SITUATION. Knockmagaul Parish is situated in the Barony of Pubble Brien and the County of the City of Linewick and is bounded on the north by Mungret and Saint Nichelan's Parishes; on the south by Kilpencon Parish; on the east by Caheravalla and Feddamore Parishes and on the west by the cora Parish.

NAME. The name of this Parish is pronounced Cook and nGall in Irish, which signifies the Hill of the Foreigners, i.e., collis alienigenarum, which, though now a Parish anne, is not of ecclesiastical origin.

The rules of the old Church of this Parish are sit tated in the rest of the Townland of Glebe of Lemonfield. Goverten feet in length of the south wall and thirty feet of the north one romain (these portions are eight feet high and three feet thick). It had a nave and choir, but the middle gable has been entirely destroyed. Materials of the building are large lime stones (not quarry ones) and coment of lime and and mortar. The grave yard here is large and has but a few graves. It has no wall enclosing it and is covered over its surface

Ballyclogh House, the residence of Edmond Morony, Esc., is built on the site of a Castle, part of the walls of hich, being about eight feat taick, remain quite perfect in Kara north end of the house.

with briars, elder and white thorn.

A cashel or fort built of stone, in Irish Caisice, is situated in south of the Townland of Bollyclogh. Filegorald in (Vol.I. p.344) sectes Knocknagaul Parish as being wirely contained in Pobble Brien Barony.
