When his Majesty's respite went into New- gate early on Tuesday morning, for the five persons condemned for piracy, and ordered that morning for execution, the cells exhibi- ted a scene of awful penitence and prayer. When the Marshal of the Admiralty entered to announce the good tidings of a respite to Captains Ryan and M'Cator, they were found on their knees with a Roman Catholic Clergyman praying with them; and burst forth in exclamations of God bless the King, and God protect the Royal Family, &c. &c. and a thousand blessings were given to the mes- sengers. Two of the other poor men were singing psalms together; and Casey was no less penitential and grateful.

During the confinement of Captain Ryan and M'Cator in Newgate, they have behaved in a most exemplary and regular manner, and have been extremely helpful to many of their poor fellow prisoners, by cloathing and feeding those who were most distressed, naked, and hungry. Before they had received a respite, they had obtained the favour of not having their bodies exposed in chains, but to be given up to their friends for decent interment. The Supplement to the Gazette, contain- ing the capitulation, &c. of Trincomalee and Negapatam, came in this Night's Packet, but for want of room, is deferred till next post.

DUBLIN, May 25

Last night there was a general parade of the Volunteers in this city, to testify their satisfaction of the measures that seem to be the real intention of the present Ministry, to carry into effect for emancipation of the legislature of this long injured country. The success of the brave Rodney in the West Indies, and the capture of Ceylon in the East, gave the greatest pleasure to every Irishman who wishes to share the liberty and the fate of Britain. The thousands of our Volun- teers that poured from the Exchange, almost exceeded belief. His Excellency the Com- mander in Chief of the Volunteer army, at- tended by the Dublin and Rathdown Horse, with the Artillery, took place at the head of Dawson street, while the regiments of In- fantry were drawn up in the walks of the Green. At 9 o'clock Col. Calbeck's Artillery fired 21 rounds, which was answered by a compleat feu de joy from the Infantry. No- thing could exceed the brilliancy of the spec- tacle, while the troops lined the walks of the Green, as every house from the ground story to the roof were illuminated. The effigy of Lord L—ghb—the only dissenting voice of Ireland, was carried thro' this city, and burned, amidst the acclamations of a nume- rous and grateful people. The garrison pa- raded on the quays, and fired a feu de joy. The following, received by the masters of the guild of merchants, was on Thursday filed in the Royal Exchange. Dublin Castle, May 20, 1782

" Gentlemen, " I am commanded by my Lord Lieuten- ant to request you will inform the guild of Limerchants, that by a private letter from Lis- bon, dated the 25th of last month, his grace understands that a new book of rates was then just published at Lisbon, in which the article of Irish camblets is admitted, with a duty thereupon of 25 reis, equal to 7½ farthings Irish by the said bill. I am &c. R. FITZPATRICK."

The Mary of Liverpool, from Jamaica, but lost from St. Lucia, was spoke with on Thursday morning last off Hoylake, by the Lovely Peggy, Captain Sutherland, who re- ports, that Admiral Rodney and Sir Sa- muel Hood, after making temporary repairs, had pursued the French fleet, which were in a most shattered condition, and after much manœuvring, brought them a second time to action; wherein it is said, he proved entire- ly victorious — We hope a few days will con- firm these joyful tidings of triumph over our enemy.

LIMERICK.

In consequence of the Glorious News received last Week, an universal joy was diffused among all ranks of People. On Thursday Night the Loyal Limerick Volunteers, fired a Feu de Joy, and on Saturday, (on which day the Gazette ar- rived,) the Limerick Independents fired three volleys on the Mall, and at Night a Feu de Joy, the whole town exhibiting the most brilliant and general Illuminations ever remembered. Last Saturday arrived at Bay-castle, the Swal- low packet, Sober Hall, Esq; commander, from Bengal in the East Indies, with dispatches for the Hon. East India Company, which it is said, contain most interesting and agreeable intelli- gence, but the particulars have not yet transpired; he also has on board, a gold box, about a yard long, as a present from one of the Nabobs to his Majesty. A short time before they sailed, (which was 7 days after the Nymph sloop of war that arrived at Portsmouth) an account was received at Bengal, that Gen. Coote was taken suddenly ill at his camp. Col. Craford and some other Gentlemen are come home passengers in the packet. Mr. Hill acknowledges the receipt of 131. 17s. 6d. from the Reverend Doctor Conway, being collections made in some of his chapels, and also the sum of 3 guineas from himself, towards the support of the House of Industry.
