MARTIAL LAW

QUESTION BY MR. DILLON

MR. ASQUITH'S REPLY
In the House of Commons last evening, Mr. Dillon asked the Prime Minister whether he attended had been called to the attention of the Lord Justices of Ireland extending the application of Martial Law to the whole of Ireland for an indefinite period; whether he had approved of this Proclamation; if not, what reasons he justified the application of Martial Law; after all disturbances had come to an end; and whether he considered the issue of such a Proclamation calculated to promote in any way the peace and tranquillity of the Irish Republic, by general good will and agreement.

SPRING CORN TESTS AND REMEDIES

Hints For Farmers
The fine spell of weather of the last two or three weeks (written "W" in the *Leader*) had enabled farmers to get on with the season's work. Though it was late before spring corn was sown it is surprising how quickly it has developed. In most places the corn now appears very healthy, but here and there one sees thin patches; especially amongst those who have sown late. It would seem, indeed, as if the seed had been weak and one again we are reminded how necessary it is to have all seed tested before finally sowing. The dry weather has had a tendency to cause the surface soil to cake and get hard. A blow of the harrow or tam with the roller in such cases was desirable. What we should aim at is having the surface in a fine crumbly state, then evaporation of water from the ground is at a minimum. There is, perhaps, hardly anything more detrimental to the crop than a deficiency of moisture, so that every possible should be done to conserve it. The usual pests are not so prevalent this year. Wireworm and Leather Jacket grub do not appear to be causing much damage so far. But, doubtless, they will make their appearance, then if the crop is to be saved no time must be lost in applying the proper insecticides. In most places the application of quick-acting manures, both these insects are least harmful in seasons when growth is rapid, and this gives us the means of checking the devastations of both "the grub" and "the worm." It is frequent that a half acre of corn, sown in the usual way, is attacked by wireworm, and the loss is considerable. The application of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia, in one of the best remedies. One hundredweight of nitrate of soda mixed with 2 cwt. of sulphate of ammonia, applied in the usual way, will give a very beneficial result. The best means of checking the devastations of both "the grub" and "the worm" is frequent harrowing with a light harrow, followed by rolling. In this way the grubs are exposed, and certain birds, such as rooks and sea gulls, make short work of large numbers of them.
