
Lady Secretary at Kilmallock



THE death occurred suddenly at his residence of Mr. William Hannan, Sheares Street, Kilmallock, who was for almost 60 years parish clerk of Kilmallock and who was awarded the Pope's long service medal-Bene Merenti-in 1974.

ene Merenti-in 1974. He was actively concerned with the G.A.A. for more than 50 years. During the thirties, he won several South Limerick junior hurling medals, a County Limerick junior hurling medal, two South Limerick junior football medals and several other championship and tournament trophies.

He was a member of the Limerick junior hurling team that won the All Ireland title in 1935 and also played with the county senior hurling team in the thirties. He was also a very active administrator and served on the Limerick County Board G.A.A. the county appeals committee, was a senior and junior hurling selector and a member of the South board. He was also a handballer of

He was also a handballer of note, winning many competitions all over the county. Towards the end of his playing career, he became a prominent referee, taking charge of several county finals and also refereeing some inter-county matches. He served as club secretary for almost 20 years and was also chairman of the Kilmallock club for a period. He was appointed life president of the club, and he was a founder member of the Kilmallock Gaelic Grounds Committee. He was a member of the Kil-

He was a member of the Kilmallock group that featured on the "Going Strong", programme on T.V. with Bunny Carr.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. N. Hannan; by his son, John; his daughter-in-law, sisters, grandchildren and brother-in-law. High tribute was paid to him at the concelebrated required

Align tribute was paid to him at the concelebrated requiem Mass at St. Peter and Paul's Church, Kilmallock, by Very Rev. M. 

WHEN PADDY KELLY received the ball some 30 yards from the Tipperary posts last Sunday it was his intention to take a point which would have broken the deadlock and put Limrick into the lead with only two mnutes left for play. But, when he avoided Jack Bergin's tackle, he changed his mind. "I had been conscious of having missed those frees and really wanted to try and redeem myself. So when I brought the ball a little closer to the post^S I said here goes and the goal certainly was a very major consolation", said Kelly between classes at Tipperary C.B.S. during the week.

"I tried not to allow those misses upset my concentration on the game or to effect my determination to make up for them. When the chance comes your way you must have the con" viction to take it and put it away. And a goal at such a vital stage makes it so much more difficult for an opposing team," added Paddy.

However, as Paddy glanced quickly back over his hurling career he could not recall a day when his free-taking was so much below par. "It was one of those days I suppose which all players can experience", said 27-years-old Kelly. "But it could also be due to the fact that Limerick did not have a competitive game for five week^S and I believe we will be sharper for the final against Wexford".

Kelly has always been referred to as either the "speedster Kelly", the "flying Kelly," or the "Athletic Kelly" but all three descriptions fit and for a very good reason. He was always a most promising athlete ever since he won the all-Ireland 800 metres Under 12 at Iveagh Ground⁸ back in 1967.

Subsequently Paddy ran the 400m, hurdles in 54.2 secs, when finishing second to John Dillon in the Irish Senior Championships in 1975. That was a most promising time for a 19-yearold runner who then earned his one international against Luxembourg and Wales. "I really liked athletics but it wa^S always a case of trying to fit it in between hurling and football", said Paddy who even won a few under aged Limerick cross-country titles and ran 800m. in 1-56.

It was often a case of competing in athletics on a Sunday afternoon and playing a game in the evening. Eventually it became too much and athletics took a back seat. If Paddy can win one All-Ireland senior hurling medal it would satisfy his sporting appetite, just like it did for another very promising athlete in fellow Limerickman. Pat Hartigan.

However, Kelly would be very happy indeed to begin with a League medal this afternoon. "We need to win a National title and it could be just what this team needs to make the break through in the Championship", reckons the man from Kilmallock who earned his first honours on the field with Charleville C.B.S.

He was still a minor when he was drafted into the Limerick panel in 1974 and while he has been a regular for practically the last decade there have been occasions when a los⁵ of form saw him relegated to the substitutes. In fact, he came in as substitute in the Munster final win over Clare in '74 and was also drafted in for the All-Ireland decider which they lost to Kilkenny.

There was further All-Ireland Championship disappointment for Limerick in '80 and '81 and Limrick's prospects were severely hit last summer when Kelly suffered a broken finger on the eve of their game against Cork. That followed their League final defeat by Kilkenny.

8.4-84 Now they face another challenge. And Kelly is really looking forward to it. "Quietly confident", was how he summed up his approach. "The spirit of this team is a^s good as it was in '73 and '74 and Bro. O'Grady is a man who seems to be able to get the best out of each individual player. That's very im-portant and we hope to reap the benefits," added Paddy who hopes to get a added few more chances to redeem himself still further this afternoon.

There was no fear of hurling in Kilmallock while that continued. Kilmallock while that continued. Kilmallock has connec-ons with the G.A.A. dat-g back to the founding of e Association. Athletics tions with the G.A.A. dating back to the founding of the Association. Athletics played an important part in the promotion of the infant organisation, and Kilmallock, with its own cinder track, was the meeting place of Ireland's foremost athletes in the late 'eighties.

