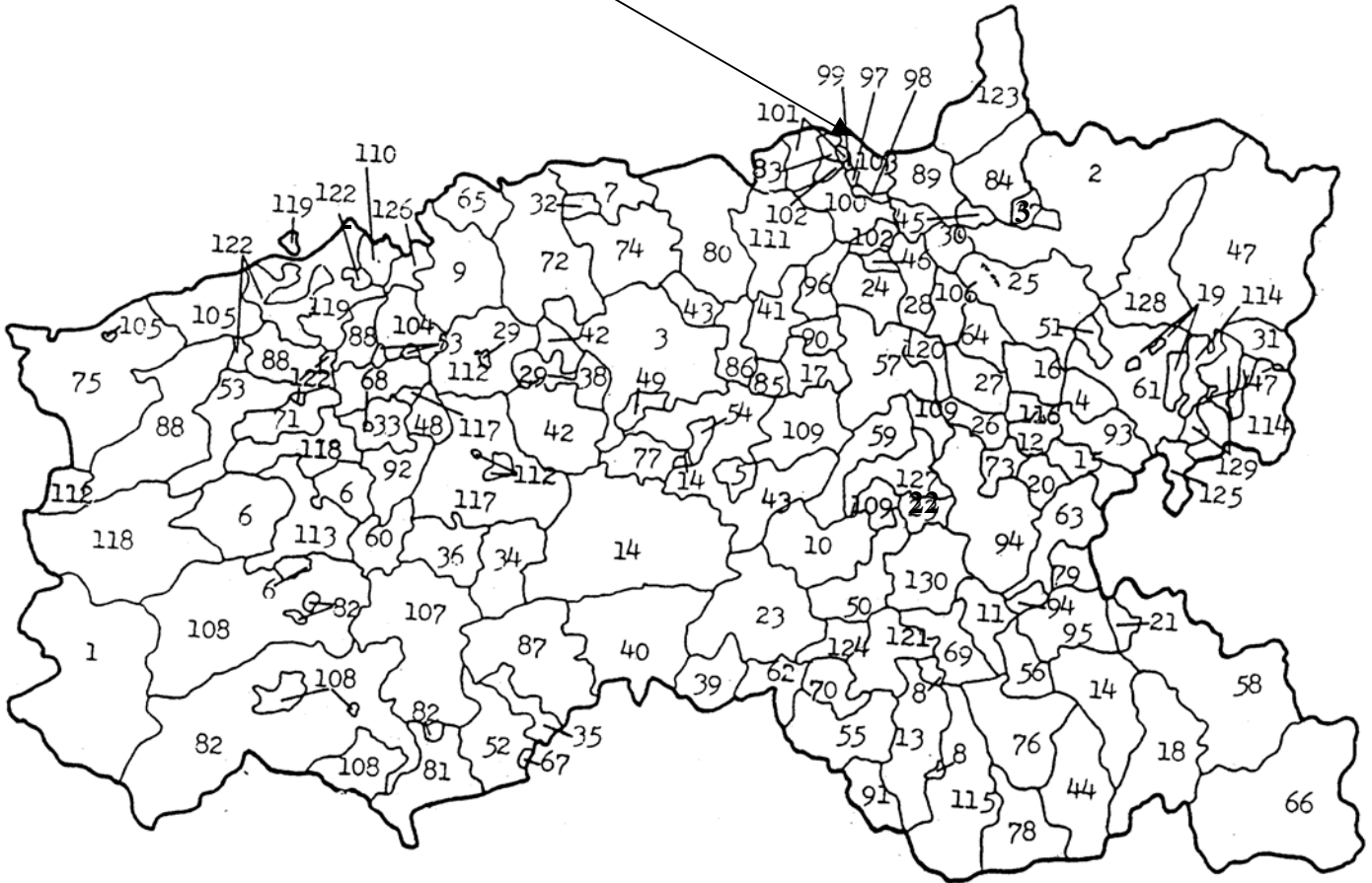

CITY OF LIMERICK - BOOK 1

Mill Lane -- Inhabitants 1  
-- J. O'D.

Situated in the N. end of the city. It extends from George's Quay to Mary St, and is at the W. end of Barrington's Hospital.

This lane is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long & 6 links wide.

Fish Lane -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

In the N end of the city, and extends between Mary St. and Sir Harry's Mall.

This lane is about 4 chains long and 18 links wide.

Little Fish Lane -- Inhabitants 2  
-- J. O'D.

