COUNTRY NEWS

Sligo, Dec. 28. About two o'clock last
Sunday morning a party of the Loyal Sligo
Volunteers, under the command of Captain
Barrett, made a secret excursion into that
part of this county called Mulloghmore,
where they apprehended, on information,
and conducted to this gaol, four villains,
charged with committing a rape on the body
of a poor servant girl in that place, whom
they decoyed into a still house on the night
of the first of November last, and after gra-
tifying their brutal inclination, most inhu-
manly murdered her, and buried her in an
old Danish fort.

The same party, in searching for the above
murderers, also apprehended and lodged in
gaol another most notorious offender, against
whom an indictment lies for plundering the
sloop Londonderry wrecked on that coast in
the month of February, 1780.

The alacrity and good conduct of the
command who went out on this occasion, I
deserve the highest praise; and it would be
injustice not to add how much the public are
indebted to Robert Lyons, Esq. (an honourary
member of the corps) who accompanied the
party, and through whose vigilance, and the
necessary informations he was obliged to give,
led to an effectual discovery of the above
perpetrators of the above shocking and hor-
rid crime, and the expedition used, that has
taken in the beds.

A detachment of 50 men with an Officer from
the 5th Regiment, went by boat yesterday morn-
ing to Kilrush, by an order from the Collector, in
consequence of the country people in that neigh-
bourhood, boarding a Portuguese vessel which put
in there by distress, and notwithstanding the exer-
tions of the several Officers, still continue pilun-
dering the cargo, consisting of wine, fruit and
salt.

A letter received this morning, by the Printer
hereof, from his Brother on board his Majesty's
ship Duke; after mentioning the taking of the
French transports by Admiral Kempenfelt, adds,
"That one of the French transports, armed
with 30 guns, on board of which was a small valua-
ble cargo, and a great number of soldiers, refusing
to strike, received a broadside from one of our
ships, which immediately sunk her, and every soul
on board perished, the sea running so high it was
impossible to give any assistance. He also men-
tions, that had the English fleet been but two days
farther to the southward, they must have fallen
in with a French fleet of 200 home-ward-bound
West-India-men, conveyed only by 3 ships of the
line, which that day got into Brest-harbour."

By the above letter, we have the satisfaction of
informing the Publick, that the whole loss sustain-
ed by Admiral Kempenfelt's fleet, did not exceed
three men wounded, one of whom had his leg shot
off.

The Tartar, Small, from this port to Glasgow,
is taken and ransomed for 850 guineas.
