by law established, and under such restrictions  
and limitations as are by the laws, now in  
force in this kingdom, provided for in cases  
of marriage between protestant and protestant

standing.  
And we pray it may be enacted, that the  
names of such persons as have taken and sub-  
scribed, or shall hereafter take and subscribe

purpose to be appointed by the said respec-  
tive courts, and that the said rolls, once in  
every year, be transmitted too and deposited

all courts of law and equity throughout the  
kingdom, as evidence of such persons having  
taken and subscribed the said oath of alle-  
giance and declaration, as fully and effectual  
to all intents and purposes, as if the roll  
in which the same was entered, were produced  
and that if any person shall forge or coun-  
terfeite, or procure to be forged or coun-  
terfeited, or willingly assist in the forging  
such person being thereof convicted  
to be deemed guilty of felony without the  
benefit of the clergy.  
And we pray it may be further en-  
acted, that the children of all such persons as  
hereof take and subscribe the said oath  
allegiance and declaration, being min-  
ors, as if they had taken and subscribed the  
same, for all minors, and may be lawful  
take and subscribe the said oath of alle-  
giance and declaration, so soon as he or she has  
attained the age of eighteen years.