In the N. end of the city and leads N.E. from Mary St. about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains E from and parallel to Fish Lane.

This lane is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 12 links wide.

Mont de Piete -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

Situated in the N. end of the city, on the N. side of George's Quay and E. of Barrington's Hospital.

A Pawn Office.

Richmound House -- Inhabitants 3  
-- J. O'D.

Situated about 8 chains N. of New Street. A house.

Emly Street -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

In the N. end of the City and leading N.E. from Mary St. to Sir Harry's Mall. Is about 7 chains long & 20 links wide.

Athlunkard Street -- Inhabitants 4

Ath Longphuirt, fort of the encampment. J. O'D.

Athlunkard St. -- J. O'D.

In the N.E. part of the city and leads between Park Br. and the N. end of Mary St. It is  $14\frac{1}{2}$  chains long, and from 1 to  $\frac{1}{2}$  a chain wide.

Honan's Quay -- Inhsbitants  
-- J. O'D.

Honan's Quay (contd.)

Situated in the W. side of the city, S.W. of Arthur's Quay, N. of Brunswick St., and W. of Georges St.

This quay is about 9 chains long, and upwards of 15 ft. high.

Nicholas Street

-- Inhabitants & J.O'D.

Situated in the N. part of the city, N.W. of Mary St., and E. of Castle St. Is about  $4\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain wide.

George's Street

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the centre of the city & leads from the Military Road to Patrick Street. This street, which is the principal one in the city, and upon which a great part of the others depends, is about 40 chains long and one chain wide.

Mary Street

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N. end of the city, W. of Sir Harry's Mall and E. of the Cathedral. This street is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and  $\frac{1}{2}$  broad.

Brunswick Street

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the W. side of the city, S. of Arthur's Quay and W. of George's St. Is upwards of 9 chains long and one wide.

The Island

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Situated in the N. end of the city & leads from Sir Harry's Mall to Franklin's Quay. It is between Barrok St. & St. Mary's Chapel.

This street is from 30 to 40 links wide, and runs from one side of the King's Island to the other, for which reason it was probably named as above.

John Street

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Situated in the centre of the city & leads E. from Mungret St. Is about 10 chains long and 60 to 70 links wide.

Pump Lane

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N. side of the city, and leads between Barrack St. and Athlunkard St.

This lane is about 4 chains long and 8 to 20 links wide.

Linche's Lane

-- Inhabitants

## Lynch's Lane

-- J. O'D.

In the E. part of the city, and east of John's Street, from which it leads. This lane is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 10 links wide.

Change Lane -- Inhabitants 9  
-- J. O'D.

This lane is situated to the East of the Cathedral, and leads South from Nicholas St.

Sergeant's Lane -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

In the E. side of the City. Is 1 chain S. of Walsh's Lane & extends E. from John St.

This lane is about 2 chains in length and about 10 links wide.

Love Lane -- Inhabitants 10  
-- J. O'D.

In the N. end of the City, to the E. of Nicholas St. and to the W. of Barrack St.

This is a small narrow lane, about 21 links wide and 3 chains long.

Birkrey Lane -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

In the E. side of the City, about 60 links S. of Lynch's Lane & E. of John St., from which it leads.

Is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 5 to 7 links wide.

New Street -- Inhabitants 11  
-- J. O'D.

In the S.W. side of the City, and leads between the old road and the new road to Croom.

This street is about 1 chain wide and  $11\frac{1}{2}$  chains long.

Billy White's Lane -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

In the E. side of the City. leading from John St. eastwards. It is nearly 1 chain S. of Birkrey's Land & the same N. of Forker's Lane.

It is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 7 links wide

Nunnery St. -- Inhabitants 12  
-- J. O'D.

In the N. side of the City and leading from Nicholas St. to Barrack St. It is E. of Red Lion Lane and W. of Kelly's Lane.

It is 33 links wide and 3 chains long.

Forker's Lane -- Inhabitants  
-- J. O'D.

Forker's Lane (contd.)

In the E. side of the City, and leads E. from John St. It is 1 chain S. of Billy White's Lane.

This lane is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long & 7 links wide.

Barrack St.

Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N. side of the City, leading from Franklin's Quay to the N. end of Broad Lane.

This street is about 30 links wide and about 10 chains long.

Walsh's Lane

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the E. side of the City, leading E. from John St. It is 80 links S. of Forker's Lane.

This lane is upwards of 2 chains long and about 8 links wide.

Broad Lane

It is from 20 to 25 links wide & 3 chains long.

Mungret St.

