THE death occurred in the County Hospital, Croom, of Mr. Simon O'Riordan, Dromin, Kilmallock, at the age of about 80 years. In his young days the deceased was prominently identified with the G.A.A., and played with the Old Dromin hurling and football teams, in which he was associated with such prominent players as the late Thomas Campion, Kilmallock, James Birrane, Major Larry Roche, now in England, who in recent reminiscences credits him with having brought "the first set of hurleys to Dromin," and other prominent Gaels. Up to about 12 months ago he maintained his interest in the G.A.A., being a well-known figure at all fixtures in South Limerick and surrounding towns, to which he always cycled despite his advanced age.

THE NATIONAL MOVEMENT

About the month of Dec., 1913, shortly after the formation of the Irish Volunteers in Dublin, the first meeting was held of local supporters of the new movement in the late Mr. O'Riordan's house at Dromin and a branch of the organisation was formed there of which he became a member. From that time onward he was closely associated with the Volunteers and Sinn Fein and in the years that followed his home was visited by many of the prominent men in both movements. Ernest Blythe, later Minister for Local Government, often stayed there on his occasional organising visits to East Limerick, as did in later days "Sean Forde," Sean Stack, now of the Department of Local Government, and other organisers of the National Movement as well as men "on the run." Following the daring and historic train raid at Knocklong, two of the Volunteers wounded in the raid, Capt. Ned O'Brien and the late James Scanlan, of Gabally, when they were convalescing from their wounds and returned on the run to South Limerick, immediately before their escape to America was arranged, found a safe refuge with him and his family. Because of his well-known national activities during the Anglo-Irish War his cottage was raided numbers of times by the Crown Forces, who on one occasion fired at his son, Jeremiah O'Riordan, now also deceased, while they searched for another son, Thomas J. O'Riordan, Mountmellick. Another son, Sean T. O'Riordan, Kilmallock, later Brigade O.C., East Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., and at that time the Commandant of the famous 1st Galtee Bn., was captured and sentenced to penal servitude for his part in the Ballylanders Barracks attack.

Some time ago when the Government decided to issue medals for military service during the Anglo-Irish War, the late Mr. Simon O'Riordan received an unsolicited Military Medal for his services with the I.R.A. Forces and his assistance to the fighting men during the Anglo-Irish War and the Civil War.

When the Emergency arose, he was one of the first to join and was by far the oldest member of the L.S.F., Bruff Area.

THE FUNERAL

The remains were removed from Croom to Dromin Church, where Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Very Rev. S. O'Dea, P.P., Dromin, after which the interment took place at the family burial ground in Dromin Cemetery.

O'Donoghue (Athlaca), Mr. Jas. and Mrs. O'Donoghue (Clogher), Messrs. Byrnes Brothers, Mr. T. J. Donovan, relatives.

The funeral was of very large proportions, representative of all classes over a wide area, and was a fine tribute to the memory of the deceased. The attendance included Senator Tadhg Crowley, Ballylanders; Mr. Liam P. Manahan, Irish Land Commission, Dublin, and all former Battalion and Company Officers and members of the Flying Columns of the East Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., resident in South-East Limerick.

SYMPATHY

At a special meeting of the Kilmallock Plot-holders' Association, of which Mr. Sean T. O'Riordan is Secretary, a vote of sympathy was passed to him and the relatives of the deceased on their sad bereavement.

THE South Limerick football semi-final at Kilmallock on Sunday between Ballylanders and Dromin-Athlaca, ended in a draw, and taking everything into account this can be regarded as a fitting result (writes our Kilmallock correspondent). The final scores were: Dromin-Athlaca, 1 goal and one point; Ballylanders, four points.

THE PLAY.

During the course of the hour, both sides missed many opportunities of scoring and, in addition, each side was awarded a penalty in the first half and both were missed. Dromin-Athlaca, particularly, frittered away many chances of scoring in the first quarter when they had much the better of the play. Co. Limerick Gael Who Was Fatally Injured In Chicago

1959

The death occurred recently in Chicago, as the result of an accident, of Mr. Danny Leonard, of Fanningstown, Patrickewell, Co. Limerick. The following references to his death and to his career as a Gael appeared in a recent issue of the "Chicago Tribune," from the pen of Mr. Pat Hennessy:—

Chicago Gaeldom is in deep mourning this week for the loss of one of its finest Gaels, expert caman welder, Denny Leonard, a native of Croom, County Limerick, who sustained fatal injuries in a fall from a 25 ft. scaffold at his place of employment.

