# St. Mary's beat K'aderry in thriller

A CLANCY must have been the toast of the Rathkeale fans on Sunday evening when St. Mary's arrived back in the Lower Deelside town with the premier West Limerick hurting trophy amidst scenes of wild excitement and enthusiasm. And well he might be, as it was Pa's spectacular performance in the Rathkeale net that contributed more than anything else to St. Mary's 2-point victory after one of the most exciting and keenly contested finals in the annals of Western hurling.

There were, of course, other contributing factors to St. Mary's hard-won victory, including Tom Markham's fine display at midfield and that all-important goal by John Kelly, who came on as sub. in the concluding stages. But in the final analysis it was Pa Clancy's sparkling exhibition that really won the day for the victors and brought them their first Divisional junior hurling title since 1961.

However, the spectators were entirely indifferent to the biting November blast as thrill succeeded thrill in a game that reached unusually high standards, having regard to the rather difficult underfoot conditions.

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The Knockaderry lads surely had every reason to feel disappointed after a really gallant effort that was supported by all the qualities that make for success—youth, speed and all-out determination. Looking back on the epic game they must have felt that ultimate defeat was due mainly to missed chances, a tragedy of lost scoring opportunities. Having failed to exploit at least a couple of easy chances in the opening half they succeeded in wiping out an early deficit to draw level at the interval, but their forwards were again remiss in the second moiety. Even when a point down with only a matter of minutes to go they still got an opportunity of pulling the fat out of the fire in those hectic closing minutes but failed to press home the advantage and were two points down at the final whistle. final whistle.
