



The St. Patrick's G.A.A. Club in Limerick can proudly claim to have produced three Irish ruby Internationals, six Mayors of Limerick and gave Ciaran Mac Mathuna to RTE. All this and a great deal more is documented in the official club history recent published.

"The Saints Go Marching On" was researched by Matt O'Connell and edited by Sean Murphy. It chronicles 100 years of activity in the club, ine of the first in Limerick to affiliate to ahe GAA in 1986. 24/4/84 St. Patrick's...... 3-12 Mungret ...... 3-7

St. Patrick's won the minor football league division title at Pairc na nGael when they defeated a gallant Mungret side before a small attendance. This game had everything and one word can describe it, "a classic".

Saints played into the town goal and got off to a dream start. In the opening minutes Julian Lyons shot over a nice point from play. This was followed by a Saints goal. Tom Downes played a ball out of defence to Henry Caulfield, and his long delivery was fisted to the Mungret net by Michael Kerley. Julian Lyons added another point from a 45 metre free to put Saints 1-2 to 0-0 ahead. Saints were truly rampant at this stage and when Mark Hackett was put clean through the Mungret defence his goal-bound shot was superbly saved by Mungret 'keeper Ger Hehir. At this stage a big win seemed on the cards for Saints but Mungret, the defending champions, had other ideas.

They scored three points in succession from Neill Curtis, Ger Harney and Brian Fitzpatrick. A free from Mark Coleman dropped around the Saints fullback line and when full-forward Cathal O'Sullivan knocked the ball down there was Brian Fitzpatrick to put the ball past Alan Mitchell and give Mungret the lead for the first and only time. Saints reply was two points from play per Henry Caulfield and Kenneth Morgan. With the inter-



val approaching Saints scored their second goal. A shot from Dessie Kiely was saved by Ger Hehir but rebounded to Saints full-forward Mark Hackett who made no mistake. The final score of this half fell to J. Lyons who punted a 45 metre free to leave Saints leading by 2-5 to 1-4.

The second half began with both sides looking for that crusial score and it came to Mark Hackett who pointed from play to put Saints five points clear. Kevin O'Hagan reduced the lead with a Mungret point. Mungret were totally dominated at this stage but a great break out of defence by Declan Rooney was carried on by Dessie Kiely and Ken Morgan to Mark Hackett who beat three Mungret defenders before cracking home a great goal from twenty yards. Mungret now seven points in arrears refused to throw in the towel and Morgan Whelan pointed. Saints replied with points from M. Kerley and M. Forde. Ger Harney availaved of another slop up in the Patrick's defence to shoot home a welltaken goal. Again St. Patrick's replied with a point from Henry Caulfield. As the game entered the final ten minutes Mungret's full-forward Cathal O'Sullivan fisted effort was turned on to the post by Saints

'keeper Alan Mitchell but Cathal turned the rebound into the net to leave just one goal between the sides.

At this stage it seemed that Mungret were going to take complete control, but a magnificent point from far out on the left-hand touchline by Michael Kerley put Saints four points ahead. Cathal O'Sulliyan had a Mungret point but in injury time Julian Lyons had St. Patrick's final two points. Mungret, who had to field without their two rugby schools internationals, Nicky Barry and Eoin O'Sullivan, fought like true champions and didn't give up their title without a fight. They had fine performances from Ge Hehir in goals, John Forde, Mark Coleman, John Ryan in defence; Niall Curtis and Kevin O'Hagan at centrefield, and Ger Harney, Cathal O'Sullivan and Brian Fitzpatrick in attack. St. Patrick's had fine performers in Declan performers in Declan Rooney, Ken McNamara, Tom Downes, Derek Tobin, Des Kiely, Julian Lyons and a forward line who created some brilliant passing movements. And so the Eamon Maher Trophy makes its first journey to Rhebogue and how Saints deserved it. Anytime their opponents seemed to be taken control they had the spirit and ability to come back and score.

After the game, City Board secretary John Clifford presented the cup to St. Patrick's captain Julian Lyons. He congratulated both sides on a thrilling hour's football and said "the only losers were the people who didn't turn up to see a wonderful final".

# Marching into a second century

IN THESE days of high VAT on hurleys, wouldn't any club treasurer be only too delighted to buy a dozen of them for just 50p. Couldn't happen, you say. It did, but then again, that was back in 1914.

This is just one of the many interesting facts contained in the first major history of St. Patrick's GAA Club, brought out to mark its centenary year.

St. Patrick's or as they are better known, Saints, were one of the first Limerick clubs to affiliate to the GAA in 1886.

The 180 page booklet - The Saints Go Marching On - chronicles the happenings and deeds of the club over the century in minute detail.

Apart from the numerous interesting articles, the fine quality pages boast a high pictorial content.

The mammoth research work began as in 1982 when Matt O'Connell took the job upon himself. And 14 months ago, Sean Murphy and Paddy Quilligan joined Matt in his efforts.

The three met weekly over that period. Sean assumed the editor's role, while Paddy was entrusted with the onerous task of co-ordinating the publication. It was printed earlier this month, three weeks ahead of the deadline.

#### LONG SERVICE

All three have given life long service to the GAA, Matt, a distinguished Gael, was joint secretary of the City Board as far back as 1945, and is still a club delegate to the County Board.

Sean, a former County Board PRO, is a respected GAA columnist and historian. Editor of the Limerick Yearbook for 12 years, he was co-author of the Mackey Story with Seam O'Ceallaigh. He has edited

many other books on the GAA.

Current City Board Chairman, Paddy Quilligan played in the 1960 Harty Cup with CBS. After figuring on the successful Saints minor hurling team in 1958, he played with Limerick the following year in the Munster Minor Final. He has the unique distinction of having been a team selector in nine county finals, eight of which St. Patrick's won.

#### SNIPPETS

Here are a few interesting snippets from what is perhaps the best club history book to emerge in recent years:

\* In 1944, 37 dozen of minerals could be bought for the sum of £4-12-6.

\* Six St. Patrick's players, Michael J. Keyes, Michael Hartney, Rory Liddy, Christy Keyes, Clem Casey and Mick Lipper, all served as Mayor of Limerick. Another club member James Cussen was Mayor of Luton in 1971 and again the following year.

The Jarvey car was a popular mode of transport for club teams during the Emergency.

Three rugby internationals - Gerry McLoughlin, Brendan Foley and Colm Tucker - have worn the Green Jersey for Ireland. But did you know that they also donned the Green for the Saints?

Ciaran Mac Mathuna of Radio Eireann fame played minor and junior hurling with Saints, and was on the team beaten by Bruff in the 1941 County Minor Final.

Incidentally, Ciaran will launch the book at the Castle Oaks Hotel, in Castleconnell on Easter Sunday at 7.30 p.m.