The late Denny Leonard learned the love of his national games, language and culture at an early age in Adare's C.B.S., for whom he starred on the playing fields. He later distinguished himself in junior hurling and football with Kilmallock and Croom.

Coming to Chicago in 1955 the late Denny soon began acquaintance with the promotion of his national games which he loved so well. He was a founder member of the champion Young Ireland Club and was elected Vice-Chairman of the Chicago Hurling Board upon its formation in 1956, a position which he held up to the date of his death.

Good as his work was in the Committee room, the daring feats of Denny Leonard in the playing field will be best remembered. Who can forget his superb display against "the old maestro," Terry Leahy, in 1957, and again and again in countless struggles as a Chicago selector or as a star back man for his club team? When the chips were down and the Champions were fighting with their backs to the wall, as they were, so often, the fairhaired boy from Croom stood in the gap of danger and turned back the tide. Though we shall never again see his long strides, his powerful deliveries, his cute cover up play, and above all, his grand sportsmanship, nevertheless, the name of this great Limerick Gael will go down in the annals of Chicago Gaeldom as one of the best. We may have great men, but we never had better.

The wake which was held at Gibbons Funeral Home on the North West Side was one of the largest ever held there and testified to the popularity of this young Limerick Gael.

We join with the entire Gaelic world in tendering deepest sympathy to his young widow and to his family and relations in Ireland, asking God to sustain them in this, their darkest hour, and to grant that the green sod which Danny loved so well may rest lightly on his stout heart and noble brow.

Dromin-Athlacc²¹⁻¹¹⁻⁹¹, the surprise team of the season, are through to the Limerick Junior Hurling final. Fresh from their win over Bruree in the South Limerick divisional final, they defeated Caherline (East Limerick Divisional winners) in the County semi-final at Kilmallock yesterday by a substantial margin of 3 goals and 15 points to 4 goals and 4 points.

As this season moves on, Dromin-Athlacc²¹⁻¹¹⁻⁹¹ become more impressive and they have become known as a great second half team. Few would have given them a chance early on of reaching the County Final, but they have done so and it would be no surprise if they carried off the County title.

In the semi-final against Caherline, which is, incidentally, an area steeped in hurling lore, they got off to a good start with the wind and were leading by 1-5 to 0-1 after a quarter of an hour. Caherline improved in the second quarter and at half-time, Dromin-Athlacc²¹⁻¹¹⁻⁹¹ led by 1 goal and 8 points to 1 goal and 3 points, which was not considered formidable having regard to the wind. But immediately after the turnover they had a goal followed by a point and continued to have the upper hand to be ahead by 2-12 to 1-3 towards the end of the third quarter. Caherline showed up in better light in the closing quarter, but Dromin-Athlacc²¹⁻¹¹⁻⁹¹ held their grip on the game and finished stronger to have a convincing win.

Thrilling first championship success for Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71}

Never before did the do-or-die spirit of a team deserve to triumph in a South Limerick hurling final as did that of Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} in this title contest, at Kilmallock, on Sunday last, when their supreme rally in the closing quarter carried the day, and they won their first ever title.

Seven points down at one stage in the second half, and then playing second fiddle to a rampant Bruree side, they rallied in no uncertain fashion in the last quarter, took control completely in the last five minutes and finished up with a goal and 5 points to spare.

It was a triumph for a team, young in hurling years, well-trained and fit to the last hour better than their more experienced opponents. It was a triumph for a team that entered the arena as under dogs, and for them the victory was all the sweeter, after a game that produced at times hurling at its best, and that rose to the highest standards of previous South Limerick finals.

GREAT START

Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} got off to a dream start with a goal within two minutes of the throw-in. Experienced Bruree, and the favourites to take the title, were quickly back to wipe out the arrears and take the lead after 9 minutes, and, at the end

of the first quarter, Bruree were ahead by 2-3 to 1-3. Bruree continued to command the play, but Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} were still keeping in touch, and at the end of the first half Bruree were ahead by 3 goals and 5 points to 2 goals and 4 points.

