Mr. Burke Secretary to the Treasury.  
Mr. Dunning to have the Seals, if the  
present Lord Chancellor resigns.  
Lord Townshend, it is said, is to have the  
Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.  
Lord North retreats from public business  
to the House of Peers with an Earldom in  
his own right; his father, Earl Guildford is  
to be created Duke of Kent, with remainder  
to the heirs general of his body.  
It is confidently reported, that within ten  
hours after the declaration made by Lord  
North of his Majesty's then Ministers, a sloop  
was dispatched with a fit and proper person  
to America, the errand on which he is gone  
may be easily guessed at.

The last Lisbon mail brought dispatches  
from Mr. Walpole, his Majesty's Ambassador  
at Lisbon, which are said to bring her most  
faithful Majesty's ultimatum relative to the  
Irish trade.  
Extract of a letter from Madrid, March 14.  
"The combined army at Minorca, is to  
reinforce the camp at St. Roche, in order to  
carry on the siege of Gibraltar with more  
vigour, and the Duc de Crillon is to be  
Commander in Chief."

**DUBLIN, March 30.**  
This day Messrs. Patrick and Co. and two  
other capital houses in this city, received an  
express from London, informing them of the  
capture of the islands of St. Kitt's, Nevis  
and Montserrat, by the French.

**Clanricarde Infantry.**  
At a numerous meeting of that truly inde-

What renders this expulsion more remarkable  
is, that the patriotic Anthony Daly was at  
the same time appointed Major of the Eyre-  
court volunteers; a signal instance, that even  
in this world virtue is its own reward; for  
an imagination form to itself a greater,  
than to see an individual, by doing his duty,  
acquire the love and approbation of a king-  
dom.

The British House of Commons have at  
last condescended to an act of legal justice to  
this country, by agreeing to take off the in-  
land excise upon Hops, when exported to  
Ireland. The inhabitants of this kingdom  
for two years past, have paid an additional  
duty upon all hops imported, in consequence  
of the solemn assurances of the Right Hon.  
John Foster, that this duty should then be  
equalized, by the excise being withdrawn in  
England. This is only one of the many af-  
surances that have been occasionally held out  
by the servants of administration, to lull the  
unsuspecting confidence of the independent  
part of the Commons, to grant additional

associations, as have not...  
the unanimous resolves of the Ennis Volun-  
teers, who met the 13th day of this month,  
which says—"That to postpone or evade  
such a declaration, is in effect to deny the  
right, and that to deny the right is basely to  
betray it." As a true touchstone of their  
principles.

The Amsterdam Gazette of the 12th inst.  
contains a translation of the address of the  
United delegates to the patriotic minority in  
the Irish House of Commons.

From the great quantities of camp equi-

Volunteer Camps will be seen the ensuing  
summer in several parts of Ireland, as our  
spirited independents seem desirous of being  
disciplined for every kind of duty.  
Extract of a letter from Sligo, to Mr. Chris-  
topher Dwyer, Secretary to the Hibernian In-  
surance Company against Fire.

"You will please to inform the gentlemen  
of the Hibernian Insurance Company, of  
your city, that last Tuesday came on to be  
tried here, the cause between them and Hen-  
ry Irwin, of Mount Irwin, in this county, dis-  
tiller, when after the most solemn investiga-  
tion of that matter, for 14 hours, before a  
very respectable jury, a verdict was given in  
five minutes in favour of the company, with  
full costs of suit; it appeared to the court and  
the jury that the demand was altogether un-  
just, and that the fire was not accidental, as  
the furniture which was represented to have  
been burned, was found concealed."

Kilkenny, March 27. On Saturday last  
one of the centinels placed on the county  
gaol, being irritated by some abusive lang-  
uage from the prisoners, fired through the grate  
among them, whereby three were wounded.  
He was tried by a court-martial, and senten-  
ced to receive 300 lashes for the above of-  
fence, which sentence was put into execution  
yesterday.

Last Tuesday a trial came on in the county  
court-house, before the Honourable Serjeant  
Wood and a most respectable jury, wherein  
D—P—, Esq; was plaintiff, and H—  
D—, Esq; of co. Wexford, defendant,  
on charge of crim. con. with the plaintiff's  
wife; when the jury, after a trial of six  
hours found a verdict for the plaintiff with  
300l. damages and cost of suit.

**LIMERICK.**  
Saturday Colonel Abercromby's new raised  
Corps of Irish Infantry, marched to Newcastle,  
where they were inspected by General Gabbett,  
who expressed his entire approbation of the mili-  
tary appearance of the Regiment, which at pre-  
sent consists of 700 men, and were entirely com-  
pleted in this kingdom.

Saturday Night there was a most violent storm  
of rain, which caused the river to rise higher than  
has been known for 30 years past; it overflowed  
the island, and the roan from Quinsborough, was  
quite impassable; a boat laden with brick coming  
up the river, in which were 5 men, overboard,  
one of whom was drowned.

Yesterday morning William M'Donnel, black-  
smith, was drowned at Parteen, in the humane  
endeavour to save the life of an unfortunate  
woman, who also perished by the uncommon  
height of the water, he was an honest industri-  
ous man, and has left seven small helpless  
children, and his wife big with child, who has  
now no prospect of support, but by the charita-  
ble contributions of the humane and benevolent  
Benefactions will be received by George Quin,  
Walter Widenham, Michael Rochford, Esham  
Vincent, and George Vincent, Esqrs.

Yesterday 14 cars, laden with 700 stand of  
arms, and accoutrements for the 103d Regiment,  
arrived from Dublin, under an escort of the 18th  
Light Dragoons.

This morning ten men charged with different  
offences in the co. Clare, were transmitted to En-  
nis; they were conveyed by a Captain's guard of  
the Loyal Limerick Volunteers, to Meelick,  
where they were received by a detachment from  
the County Clare Horse.

This day the Limerick Independents paraded  
at the Exchange, from whence they marched to  
the Assembly Mall, where their Colonel, John  
Prendergast, Esq; presented the Corps with a  
new and most superb band of Colours, after  
which they proceeded to George's Quay, where  
they fired three volleys with the greatest exactness.
