recorded that the first hurl-ing match played in Limerick under organised G.A.A. rules took place neath the shades of the historic castle of Ballygrennan, Bruff, the contestants being Fedamore and Bruff. Since those far-off days, many great athletes from the Bruff district have written their names district have written their names across the pages of the G.A.A. his-tory. To adequately deal with them would be impossible in a passing re-ference like this, but withal I will be pardoned for recalling such names as Micky Creed, of which more a little later on; Mick Finn, who was a member of the Kilfinane that more Limpical's first All team that won Limerick's first Allback in 1887; Fr. John O'Donnell, P.P. of Culvert City (now Holy-wood, the Film Colony) who was a well-known inter-county hurler in his day; Johnny Guerin, who hails from day; Johnny Guerin, who hais from Knockaney; well-known ballplayers such as Denny Conway, Jim Carroll and Tom Meaney, and the brother athletes, Tom, Jack and Maurice Fitzgerald. Hurlers that gap the passing years include Mick Quinlan and Mick Whelan, both well-known players of the Bruff senior side that gained inter-county prominence 30 years ago; Con Scanlan, renowned with Fedamore a little later; Chris Ryan, a member of the Limerick side that won the 1921 All-Ireland final, and of the Army selection that won the first all-Army hurling title; Ned Treacy, Egan and Jack Clancy, Jerh. O'Donnell, who won the 1927 Co. Championship with Fedamore and the following year's title with Young Ireland; Bill Hogan, a mem-ber of the 1928 Young Ireland team also, and Bill Moroney. Bruff always boasted great Gaelic en-thusiasts and none will begrudge special mention of the late M. P. O'Shaughnessy, William Naughton, and Daniel McDonald. No space now to recall all the grand games, that are remembered in Bruff, but some readers will recall the great contest against Castlemahon when Ned Treacy, Egan and Jack Clancy, contest against Castlemahon when Bruff brought home the cup, and again the game against the great Shanballymore team which Bruff won by two points, and the late M. Woh by two points, and the late in. P. O'Shaughnessy presented to each player a bottle of brandy. On that occasion five waggonettes and fifty sidecars and traps conveyed the wearers of the Green and Gold to the venue. Further we recall the thrilling match against Caherline, which had such a sad sequel. All of these games are discussed still at cross-roads and around the firesides of Bruff, and there a younger gen-eration of Gaels hear tales of the long waggonette journeys to Tippe-rary, Kanturk, Charleville, Feda-more and Limerick in the days when petrol rationing caused little worry.

I have often written of Bruff handballers in these columns. It was my proud privilege to be associated with them during great Limerick handball days, and I cannot speak too highly of their splendid Gaelic spirit. Such is the traditional G.A.A. atmosphere that will permeate the finely laid out playing pitch on Sunday next. And in conclusion let us have a look at the men that are presently guiding G.A.A. destines in this little town by the banks of the Morning Star. The Chairman is Daniel McDonald,

P.C., well-known follower of Gaelic pastimes and a familiar figure on the side-line at all Limerick engage-ments. Others who are taking an active interest in the affairs of the club are Thomas Lynch, N.T., Grange ; Mick Quinlan, Chris Ryan, Jerry O'Donnell and Bill Hogan. Their pitch is ideally situated, facing Knockaney Hill, with the famous Galtees to the south-east, and north-east, a couple of miles away. Sweet Knockadoon, standing sentinel over the famed shores of Lough Gur.

The writer of the Mountcollins Notes in a recent issue of your most esteemed and widely read paper, mentions the name of the Rev. Bernard O'Mahony, who was a C.C. in that parish in 1888. The mention of the name of that pure-souled priest calls up hallowed memories of close on half a century ago when he was C.C. in Effin parish, and it may interest some to read the following few lines.

Your contributor is in error when he states that Father O'Mahony was born near Mitchelstown. He was not. He was bred, born and reared in Bruff town: his mother's Mitchelstown. He was not. He was bred, born and reared in Bruff town: his mother's name being Emmet, of an old stock that gave its name to Emmet's Bridge, which spans the G.S.R. a mile south of Kilmallock. The priest himself claimed descent from the family to which the patriot martyr—Robert Emmet —belonged, and invariably signed himself Bernard Emmet O'Mahony. The truth of the saying that—" Like begets like," was verified in Father O'Mahony's case, for he upheld the noblest traditions of the Irish clergy—as a priest, a patriot, and as a man. Soon after his ordination he went on the mission to Ulster, and while there he under-went a month's imprisonment for justly, but forcibly, rebuking an Orangeman who, while in the priest's presence, audibly wished to send his Holiness the Pope to a hot region. Father O'Mahony came to Effin just at the president of the local hurling club. How he assisted at the training of the team—that won many hard fought matches—how he led the

many hard fought matches—how he led the members on every occasion that they went abroad to play—let other pens describe. His Sunday sermons were on a par with those of the famous Dominican—Father

Tom Burke—and on much similar lines; for he scarcely ever preached without incidentally intertwining into his discourse the cause of Fatherland with that of Faith. <u>A MEMORABLE DAY</u>.

