NEAR & FAR Interesting News Items

Grassmole Discovery The dead body of an animal named 'Grassmole' was found lying in bed in his house in New Ross on Friday.

Burglary in Prison Three convicts serving terms of penal servitude in Mooklenburg-Stralitz, Germany, are to be tried for committing a burglary in prison.

The Paper Supply The Government have decided that the restriction on the importation of paper shall now be increased so that only one-half the amount of the restriction in 1914 will be allowed to come in.

Irish Party Whip The following whip—signed by Capt. Donohue, M.P.; Mr. P. O'Brien, M.P.; and Mr. J. P. Boland, M.P.—was put on the members of the Irish Party.

The Gaiety "The Mystery of the Tapestry Room," a film that shows how misfortune seems to dog some families, tops the Gaiety programme for tonight and to-morrow night.

Coursing Fixtures The Irish Cup trials, as already announced in our columns, will take place this year at Clonsilla on December 12th, 13th and 14th.

An Absolute Sham An adjourned meeting of the Irish Nation League in Dublin broke up in disorder on Wednesday night.

Theatre Royal Those who wish to enjoy the performances of a pair of genuine Irish comedians should pay a visit to the Theatre Royal to-night or any other night.

LIMERICK LEADER THE NEED OF THE AGE

Progress of the Struggle Enemy Trenches Cleared During the week-end the Franco-British forces obtained important strategic successes south of the Somme and north of the Aisne.

Brilliant French Attacks Brilliant attacks enabled the French, south of the Somme, to obtain possession of the first German trench on a front of 12 kilometres (7 miles) and to capture the hamlet of Gommegnies.

Russian Success The Russian report of the battle, in which they achieved success, in the region of Koritsnia, on the western front, Franco-British counter-attacks failed with great slaughter.

Italians Make Progress South-east of Coriza the Italians have extended their occupation of the Sibar valley and have strengthened and consolidated their newly-acquired positions on the Carso.

Sanguinary Street Fighting The Rumanians announce the capture of the village of Palana Sarata, in the Oltava valley, after "most sanguinary street fighting."

The Situation Safe The Rumanian general, Georgescu, has stated in an interview that the situation is safe, and that no cause for anxiety exists.

In Macedonia In Macedonia the forces of the Entente are holding the upper hand. The Serbs have advanced on the left bank of the Cerna.

French Cruiser Sunk The small French cruiser, Rigol, has been torpedoed and sunk in the Mediterranean. The Germans state that as the result of the sinking 1,700 lives were lost.

Turkish Transport Captured In the Black Sea a Russian submarine, after an unequal fight with a Turkish armed transport, succeeded in bringing the transport to Sevastopol.

Fight for Sere The station at Sere and adjoining positions have been shelled by the British. South of Sere British patrols have been in contact with the enemy.

Bulgaria and Rumania General Joffe, in an army order issued on the anniversary of Bulgaria's intervention in the War, said that the Rumanians will be driven from the Balkans, and that they will be rendered ineffective.

Enemy Attack Repulsed A Sofia official communication states that a strong attack by the enemy against the sector of the British in the Terekele mountains was repulsed with heavy enemy losses.

Conscripting the Unemployed Amsterdam, Monday—Frontier reports that "The Telegraph" states that 2,000 unemployed workers in Ghent have been compulsorily registered and are to be transported to Germany.

Bombarding the Bulgarians Paris, Monday—The "Petit Parisien" says that the British have begun the bombardment of three points held by the enemy on their front in Macedonia. The Bulgarian artillery is replying freely.

Bavarian King's Funeral Amsterdam, Monday—The funeral of the late King Otto, of Bavaria, took place yesterday at Munich with great pomp. The Queen and the entire Court attended.

French Official Dispatch Paris, Monday (Official)—Yesterday evening we penetrated into the village of Sully, Saillies and occupied the houses on the edge of the village. The enemy replied with several volleys and lighting continued.

British Communique A British communique this afternoon says—There was heavy hostile shelling during the night south of the Somme. The British attack north of Courmieu was repulsed with great difficulty. A more important attack at Schwaben Redoubt, delivered after heavy artillery preparation, was repulsed by Franco-British forces.

Shocking Tragedy Youth of Seventeen Charged With Murdering His Father A tragedy occurred in Hull on Saturday night when a young man of seventeen was charged with the charge of murdering his father. It is alleged he stabbed his father with a knife, and the father fell.

Painful Story in Court A Central News wire this afternoon says—A Hull Police Court today, John James Gibbons, aged seventeen, who looked very young, was charged with the murder of his father, Ernest William Gibbons, a fisher, by stabbing him with a knife in his back.

Railway Fatality Two Men Killed While walking along the North-eastern railway near the station at Cleveleys, on Saturday night, two men were run into by a passenger train and killed.

THE LABOUR CAUSE THE ANNUAL MEETING

Intersting Paper by Rev Father Laurence, O.S.F.C. On Friday night, at the concluding function in connection with the Catholic Social Reform League, a paper was read by Rev. Father Laurence, O.S.F.C., delivered a deeply interesting address in the Dublin Mansion House on the subject—"The Labour Cause."