In the E. side of the City, leading between High St. and John St.

Is about 12 chains long & about  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain to 70 links wide.

Old Francis St.

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Situated E. of Mungret St. and leads between same and Broad Lane.

It is 5 chains long and about 30 links wide.

Flag Lane

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N. side of the City and leads between Barrack St. and Nicholas St.

Is about 3 chains long and 10 links wide.

Broad Lane

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the E. side of the city & leads between John St. and Old Francis St.

This lane is upwards of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 20 links wide.

Madam Perry's Lane

Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Sitd. N.W. of Broad Lane & leads from John St. to Old Francis St. Is something more than 2 chains long & is about 10 links wide.

- Red Lion Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 16  
 In the N. side of the City, and leads between Barrack St. and Nicholas St.  
 It is  $3\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 10 links wide.
- Clampett's Bow -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 About 30 links S.E. of Bushel's Lane & leads E. from Old Francis St.  
 This Bow or Lane in near  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 8 links wide.
- Storey's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Is between 20 & 30 links S.E. of Connell's Lane, and the same distance N.W. of Bushel's Lane.  
 Is nearly  $4\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 8 links wide.
- Kelly's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 17  
 In the N. side of the city, and leads between Barrack & Nicholas Streets.  
 Is about 3 chains long and 10 to 15 links wide.
- Bushel's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 About 37 links S.E. of Storey's Lane, & leads between John St. and Old Francis St.  
 It is 3 chains long and about 47 links wide.
- Curry's Bow. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Is  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains S. of Mungret St. and leads E. from Old Francis St.  
 This bow or lane is nearly  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long & 10 links wide.
- Newfoundland Inhabitants & J. O'D. 18  
 A street in the N. side of the City, extending from Barrack St. to the Island.  
 It is near 4 chains long and 12 links wise.
- Connell's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Situated about 70 links S.E. of Curry's Bow, and leads between John St. and Old Francis St.  
 Is  $3\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and about 6 links wide.
- Hink's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Situated 1 chain S.E. of Broad Lane and leads West from John St.

- Ellen St. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Situated and leading E. from Patrick St.  
 Is about 8 chains long and  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain wide.
- Michael St. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Situated S. of Water Gate, from which it leads, and 4 chains E. of Rutland St.  
 Is about  $5\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and about 60 links wide.
- The National School -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 21  
 Situated in the N. end of the City. It is S. of the Island, and attached to the N. side of Barrack St, also at the S.E. corner of "the Convent".  
 This is a female school, under the patronage of Dr. Ryan, the Titular Bishop of Limerick. Its average number of pupils is from 400 to 500.
- Bank Place Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
 Situated and leading E. from Rutland St. and joining Charlotte's Quay.  
 Is 3 chains long and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  wide.



Madam Villier's Alms Ho. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 22

In the N. end of the City, about 2 chains E. of Thomond Wooden Bridge and 6 chains N.E. of New Bridge.

About  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains S. of Charlotte's Quay, and leads between Michael St. and White Wine Lane.

In the N.W. end of the City, at the N. end of Castle St. and on the River Shannon.

This bridge was built in 1839 & 1840. It is nearly 6 chains long and 57 links wide.

St. Michael's Parochial School - Inhabitants & J. O'D.

On the E. side of Michael St. & 40 links S. of Water Gate. This building is 3 stories high.

Thomond Wooden Bridge -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 26

In the N.W. end of the City, 6 chains N. of the New

Bridge. Is about 7 chains long and 24 links wide.

Francis St.

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Situated W. of Patrick St. and S. of Custom House Place.

Is 4 chains long and about 88 links wide.

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N.W. end of the City and W. of the Shannon.

A street about 7 chains long and about  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain wide.

Custom House Place

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Situated N. of Francis St. and W. of Rutland St.

This place or street is nearly  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains long &  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain wide.

Custom House Quay

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

W. of the New Bridge and N of Custom House Place.

About 9 chains long and upwards of 12 feet wide.

Peter's Cell

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

28

In the N. end of the City, and is attached to the N.W. side of Newfoundland St.

It is a piece of ground  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and upwards of 1 chain broad. It is covered with weeds and constituted a burial-ground for the Quakers of the City.

New Bridge

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

On the R. Shannon, W. of Charlotte's Quay and W. of Custom Quay. This bridge is about  $2\frac{3}{4}$  chains long & has 5 arches.

O'Halloran's Lane

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

In the N.W. end of the City and leading S. from Thomond Gate.