A MEMORABLE DAY. There is one day associated with Father O Mahony's curacy in Effin that deserves mention, that, in 1887, at Rathluirc, on the occasion of the visit of the late Most Rev. Dr. Croke, Archbishop of Cashel, when he came to assist at the celebration of the golden jubilee of the Mercy Convent there. Dr. Croke's sister was Rev. Mother at the time, and was the last of that noble family that shed lustre upon religion renown upon and was the last of that noble family that shed lustre upon religion, renown upon Charleville, and glory upon Ireland. It may be of interest to mention that Dr. Croke lived as a boy in that town, with his uncle, the revered parish priest—the Rev. Thomas Croke, who lived in the house now occupied by Father Barry, C.C.,—between the old church and Limerick road. A lunge concourse of priests and people assembled at Charleville railway station on that Sunday afternoon, to welcome the patriot prelate, and what a shout of welcome went up when he emerged from the train. A procession was immediately formed, and wended its way to the convent grounds, where

Benediction was given. In front was a huge banner bearing a Latin inscription, which when translated read:— "Welcome Croke of venerable name." On that memorable day Father O'Mahony led the Effin hurlers to meet the Archbishop, and so did another patriot priest, Father Eugene Sheehy, P.P., of Rockhill and Bruree. Dr. Croke expressed a desire to see a hurling match, and Effin and Bruree were selected to play. His Grace occupied a chair on the side play. His Grace occupied a chair on the side-line. Bruree scored after a short time, and their pastor joyfully threw his silk hat into the air. Soon after Effin equalised, and eventually proved the victors. Then Father O'Mahony's time had come. He, too, threw his "silker" up, and some wag who was present said it did not return to earth for fully five minutes—it went so high. Effin team was captained that day by "Big Tom Buckley," and when the Archbishop saw Tom's towering form he remarked :—" Is he not a magnificent specimen of Irish man-hood"! Poor Tom died soon after, and Father O'Mahony travelled over thirty miles to assist at his burial. His Grace occupied a chair on the sideplay. line. to assist at his burial.

**NOBLE AND GENEROUS QUALITIES.** How the "boys" loved their president, and deservedly so, for rarely were the noble and generous qualities he possessed to be found embodied in one man. His charity knew no bounds. Perhaps one incident may serve to show how he followed out the teach-ing of the Man of Sorrows—"I was naked, and you clothed me." He met a poor knight of the road one day, who was so badly shod that it was evident he had no stockings on. Father O'Mahony invited the knight to sit on the roadside with him, and there and then he divested himself of his socks, which he gave to the poor man, and went stockingless, remarking—" You have to travel farther than I have." I have.

He was soon after transferred to Killeedy He was soon after transferred to Killeedy parish, and immediately organised a hurling tournament there, putting up as prize a flag with golden harp emblazoned thereon—he dearly loved the green. The final lay be-tween Meelin (Co. Cork) and Effin. In those days the rules of the G.A.A. were modelled somewhat on theological lines. As no number of venial sins make a mortal one, so no number of points equalled a goal. Meelin scored ene goal, while Effin scored about a dozen points—the flag thus going to the former. former.

It appears that he went to Tournafulla from Killeedy, but his ardent Celtic spirit was of a rather restless nature, and he went on the mission to the Arch-diocese of Chicago. where he died rather tragically—falling a victim to heart trouble while celebrating Mass. He had many friends in that city who tenderly laid him to rest. He was a typical Irish priest in many ways, for he united within himself all that was un-selfish, noble, patriotic, charitable and priestly. May he rest in peace.

Then, came the huge task of laying out the field and here the firm of Sheehy Bros. was called in with their huge bulldozers which cleared the entire field of hedges and other obstacles. The firm specialises in this type of work and has specialises in this type of work and has carried out similar contracts at Copse-wood College, Pallaskenry, Salthill Stadium, Athenry Sportsfield, Lisdoon-varna, and at Newmarket, Co. Cork. When the entire area was cleared, the levelling of the pitch commenced, and the hulldozer removed five feat of the bulldozer removed five feet of earth. The earth was deposited around the outer part of the pitch and will be put back in three separate layers. When this is finished, grass seed will be planted and, in next to no time, Bruff will have one of the finest grounds in

Bruff was in bad need of a Sportsfield so, last year, the townspeople decided to do something about it. Experienced excavator workers state that it is the largest stone they have ever seen.

'HEART MAN' A

"Sunday Independent" Reporter

"WHILE IT keeps knocking, I know that I'll last a little longer," said Limerick hurling selector **Denis Barrett**, who in 1968 had only four months to live.

