HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Thursday, June 20.

In a committee went through the bill re-
lating to the Highland dress.
Sir Henry Clinton took the oaths and his
seat for Newark.

The report from the Committee of supply
was read, and the House agreed to every re-
solution. The article relative to the pensions
of the refugees, called up Sir P. Clerke and
Sir Edw. Atley, who expressed their hopes
that some means would be adopted, to lessen
this list; that the names of the refugees would
be laid before Parliament, that the House
would judge who were worthy of support
from the public.

Mr. F. Montague said, that if the Trea-
sury were well acquainted with the nature of
the business, they would instantly give that
information; but the present Commissioners
were so young in office, that they were as yet
ignorant upon the subject; all he could now
say was, that the vote of 73,504 which had
passed the Committee, was to make good to
the civil list, a similar sum paid out of it to
the refugees. In future, care would be ta-
ken, to enquire strictly who were the refugees
that deserved support from Government, and
who were not.

Sir P. J. Clerke did not doubt this; but
there were some in that list, who, having
been formost in bringing on the American
war, ought to be punished more than ex-
cused.

The House went next into a Committee on
Mr. Graham's bill, for repealing the act
which prohibits the ancient Scotch dress in
the Highlands; Sir G. Elliot took the chair.

Sir P. Clerke observed, that upon reflec-
tion, and some information on the subject, he
would withdraw his opposition to the present
bill; the only opposition he intended to have
given it, was that that the Scotch might be
restrained from using the Highland dress in
England; and therefore he would not con-
sent that an act which (he thought) contain-
ed such a restriction, should be repealed, as
far as it related to a proper restriction.—

But as he found that the act which was to be
repealed contained no such restriction, as it
prohibited the dress in question only in the
Highlands of Scotland; and as the High-
landers might, by law, at present come in
their country dress into England, where they
might attack the wives and daughters of
Englishmen; the bill before the Committee
contained nothing to which he could reason-
ably object. The bill went through the Com-
mittee without any further observation.

Lord John Cavendish delivered his Maj-
esty's annual message for a vote of credit, to
answer the necessities or extraordinary cir-
cumstances of the State. The message was re-
ferred to a Committee.

The order of the day for going into a
Committee on Mr. Burke's bill was next
moved, but before the Speaker left the chair,
Mr. Pownall said, that after the
most gracious message from the Sovereign,
"that he would have no reserve with his
people," he had reason to expect the best
consequences in the public, if his Majesty's
Ministers would do their duty, which he be-
lieved they would.

Mr. Burke replied, that as far as it de-
pended upon him, he was ready to pledge him-
self to bring forward the objects alluded to
by his Hon. Friend; but he certainly would
not bring them forward without he had the
sense of the people; in the present he would
content himself with the bill then before the
House, and another for reforming the
office, which he would bring in a day or
two.

The House then went into a Committee on
the reform bill, Mr. Ewes in the chair.

The paragraph respecting the abolition of
the office of Lords of Justice in Scotland, was
agreed to; but Sir Adam Ferguson thought
that some provision ought to be made for the
Secretary to that Board; His office was for
life, and he purchased it for 2500l.

After some conversation, it was agreed,
that a general clause should be inserted, for
empowering the Lords of the Treasury to
hear all claims for a provision for the loss of
places for life; and to enable them, to make
such provision to them as should appear rea-
sonable and equitable. The Committee pro-
ceeded with the remaining paragraphs, and
adjourned.

DUBLIN, June 29.

Thursday sailed the Three Brothers ten-
der, with 65 gallant Irish Volunteers for the
sea service.

The last Lloyd's bill gives an account that
two 74 gun ships, belonging to De Grasse's
fleet, were routed, and were lost at Santa Cruz, which,
with the account from the London Gazette,
makes the whole ten ships of the line and

this respectable Society.

This day, Major Dubbs, Colonel Jones,
Major Francis Eyans, Secretary James Daw-
son, and Colonel Irvine, president, sailed
for England, to present the address to his
Majesty, unanimously passed at Rungannon,
on Friday the 21st inst. by the Delegates of
300 Volunteer corps. They will undoubtedly
meet a cordial and honourable reception at
St. James's on the great and happy business
of convincing their Sovereign, of the firm
attachment, affection and loyalty of so con-
siderable a party of his brave Irish subjects.

Cook June 27 Last Monday a Dutch
cutter of 12 guns and 60 men, was brought
into Kinsale, by the Lark sloop of war and

cutter's crew consisted of Americans, and
Dutch, the Captain and Officers were of the
former.