Is about 2 chains long and 20 links wide.

Custom House

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

This building is situated about 1 chain W. of Rutland St., and to the E. of Customhouse Place.

St. Francis' Abbey

-- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

30

In the W. end of the City, about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains N. of Barrack St. and at the W. wall of the Convent. In ruins.

A small part of the E. wall is standing; remainder defaced except for a small portion of the N.W. wall which stands about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains N.E. of the above.

Cromwell's Fort                      --- Inhabitants & J. O'D.                      31

In the N. part of the City, about 15 chains S. from the Shannon in the King's Island.

This fort was made in the Cromwellian period as an outwork of the garrison of Limerick, for the purpose of preventing the landing of an enemy on this island. It is said that during the Siege, when the plague raged in the City, the remains of its victims were interred here; but this is not very probable. The fort has been since cultivated and levelled, and now bears the mere semblance of a military structure.

Is about 6 chains long and from 30 links to  $\frac{1}{2}$  chain wide.

Courthouse Lane                      -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Between Mary St. & George's Quay, and leads between Quay and Creagh lanes.

Is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains long and 20 links wide,

- Cresby Row -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 35  
 In the N. end of the City, and leads between Bow Lane and Abbey St.  
 This street is about 3 chains long and 30 links wide.
- Abbey St. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 36  
 Situated N. of Bow Lane and leads W. from Nicholas St.  
 Is about 6 chains long and 30 links wide.

This lane is about 8 chains long and 20 links wide.
- Henry Street S. -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.  
This street, leading from Boherbwee and joining Carey's Rd., is about 8 chains long and 60 links wide.
- Long Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 42  
In the N.E. end of the City and extends N.W. from Sir Harry's Mall to Courthouse Lane.  
This lane is 4 chains long and 25 links wide.

This house was built and is supported by the bequest of Jeremiah Hall, LL.D., in which house 16 old persons are provided for, as also a Boys' and Girls' School under the same institution.

River Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 43

In the N.E. end of the City and leads between Sir Harry's Mall and Courthouse Lane.

Is about 5 chains long and 30 to 20 links wide.

St. Mary's Chapel -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

Attached to the N.E. side of Mary St. and about 1 chain E. of Emly St. In ruins, with portion of the walls, in length about 2 chains & about 20 feet high in parts, standing.

The Old Hospital -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 44

In the N.E. end of the City, about 70 links S. of the Old Courthouse and the same distance E. of Long Lane.

This house, which is now a pottery, was built by private subscription both of the County and the City of Limerick, and was erected on this ground, which was given in perpetuity at a pepper corn a year by Edmond Sexton Perry, Esq.

Carey's Road -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

This street is situated in the S.E. corner of the City, and leads E. from Henry St. South.

It is between 60 to 70 links wide. (Length not given).

Glue Manufactory -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 45

This house is situated in the N.E. end of the City, 2 chains N.W. of Sir Harry's Mall and attached to the W. side of River Lane.

Lee's Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D.

About 1 chain E. of Cahil's Lane and leads S. from Henry St. South.

Is about 4 chains long and 26 links wide.

Gaol Lane -- Inhabitants & J. O'D. 46

In the N.E. end of the City and leads from the union of Courthouse Lane and Long Lane to Mary St.

Is about 3 chains long and 20 links wide.

Edward St.

-- Inhabitants &amp; J. O'D.

Situated in the S. end of the City, about 5 chains E. of Perry Square, and leads between High Street and Prospect Road.

This street is about 6 chains long. It is also called Boher Buoy (Bothar Buidhe = Yellow Road).

Barrington's Hospital

-- Inhabitants &amp; J. O'D.

Situated in the N. end of the City and on the S. bank of the King's Island, N. side of George's Quay.

This hospital was founded and erected A.D. 1829 by Joseph Barrington & his sons Matthew, Daniel, Croker, and Samuel, for the relief of the poor of their native city. It was incorporated by Act of Parliament in 1830.

The North Strand

-- Inhabitants &amp; J. O'D.

Situated on the W. side of the Shannon, and leads W. from Thomond Bridge.

This strand or street is about 12 chains long and from 12 to 60 links wide.

Situated in the S.E. end of the City, N. of the Lunatic Asylum and of the road leading from Limerick to Cork.

"Gallowsgreen" is the face of Gallowshill. It is 5 or 6 chains long and 3 chains wide, and is now the Fair Green of Limerick. On this Green, during the Siege of Limerick by King William. a battery of six 12-pounders stood here, the fire from which did considerable harm to the City.