These days anybody who speaks to Mr. Barrett in a quiet place is likely to hear a "knocking" noise and while most are baffled at the sound, those who ask the reason might be told of the miracle that keeps the Limerick County Council supervisor alive.

This Sunday afternoon he will again share in all the excitement that is part and parcel of All-Ireland Final day as the team he helped to pick battles to make its own little bit of history by becoming the first Limerick team ever to win two senior All-Ireland Championships in a row.

But the position was very much different in the early part of 1968 as the then father of four faced death.

But the popular Denis made a choice that many more have failed to do . . . he opted for major surgery which led him getting a McGovern valve.

For seven and a half hours surgeons at the famous Presbyterian Hospital in Pittsburgh worked frantically to keep Denis alive. His wife, family and thousands of old and new friends prayed that God would make the operation a success.

Before the operation the main artery in Denis's heart wasn't functioning and frequently he suffered from acute shortage of breath.

Previously in 1958 he had a major operation in England, but at that time they could only strengthen the old valve which time proved was not sufficient. Gradually his condition

became more serious until finally surgeons told him that he had only four months to live. "I was shattered but many people were so kind at the time that I will never forget it for them," he said. "With prayer and financial assistance, hundreds helped to get me to America and, thank God, the operation was a tremendous success."



"It is not often that I speak publicly about my "knocking" heart, but this time I hope that anybody who reads about my success will seriously consider undergoing the operation. I believe many lives could be saved if more were prepared to have the operation," he added.

Denis, now the father of six, is a non-drinker and a nonsmoker. He is believed to be the only person in Ireland with a McGovern valve in the heart. The valve bounces up and down when the blood goes through it and it then cuts the blood off.

# NEW STAND FOR BRUFF FIELD

Plans for the erection of a stand at Bruff sportsfield are being considered at present. Finance is obviously a big problem. A respectable job including seating would cost in the region of ten thousand pounds. There is no need to stress that this is a big strain on the resources of a small rural club even at the present value of money. Various fundraising schemes are under consideration to provide finance to get the project under way.

Annual income to the Sportsfield of field rent and proceeds of fundraising schemes is only barely adequate for day to day upkeep and maintenance. The many patrons of Bruff Sportsfield are only too deserving of the comfort provided by the presence of a stand. Shelter for players and officials and press reporters would obviously be a natural added improvement.

While on the subject, only those with the responsibility of preparing and maintaining a S portsfield realise the work, money and time involved.

There is a strong demand on the free time of a field secretary with juvenile and minor matches interspersed with camogie matches and home team training.

On the playing fields we had a fairly successful year in 1978. We might say that our success this year came from an unexpected

but very welcome source. Traditionally we could be regarded as concentrating solely on hurling and when we win something in football as we did this year it might come as a surprise. But, for the last few years we have been trying to make a breakthrough in football and in 1978 the fruits of our labour have been realised. We won the South Division Junior Championship and South Division Junior Shield. We failed narrowly to Patrickswell (the eventual winners) in the semi-final of the County championship. This must surely be a record for drawn games involving the same clubs in any one year.





### Two Bruff stalwarts dead

Bruff put up a very spirited per-formance in the South Limerick Junior Hurling Championship for 1953. They beat a strongly fancied Stakers side to qualify for the final, in which they encountered the hol-ders, Knockaney, and drew with them on the first meeting, only to be narrowly beaten in the re-play, be narrowly beaten in the re-play, on the following Sunday, 17th October, 1973. Knockaney sub-sequently won out the County, and were later to pilot Limerick to the All-Ireland Junior Hurling Champ-ionship triumph of 1954.

Playing together on that fine Bruff side were Tommy Bulfin and Jimmy Farrell, and it is sad indeed to report that both died last week.

Tommy Bulfin of Grange died on Monday, 8th December, at a comparatively early age after a long illness. He won a county innor hurling medal with Bruff in 1941, he played for many years with the then Grange team and later with Bruff. When his playing days were over he maintained a cossionate interest in burling and passionate interest in hurling and was very active in promoting the Bruff club particularly in the juvenile sector and to the very end. He was also a trustee of the local grounds, and was a nephew of Limerick's murdered Mayor, the renowned Seoirse Clancy. Tommy's four nephews are now prominently associated with the Bruff club, who formed double guard of horour at the funeral, composed of juveniles and old passionate interest in hurling and

guard of honour at the funeral, composed of juveniles and old timers, both with their own memories of a truly great Gael. Tommy Farrell of Meanus, bet-ter known as "The Squire," was with the old timers at Tommy's funeral. They were assembled again on Saturday to escort Jimmy's remains. Jimmy had wit-nessed the County Junior Hurling final the previous Sunday and was looking forward to the re-play, but it was not to be. He had the repu-tation of rarely letting a Sunday go without seeing at least one hurling game, and he acted as umpire at various South board matches right various South board matches right to the end.