Things looked black for the winners, as Bruree notched three valuable points after half time, but back came Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} for three similar scores and the margin was back to where it was at half time. There was only a goal between them (3-8 to 2-8) at the end of the third quarter. Early in the last quarter Bruree increased their lead with a point. Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} sent over two points, and there were only two points between them with 10 minutes to go. Dour fighters, Bruree kept coming back, and had a point to leave the goal margin again. Nine minutes to go and Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71} reduced the margin to two points, then, with 5 minutes left, they went through for a well engineered goal that gave them the lead. They now had the taste of victory, and they never again allowed Bruree to get going. They were on top, and stretched their lead to five points as they took control, and, in the last minute, added their fourth goal for good measure.

One might feel sorry for Bruree, who looked like winners for most of the game, but

in that closing quarter Dromin-Athlacc^{20/11/71}'s youth and fitness were the deciding factors in a game that ranked amongst the best in the division this season.

Dromin-Athlacca GAA Club

The Dromin/Athlacca G.A.A. club has a very long and chequered history. Situated practically in the centre of county Limerick it has been associated with Gaelic sports at least as far back as the middle of the last century. With very little success it is true, until quite recently, in fact its first recorded championship success did not come until 1954.

It is on record that a very active team which played mostly football was in existence in the 1850's and was known as the Boherard team. That team was in existence until about 1903 and many are the stories that are told of its players exploits and many are the songs which were written about it, the most famous being the "Boys of Boherard". This team had its headquarters in the Northern side of the parish, and they took part in parish competitions in which the ball was played from one parish to the next. I have often heard the old people refer to it as Faugh-a-Bhalla football.

In Jimmy Kellys (Caman) History of the Limerick G.A.A. it states that the Dromin club was reformed in 1897, and the officials were, Patrick Scanlon, Thomas Enright

and James Birrane. A Dromin senior hurling team played Kilmallock in the Co. championship in 1905 and were beaten by 5 points to 2, that game was played in a field near Ballygibba, nobody knows the exact location of the field now. A story is also told in the parish of how a football team travelled to the pattern day games in Ballylanders and beat Anavale Rovers a famous Tipperary team who were champions of their Co. at the time.

In more recent years a club was formed which went by the name of the Trinity Rangers. It was formed in Hayes Oil House in Dromin in February 1936 (no warm halls or good lighting in those days). The officers of that club were chairman James Birrane, Secretary, Thomas Ring and treasurer, Willie Hayes. The club had little success, none at all in fact, suffering some humiliating defeats. The one win which they had was in minor hurling when they defeated Kiltleely in Carmody's field in Bruff but later lost the game as the jerseys did not arrive at the venue and they had to play in their shirts. That club went out of existence during the war years. Many players from the parish still

assisted neighbouring teams.

Thanks to the Knocksouna flapper tournaments in the late 40s and early '50 a group of youngsters formed a club under the chairmanship of Wm. Mullins of Dromin and called it Dromin/Athlacca. For many years our teams were a joke suffering defeat after defeat. In one south game the bouncers beat us 14-14 to 1-1 and Glenroe beat us by 12-13 to 4 pts. Still the club struggled on and I think that it should be an inspiration to any team, that if they fight on their turn is bound to come. Our club which was once the poor neighbour of the good teams in the south, is now a match for most teams in the county.

The first Dromin/Athlacca break-through came when the South Junior

dedication, and the sportsmanship of Bruree and the high respect they hold amongst hurling men, it was surely a feather in our caps to defeat them. I must add that they were the first to congratulate us on this our greatest day. In 1973 we won the south U/21 and defeated Tournafulla in a replayed County final.

The club went Intermediate in '75 and this year won the County Championship defeating a great Glenroe team in the wind, rain and mud in Kilmallock on the 30th of October. Bonfires blazed all over the parish on that night too, in fact at the time of writing the match is still being played, the game and players are improving all the time I may add. Outside people have often said to me whats all the excitement

It has been decided to try to purchase the land and plans are being drawn up by a special committee.

Quiet? Yes Sleepy? No!

WHILE PATTERN DAYS are dying out all over the country, the parish of Dromin/Athlacca has two. The parish also has three active social halls and an ambitious plan to provide itself with a sportsfield.

The ten-mile-long but narrow parish contains some of the finest land in the country, being centred in the lushest part of the Golden Vale. Its inhabitants are a content and quiet people, proud of their area and its heritage. There is some commuting to Limerick and to Charleville, but most live happily at home on the land. Rural organisations, not surprisingly, play a pivotal role in the cultural life of the parish.