By an old privilege granted to the City, persons condemned to suffer death in the City are executed at this spot.

Situated S. of Gallow's Green and on Gallow's Hill.

This fort is about 5 chains long and 3 broad, in the centre of which is cut the "Tank", 4 chains long and 2 wide, which supplies the City with water from the R. Shannon by means of underground tubes.

This cottage was built by Wm. H. Owen, Esq. in 1839 at the expense of £700. It is 3 story high, is handsomely built, and is situated on a small eminence overlooking the River Shannon. It is unoccupied at present.

In 1729 it became the property of the Ormsbys under the name of Blackland Castle, and lastly, in 1833, it became the property of Christopher Delmege, Esq., who improved and rebuilt the greater portion of it. It is a splendid edifice, 4 story high, overlooking the Shannon, and valued at £2,000.

This house was built in 1700 by the Revd. Edmd. Palmer. It was occupied in 1834 by Captn. Vereker, and is now (1839) the seat of John Finch, Esq. It is 2 story high, seated on an eminence.

This quay was built in 1830 by Sir Joseph Barrington, Bart., at the expense of £700. It is about 4 chains long and 1 chain broad, and is about 12 feet high.

Situated at the middle of the S.W. boundary of Ballygrennan Td., east of an old road from Limerick to Ennis and 28 chains S.E. of the Red Gate.

This house was built by Viscount Gort, and was inhabited in 1833 by Captn. Vereker, after which time it commenced to decay. It was 2 story high. Part of it is yet extant, but much is leveled with the ground.

This house was built by Pierce Shannon, Esq., in 1824 at the expense of £2,500. It is 3 story high, 80 feet long and about 75 feet broad. It is built on an eminence overlooking the River Shannon.

Park House -- R. C. Bishop of Limerick 20  
 Park House -- J. O'D.

Situated in the south end of Park Td., about 17 chains from Park Bridge No. 1, 20 chains E. of Halfpenny Well, and 16 chains S. of the road from Limerick to Killaloe.

This house was rebuilt in 1825 by Rt. Revd. Dr. Ryan, R. C. Bishop of Limerick, at the expense of £500. It is 3 story high, 70 feet long, and 50 feet broad. It is seated on an eminence, overlooking the Park river and the City of Limerick.

Park College -- R. C. Bishop of Limerick 21  
 -- J. O'D.

Situated in the west end of Park Td., within about 16 chains of the boundary of Park Bridge No. 2.

This old college was built in 1800 by subscription amongst the Roman Catholics of the City of Limerick at the expense of about £3,000. It is 3 story high, about 2 chains long and about 30 feet broad. It is now waste. It is seated on an eminence overlooking the east side of the City.

Halfpenny Well -- Inhabitants 22  
 -- J. O'D.

Situated in the east end of Park Td., within 25 feet of the S. side of Michael O'Brien's house, 40 feet from the N. side of the Canal, and 3 chains from the Canal Bridge.

It is said by the inhabitants that in former times persons were charged one halfpenny per day for water from this well, and that it is from this charge that the well came to be known as the Halfpenny Well.

Penny Well -- Inhabitants 23  
 -- Co. Map 1821  
 -- J. O'D.

Situated in the west end of Park Td., within 30 feet of the road from Singland to Park Village, and about 7 chains from the boundary at the end of Penny Well Street.

It is said of this well that in former times persons were charged one penny per day for water from it, and that it is from this charge that it came to be known as the Penny Well.

Lucas's Lough -- Inhabitants 24

Poll Lucais, Luke's hole.

Poullucas -- J. O'D.

 Lucas's Hole } -- Inhabitants

Situated in the N. end of Reboge Island and bounded on the W. by Corbally and Park tds. and on the N. by the River Shannon.

It is said that this lough, or hole of water, is so named because a man named Lucas was drowned there.

Park Bridge No. 1. -- Inhabitants 25  
 -- J. O'D.

Situated in the td. of Park and within a  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile of the City of Limerick, about 13 chains from Penny Well, and within a  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile of the River Shannon.

This bridge was built by the Canal Company. It is 22 yards long, with one arch 20 feet high. It crosses the Canal at Park Lock House.

Jamesborough Cottage -- Inhabitants 26

A fancy name. J. O'D.

This house is situated in the east end of Park Td., within 3 chains of the road from Limerick to Killaloe, within 10 chains of the boundary at the Cross-roads, and about 15 chains from Park College.

