

The following article is copied from the Cork Courant of March 19. "We are loath to communicate the following important intelligence, from the authority of two officers, just arrived in this city from Liverpool, who say, that on Sunday last a packet bound for Falmouth, put into Liverpool (owing to her being chased by several vessels off Iceland) with the agreeable news of a junction having taken place between Sir G. B. Rodney and Sir S. Hood, and of their having had an engagement with the Count de Grasse, over whom they had obtained a decisive victory, by capturing 7 of his first rates, sinking 5 others, and destroying most of the remainder. Such is the confidence placed in the above information at Liverpool, that since its arrival, the ordnance from the different batteries have been intervals fired, and the account was immediately sent off express to Government."

The above important intelligence is confirmed by Captain Brown of the Duke of Lenster, arrived here yesterday from Liverpool, who says, that an Officer, charged with dispatches to the Admiralty, containing an account of that agreeable event, arrived there on Sunday last, in a brig from St. Christopher's, in 25 days, who immediately set off in a post chaise for London.

By the Prince Frederick, a Danish vessel, arrived at Cork in six days from Bourdeaux, we learn, that the day before she sailed the Voltigeant cutter had entered the Garonne in 21 days from Cape Francois, and brings letters as far down as the 20th of February, at which time the English garrison at St. Christopher had not surrendered to the Marquis de Bouille, but that news of that event was hourly expected at the Cape, as vessels from St. Christopher and St. Eustatia, daily come in. The Voltigeant confirms the capture of the English flotilla, from the Leeward Islands by the Spaniards. She also brings advice of the landing of a battalion of the regiment D'Auxerre on the island of Nevis, the inhabitants of which had submitted without resistance.

The Solebay frigate, Capt. Everett, was lost on the Shallows, off Nevis Point, the 25th of January last, but the crew were all saved.

His Grace the Duke of Buccleugh has, we hear, in testimony of his high esteem and reverence for the Volunteer army in this kingdom, enrolled himself as a private in the grenadier company of the Dublin regt. The Relations and Address of the ULSTER VOLUNTEERS, assembled at Dungannon on the nineteenth Day of February last, being read Paragraph by Paragraph.

Resolved unanimously. That we do most highly approve of those Resolutions and that Address, and that we will Co-operate with the Ulster and other Volunteer Corps of this Kingdom, in every Constitutional Mode of carrying the same into Effect.

That nine Delegates from the Corps here represented, (three to be a Quorum,) be and are hereby appointed, a Committee, until the next general Meeting, to Act at Occasion shall require, for the Volunteer Corps of this County and City, and communicate with the Ulster Committee, and the Delegates from the other Volunteer Corps, and to deliberate with them on the most constitutional speed, and effectual Means of carrying out Resolutions into Execution.