And, as in many placid verdant places, the people are generous in paying tribute to those people who contributed to the development of the area in the past, and those who continue to do so.

Young people

The parish also has an extraordinarily high number of young people. This phenomenon recurs in cycles, explains Phil McAuliffe, secretary of the local G.A.A. club. There were many children born in the parish some thirty or forty years ago, and these did not emigrate and are now the parents of the many teenagers and sub-teens of whom the parish is today so proud.

But it doesn't end with just being proud. The parish contains a mere 330 homes, and a population of 1,100, yet much has been done and is being done to provide for the young people. In fact, few parishes of so few souls have done so much or have planned so ambitiously.

And, of course, it all comes down to people.

Take Deirdre Neenan and Anne Fitzgibbon, for example. These dedicated ladies are the centre of the young G.A.A. Bord na nOg. With Deirdre's husband, Willie, they have given of their time and talent in copious amounts to ensure that athletics and cultural events are fully catered for on a scale which would shame more populous and less disperse places.

Glor na nGael

And it's no coincidence that the parish won Glor na nGael in 1981. The Gaelic tradition is strong, as might be expected. As the parish is proud, so is it united. Efforts such as the promotion of Irish receive universal and total support.

"We don't do things by halves", smiles Paddy Tierney, treasurer of the local G.A.A. club. And he is right, because Paddy is the main co-

ordinator of what is to become one of the parish's main ventures to date — the purchase of its own G.A.A. pitch.

From just after its inception in 1952, when it rose from what was Trinity Rangers, the club has played on land made available by Jack Kelliher, president of the club. Jack's patience, says Paddy, has been extraordinary and every tribute should be paid to him. But now the time has come to raise the £25,000 needed to purchase a field directly across from the parish school.

"We hope that youngsters will play at lunchtime and then grow up to give the club even more strength than it has at present", says Paddy.

Wren boys

But £25,000 is still a daunting amount to raise. True to form, however, the promoters have a number of tricks up their sleeves. Some are already in being, such as the 45 games which operate each week of the year (the only such event in Limerick not to break for the summer). And, of course, drawing on their cultural strengths, it was no problem to create a troupe of wren boys who collected almost to the outskirts of Cork City in their enthusiasm.

In all, £8,000 has been raised since last November.

Now comes the biggest idea yet. The parish of Dromin/Athlacca is to approach its exiled sons and daughters and seek their return and, in the process, hope to gain contributions.

"But we have got several excellent contributions already from local people and people who live just outside the parish", states Joe Mulcahy, the club chairman, who told of three cheques for £200 each which turned

up, unsolicited, in the past fortnight.

There is, of course, more to the parish than the G.A.A. It is, for example, a major horse centre, with three establishments in existence. P. P. Hogan, Gus Leahy and Enda Bolger all maintain their bloodstock there.

Badminton

But if you want to play badminton, you may have to queue. As the only badminton hall for miles around, it caters for people from as far as Bruree, Bruff and Kilmallock.

And is it possible that the parish was the only one in the county to stage a pantomime each year and pack it to the doors for six successive nights?

Maybe it's because of all the grace gained during the two Pattern Days with which we began this look at Dromin/Athlacca.

In modern days, the practice was reborn in 1978, with the celebrations to mark the centenary year of Dromin hall. A Mass on Trinity Sunday brought people back to remember the significance of Trinity Well, and it took off from there. Now the period around Trinity Sunday is a parish festival. In fact, it is probably the only Pattern Day festival which is a moveable feast.

At the other end of the parish, Athlacca Muintir na Tire have become organisers of St. John's weekend, the other Pattern celebration, which is also a carnival-atmosphered event.

Activity

The parish of Dromin/Athlacca is quiet, but certainly not sleepy. Activity is everywhere to be seen.

But the fact remains that people from the parish rarely figure in court reports, and it is doubtful whether Fr. O'Byrne in Athlacca or Fr. Duggan in Dromin have heard a startling confession in years.

There were some good individual performances particularly from Mike O'Leary, Joe Foley, Gerard Moynihan and John O'Callaghan, but too many players seemed to lack the heart and appetite that brings pride and satisfaction if not victory to the parish. Hopefully we will learn from this experience.

Our novice hurlers play Kilfinane in Kilmallock on Saturday evening at 7.30 so the panel of players involved are asked to be ready for duty at 7.15.