It was built in 1839 by Wm. McMahon at the expense of £600. It is about 15 feet high, 60 feet long and 50 feet broad. It is seated on an eminence overlooking the River Shannon.

Rebogue Water Engine -- Inhabitants 27

See townland name. J. O'D.

Situated in the east end of Reboge Td, to the W. of the River Shannon, and about 11 chains S of which the Canal leaves the River Shannon.

This house and works were built in 1824 by the Water Works Company. It is 2 story high, is 25 yards long and 20 yards broad, and is seated on the bank of the Shannon.

Rebogue Meadow Bleach Green -- Inhabitants 28

See townland name. J. O'D.

Situated in the south of the td. of Reboge Meadow,

within 1 chain of the boundary between Singland and Reboge Tds., and 1 chain from the parish boundary with Kilmurry Ph.

This Mill was rebuilt in 1820 by Mr. Godfrey Bevan at the expense of about £350, exclusive of machinery. It is about 2 story high, 1 chain long, and 30 feet broad. It is partly supplied with water from King William's Well.

Singland Bleach -- Inhabitants 29

Situated in the S. end of the td. of Singland and within about 6 chains of Singland House. It is 50 links from the parish boundary between Kilmurry and St. Patrick.

This house was built in 1824 by Mr. Godfrey Bevan, at the expense of £300. It is 2 story high, 75 feet long and 25 feet broad.

Singland House -- Inhabitants 30

Fearann Saingil, prond. Fearrann Singil by the inhabitants.

See townland.

Situated in the south end of the parish and in the td. of Singland, 1 chain east of the road leading from the Bleach to Limerick, and 7 chains from the parish boundary at Towlerton (Kilmurry Ph.)

This house was rebuilt in 1824 by Mr. P. Coughlan (now in possession) at the expense of £300. It is 100 feet long, 20 feet broad, and 2 story high. It is situated on low ground overlooking the Cork road.

King William's Well -- Inhabitants 31  
-- J. O'D.

Situated in the south end of the parish and in Singland td., within about 5 chains of Singland House, and within 3 chains of the junction of Kilmurry, St. Patrick's and St. Nicholas's Phs.

It is said by the inhabitants that, at the siege of Limerick, King William encamped at this well, from which he and his troops were supplied with water. Hence the name King William's Well.

Situated in the east end of Singland Td., in waste ground, within about 6 chains N. of the Cross-roads leading from Patrick's Church to Gallows Green.

It is said of this well that, at the building of the first church here, the masons could not find water. St. Patrick happened to pass that way and, hearing of the lack of water, prayed there. Immediately water sprang from the rock. It is also said that the print of St. Patrick's knees are still in the rock at the well. Roman Catholics are in the habit of doing penitential exercises at this well.

St. Patrick's Church -- Co. Map 1821

Situated in the east end of Singland Glebe, and 1 chain from the west side of the road from Singland to Gallows Green.

This is a small burial ground, in which strangers are chiefly buried. It is about 4 chains long and 3 chains broad, and is on a rocky hill. There is neither church nor ruin in or near it.

Situated near the west side of the parish, in the td. of Singland, and to the west of Gallows Green.

It is said that at the Cromwellian siege of Limerick this hill was taken and fortified by them with the intention of destroying the City from it by artillery fire. Hence the name Cromwell's Fort.

Situated in the west end of the parish, on the road from Limerick to Killaloe, and on the boundary between the pshs. of St. Patrick and St. Munchin.

This bridge was built in 1783 by a Mr. Maunsell. It is 125 feet long, 30 feet broad, 30 feet high, and with 5 arches.

Ruins of Old Fort in Rebogue -- Inhabitants 37

See townland name. J. O'D.

Situated in the east end of the td. of Reboge, about 6 chains south of Reboge Water Engine.

This fort is a square of about 70 feet. It is uncultivated, as it is believed unlucky to interfere with it in any way. It is said that a man once removed part of it, and was found dead next morning. It is also said that there was a bleach green in the adjoining field, and that King William's army encamped there when at the siege of Limerick.

Athlunlard Bridge -- Stone on bridge 38

Ath an Longphuir, prond. Ath a' Lungcuirt, ford of the encampment.

Athlunkard -- J. O'D.

Situated on the Shannon, in the east end of the Ph. of St. Patrick, and on the road from Limerick to Killaloe.

This bridge was designed and built by Commissioners under the Act of the Fourth of George IV. It was begun in 1826 and finished in 1830. It is 400 feet long, 26 feet broad, and 20 feet high, with 5 arches.
