

Additional Pensions PRACTICALLY every old age pensioner reland is entitled to the additional allowance recently provided by the Government for such persons suffering special hardship from the high prices of food and other economic conditions arising from the war. This is a hatter on which some doubt appears to have been existing, and it is highly desirable that there should be no uncertainty or misconception regarding the point. The maximum extra amount that can be given is 2, 64 a week, and the power of giving or withholding that sum or any proportion of it rests mainly with the several Pension Committees, which, it would seem, are in yeated with full discretion in the discharge of their useful and important functions. The additional allowance can be given in case where an old age pensioner's present income (moluding his present pension of se a week) does not exceed a total of 13s, and in the case of a married couple where their Joint income, including both their existing pensions, does not other war circumstances are naturally affect ing all and sundry to can eafely be assumed that in nearly every case those already in receipt of pensions are entitled to the extra voted by Parliament. The application for the additional stipend must be made on a form which te now obtainable at any Post Office or

sed 19s 6d a week. As the high prices and under the Vaccination Acts, and penalties of from the Pension Officer, and must be sent to ethat of tramway king and millionaire, died on the Pension Officer in whose district the applicant resides, when the usual investigation of the claim will be made by the pension committee or sub-committee. In the course of a letter to the Honorary Secretaries of United Irish League Branches all over the country explaining these points Mr DEVLIN, M P, recalls that since the Old Age Pensions Act came into force there has been in existence at the Central Offices of the United Irish Lague, 39, Upper O'Connell street, Dublin, an Old Age l'ensions Bureau, established for the purpose of furnishing information in connection with claims. "This Bureau," he says, "will be at the service of all applicants for the ad ditional allowance, and especially in those which difficulty has been in obtaining the additional grant, from whatever cause. All cases submitted to the Bureau will be dealt with in the order received, and every effort will be made to deal with them promptly and satisfactorily. It is well that this should he known so that justice could be secured if possible for those who are cutitled to the extra but may be refused it at first for some trifling or merely technical reason. Important instructions bear ing on the powers of local committees in deallog with claims are contained in a letter from the Treasury to all such committeen. Dealing with the question whether the allowance is to brawarded where an old age provioner owns property of appreciable value, but whose total means are within the prescribed itmits, the communication says the matt risons for the discretion of the local committee. After stating that the Lords Commissioners do not consider that any hard and tast rule can be laid down the Treasury letter goes on to say "Thus, the holder of debentures for which there is temporarily, no market, and the interest on which is in stofault, may for the time bring be suffering severe hardship, even though the debentures are of a constderable amount. Even as regards a Hank deposit, which it, perhaps, the most easily realisable form of at call, and further, though to the sole name of the pensioner, it may not be wholly at his own disposal. Their lordships would suggest for the guidance of Committees that applicants for an additional allowance who are in possession . of capital of considerable amount, should not be regarded in ordinary of countrances as suffering special hardship, even though the amount of the doposit is much below the maximum limits (vir. £390 and £754 for urmarried and matried applicants respectively) beyond which the applicants would be ineligible on means." These are very important points to have made clear from authoritative sources, and they show that a wide discretion is invested in those charged with the administration of the Act. which is an undoubted boon to so many. The Sub-Committees in Limerick city and county, we are glad to es , ere discharging their duties under the Act in an efficient and sympathetic manner. Many of them have already considered several claims for the additional allowance, and the applications, we notice, bave been granted in practically every case. This is as it should be, and we trust the same thing will be done in every single instance in which it is at all warranted by the facts. The

LECTURE ON THE PAPACY Brilliant and Instructive Discourse

By Very Rev Pather Thomas, A brilliant and instructive address on " The Papacy was delivered in the Limerick Catholic Literary Institute by Very Rev Father Thomas, O S F C. Hev J A C Common, Adm, St Michael's, presided, and there was a large attendance.

The Lecture

The distinguished lecturer, who was intro-duced by Father O'Couner, sketched in his usual elequent manner the institution of the Papacy by Christ, and dwelt on its miraculous development. That it was miraculous, he said, was evident to all intelligences not warped by perverse blindness. It was a phenomenon opposed by every known law of experience that a body of unlettered fishermen should implant religious belief hostlie to every cherished form of worship upon Imperial Rome and in Classic Greece. Having sketched the early persecu tions of the Christians and their life in the Catacombe, the rev lecturer depicted the rapid assertion of their faith the moment the foilowers of the Saviour were allowed to breathe the breath of freedom, and in a masterly summary of the history that led up thereto he des-oribed the symbolism of St Peter's in Rome. The majestic glories of St Peter's, he said, evidence the part played by the Popes in en-couraging all the arts. Here sculpture and painting have expressed their highest evolution. and despite the progress of the world in every avenue during the centuries since S Peter's fire flung its aureola around these adornments of civilication, neither genius nor wealth has ever dreamt of rivalling its triumphant ascendancy.