Dromin-Athlacca GAA Club

The Dromin/Athlacca G.A.A. club has a very long and chequered history. Situated practically in the centre of county Limerick it has been associated with Gaelic sports at least as far back as the middle of the last century. With very little success it is true, until quite recently, in fact its first recorded championship success did not come until 1954.

It is on record that a very active team which played mostly football was in existence in the 1850's and was known as the Boherard team. That team was in existence until about 1903 and many are the stories that are told of its players exploits and many are the songs which were written about it, the most famous being the "Boys of Boherard". This team had its headquarters in the Northern side of the parish, and they took part in parish competitions in which the ball was played from one parish to the next. I have often heard the old people refer to it as Faugh-a-Bhalla football.

In Jimmy Kellys (Caman) History of the Limerick G.A.A. it states that the Dromin club was reformed in 1897, and the officials were, Patrick Scanlon, Thomas Enright

and James Birrane. A Dromin senior hurling team played Kilmallock in the Co. championship in 1905 and were beaten by 5 points to 2, that game was played in a field near Ballygibba, nobody knows the exact location of the field now. A story is also told in the parish of how a football team travelled to the pattern day games in Ballylanders and beat Anavale Rovers a famous Tipperary team who were champions of their Co. at the time.

In more recent years a club was formed which went by the name of the Trinity Rangers. It was formed in Hayes Oil House in Dromin in February 1936 (no warm halls or good lighting in those days). The officers of that club were chairman James Birrane, Secretary, Thomas Ring and treasurer, Willie Hayes. The club had little success, none at all in fact, suffering some humiliating defeats. The one win which they had was in minor hurling when they defeated Kiltelly in Carmody's field in Bruff but later lost the game as the jerseys did not arrive at the venue and they had to play in their shirts. That club went out of existence during the war years. Many players from the parish still

assisted neighbouring teams.

Thanks to the Knocksouna flapper tournaments in the late 40s and early '50 a group of youngsters formed a club under the chairmanship of Wm. Mullins of Dromin and called it Dromin/Athlacca. For many years our teams were a joke suffering defeat after defeat. In one south game the bouncers beat us 14-14 to 1-1 and Glenroe beat us by 12-13 to 4 pts. Still the club struggled on and I think that it should be an inspiration to any team, that if they fight on their turn is bound to come. Our club which was once the poor neighbour of the good teams in the south, is now a match for most teams in the county.

The first Dromin/Athlacca break-through came when the South Junior football championship was won in 1954. Only five players from the parish were on the team as the rest came from neighbouring parishes. The juvenile hurlers also won the south in that year and were beaten in the county semi-final by Patrickswell who boasted some great players, including present co-selector Tony O'Brien. Our under 14 hurlers won the South title in '65, '66 and '72 and the nucleus of a fairly good team started to emerge. Minor hurling and football souths were won in 1970 as well as the junior hurling shield - Under 21 football was won in 1971. The club's greatest ever achievement (I think) was also in 1971 when the junior hurlers defeated neighbours and great sporting rivals Bruree in the South final, the excitement after this victory, not for days but for weeks had to be seen to be believed. Even old ladies who knew nothing about hurling could talk of nothing else, and of course knowing the tradition the

dedication, and the sportsmanship of Bruree and the high respect they hold amongst hurling men, it was surely a feather in our caps to defeat them. I must add that they were the first to congratulate us on this our greatest day. In 1973 we won the south U/21 and defeated Tournafulla in a replayed County final.

The club went Intermediate in '75 and this year won the County Championship defeating a great Glenroe team in the wind, rain and mud in Kilmallock on the 30th of October. Bonfires blazed all over the parish on that night too, in fact at the time of writing the match is still being played, the game and players are improving all the time I may add. Outside people have often said to me whats all the excitement about, but to live in a small rural parish such as ours where you know everyones business well you must live with us to know us. We must be forgiven, I suppose for going "mad" on our occasional victories as after all a lot of our time we have to stay oh so very sane.

A very strange thing about the intermediate championship, it was very nice to win it and vindicated our people who entered it. But it lacked something, to our club at least, not the same heart playing in it. Supporters not as keen, they had much more interest in tournament games, all cribbing that the coverage of the championship in the papers was non-existent. This club at any rate is more than thankful to be gone from it.

The men who steered our destinies this year are Gaels who are steeped in the tradition of the G.A.A. Chairman Jack Kelleher won two County Limerick Junior titles at left half back, one with his native Feenagh and one with
