We, therefore, pray it may be enacted,

subscribe the said oath of allegiance and de-
votion, herein before men ored, in some
one of his Majesty's Four Courts in Dublin,
or at the quarter sessions of the peace for the
county of Dublin, or before any of the go-
ing Justices of assize, in open court, shall be
deemed or convicted to be a papist, within
the intent or meaning of any of the said for-
mer laws made in this kingdom against pa-
pists, or persons professing the popish religion
but that all such persons (save as herein af-
ter is mentioned and provided) shall to all
invents and curiosities, be freed, exonerated,
and exempted from all pains penalties, for-
feitures, disabilities, incapacities, and re-
strictions or impositions of the said former laws in-
professing the popish religion, or persons
all the rights, liberties, privileges and shall enjoy
munities to which any other of his Majesty's
Subjects are by the laws or constitution of this
kingdom in any wise entitl'd.

Penal always, that so long in the act
continued shall be construed & extend to en-
riching to fit in either Houses of Parlia-
ment, or to vote for members to sit in Par-
liament, or to hold any place of trust or pro-
mote under the Crown, or in any corporation
in this Kingdom, or to be admitted a Bar-
ister at Law, Attorney, Solicitor, or Six clerk,
or to act as an officer in any court of law or
equity.

Article 115. that nothing herein contained shall be construed to allow pupils, or persons professing the popish religion, to have a liberty of carrying arms, otherwise than as they may have been, or hereafter may be imposed, under the laws of the realm of King William the third intituled, "An act for the better securing the government by dissolving parishes," any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise.

And we pray it may be enacted, that from and after the said day of one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two, it shall and may be lawful for any protestant, or person professing the protestant religion, to intermarry with any person professing the papish religion, who shall have taken and subscribed the said oath of allegiance and declaration, without incurring any disability thereby, in as full and beneficial a manner, to all intents and purposes, as with any other of his Majesty's subjects, provided such marriage between such protestant and such person professing the papish religion and such person by a minister of the church be celebrated by law established, and under such restrictions to be in this kingdom, provided for in cases of marriage between protestant and protestant any thing contained in any act, statute or law to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding.

And we pray it may be enacted, by the names of such persons as have taken and subscribed, or shall hereafter take and subscribe, the said oath of allegiance and declaration, with their quality, condition, titles and places of abode, shall be entered upon rolls for that purpose to be appointed by the said respective courts, and that the said rolls, once in every year, be transmitted to the said officers in the rolls office of this kingdom, and deposited amongst the records, and that the proper officers of the records, and the said four courts, quarter sessions, and the said rolls office, shall grant certificates, under their hand, and indorsement, to all such persons who have already taken declaration, in which certificates the quality, condition, titles and places of abode of all such persons shall be particularly specified (for every of which certificates the sum of two shillings, and no more, shall be paid); which certificates shall be allowed in all courts of law and equity throughout this kingdom as evidence of such persons having taken and subscribed the said oath of allegiance and declaration, as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as if the same was entered, and that if any person shall forge or counterfeit, or procure to be forged or counterfeited, or willingly assist in the forging of such person, being thereof convicted, be deemed guilty of felony without the benefit of the clergy.

And we pray it may be further enacted, that the children of all such persons as hereafter take and subscribe, or thereafter take and subscribe the said oath of allegiance and declaration, being minors, as if they had taken and subscribed the same for all minors, of the popish religion, take and subscribe the said oath of allegiance and declaration, so soon as he or she shall attain the age of eighteen years.
