"In the early stages of the war," remarks the Lander, "the German Government took sleps to conserve the wheat supply and the dark coloured leaf has been a familiar article for long in the diet of our Teutonic outpinents, and in that of our fellow-countrymen who are their unwilling greats. People here at home will now have a opportunity of sampling this class of food, bu it will not bear an exact resemblance to the G-rman war bread, as the regulations now giverning the milling of flour in this country are not so drastic, according to report, as those which prevail in countries where the Governments have been before-hand in legislation for the conserving of the wheat supply." Samples of the new bread have been baked in Limerick to the regulations recently issued, and we are informed that the new loaf differs but very slightly in appearance from the old. It is a little shade less white, and we understand that one would not readily detect the difference between the two except by a pretty close inspection and comparison of samples of The war bread, however, will be much more nutritious, and that, at all events, is a decided and badly needed improvement. The new Order will not, it is said, adversely affect either the millers or the public. "The head of one of the leading milling companies in Leinster," says the contemporary already mentioned, has stated that the new Order will involve little or no change as far as the working of the mills is concerned, and that it will in no way affect the number of employe's. The new Order would, of course, do away with the specialised fours of the past, but as the millers of the Appailing Floods United Kingdom were placed on a common basis in this respect, there was hardly room for individual complaints. The Order, he added was not so drastic as had been auticipated, and the new flour would not be the unsavoury article of diet which some people feared, but would produce wholesome and palatable bread.