One of the men who founded the G.A.A., the late J. K. Bracken, a Tipperaryman, lived in Kilmallock

The first county cham-pionship won by the club was in 1908, when Kilmallock defeated Newcastle West 2-8 to 0-3 in senior football. The first hurling championship was won in September of 1927 at Hospital. This was the final of the 1925 county junior cham-pionship and resulted in a 6-3

The games flourished in the southern capital down the years, with many successes in both hurling and football. The summit was reached in 1960 when Kilmallock won the county senior hurling title for the first time when scoring a 4-5 to 0-4 win over Claughaun at the Gaelic Grounds. The team who achieved the honour were: Tommy Hanley, John Cotter, Tom O'Donnell, John Cotter, Tom O'Donnell, Mick Heelan, Noel Flynn, Vincent Cusack, Paddy O'Grady, T. J. Hanley, Mick Heffernan, Paddy Fitzgerald, Denny McCarthy, Joe Naughton, Jimmy Millea, Charlie O'Grady, Paddy Wall. Subs used: Jack O'Sulli-van and Jim O'Grady. Western Gaels knocked them off their perch in 1961 at Bruree, and made it another

Bruree, and made it another setback in 1962, this time in the final.

Five years later the club booked a place in the senior hurling decider against South Liberties.

This was probably one of the most talked-of finals and received publicity throughout the land. Played in pouring rain, and on a mud-packed Gaelic Grounds, the crowd of over 2,000 were treated to a thrilling draw. Kilmallock scored 3-3 to Liberties 0-12, with a late goal saving the day for the South Limerickmen.

Replay

The replay did not produce the same thrilling fare, as Liberties went down 4-7 to 1-7. Pat Heffernan, who play-ed at centreback for Kilmallock in the drawn game, played a soccer match on the following Sunday and was not relected for the rentar Bule

win in the 1970 final. They won 2-14 to 0-2 against Patrickswell.

The famous three in a row in 1973, 1974 and 1975 were without doubt the greatest years in the history of the club.

In 1981 it was a final meeting between South Liber-ties and Kilmallock. This second meeting of the sides in a final was another draw, but on this occasion it was South Liberties who captured the glory in a replay.



CHAMPIONS MA SLUGGISH START BUT EASY WIN

Kilmallock 5-8 Doon 0-4

Strange game this — reigning champions Kilmallock had a mere point to nil on the scoreboard after the first quarter, led by an uncomfortable 1-6 to 0-4 well into the third phase, but then went on an amazing scoring spree which yielded three goals in the same number of minutes, to send them on their way to the next round.

Doon, who had high hopes of a good run in this season's senior hurling championship, played well in a first half that failed to excite the reasonably big attendance.

For some reason they lost their way on the changeover when Kilmallock took advantage of their many shortcomings to punish practically every mistake.

Even allowing for the closeness of the first half exchanges this was far from the standard of hurling we expect from the championship. Both sides struggled to find a pattern as evidenced by just 1 pt. scored after 15 minutes – and that came from a Paddy Kelly placed ball. Sure, the scores came more regularly afterwards, but then it developed into a mismatch with Doon clearly out of their depth. Kilmallock, who led 0-5 to 0-1 at the interval, looked ordinary enough at times. Their play was riddled with mistakes, the defence was uncertain, and those in front shot an amazing number of wides.

It was left to seasoned campaigners Paddy Kelly, Johnny Neenan and Willie Guiney to chart victory at a time when their supporters had become frustrated.

Let's have a look at how play developed on the change of ends.

In the 37th minute Kilmallock were awarded a close in free and Paddy Kelly, wearing the number 12 jersey, blasted to the net, to leave the score 1-6 to 0-2. Doon hit back for mid-fielder Richard Quigley to reduce arrears by two points, and it was then that the green and whites really let loose.

Goals

In the 45th minute Guiney made no mistake from close range, and the ball was hardly delivered out when Kilmallock struck again. This time it was 36-year-old Johnny Neenan who caught the Doon defence off balance with a well executed goal, and shortly afterwards he was on his way to recording a similar score when pulled down. Up stepped Paddy Kelly to raise another green flag. Doon were now trailing 4-7 to 0-4, and their confidence drained. Most of the crowd had left

when that man Neenan again palmed the ball to the net one minute from time, though some felt referee Terence Murray should have disallowed this effort as Neenan dropped his hurley on his path to goal.

to goal. It was difficult to believe at the final whistle that Kilmallock had managed to triumph by a massive 19 points. It was tough luck on Doon that they should fail to last the pace in certain positions and the team mentors must have had a few harsh words to say to their forwards at the finish. Ger McGrath was the only one of the six to find the target, the other three points coming from the stick of mid-fielder Richard Quigley.

Had Doon managed to find the net in the first half when they had a lions share of the play it might have been a different contest. They came close on two occasions, more notably when Kilmallock keeper Moloney was caught off his line, but Donal Barry was at hand to clear the danger. Moloney made 'at least three daring saves over the hour, and if any one of them had been converted it would surely have made for a more interesting encounter.

Paddy Kelly and Johnny Neenan shared the scoring honours with 2-1 apiece, and it was this duo *who brought most fear to the Doon rearguard. Donie Barry had an excellent game, while Maurice Nelligan, Liam Tobin and Dave Riordan also lived up to their reputations.

Doon will want to forget this outing. Their young side lacked authority when put to the test, and seemed overawed by Kilmallock's reputation. They could hardly have been satisfied with just one point from their first half endeavours, and fared only a little better in a one-sided second half. Quigley was unquestionably their best performer with most of the others coming to life only in spasms. A word of warning to Kilmallock – there must surely be tougher obstacles ahead.
