Mr. Townshend presented papers relative to St. Eustatius, with copies of letters of instructions to Gen. Vaughan.

Ordered to lie on the table.

Mr Pelham brought in a bill, which was read the first time, for empowering his Majesty to purchase certain grounds adjoining to certain fortifications, in order that new works might be erected thereon; and for appointing commissioners to value the grounds to be so purchased.

The House then went into a Committee (Lord Althorpe in the chair) on Mr. Burke's bill for regulating the Pay office; and it was agreed that the blank for the day on which the bill was to commence, should be filled up with the words, " First day of January next

Mr Burke stated one particular saving that would accrue to the public by the regulations of this bill. The Paymaster of the forces, he said, might in his capacity of treasurer of the sea hospital, be deemed virtually a Colonel, in one respect, at least, for he enjoyed the profit arising from the contract for clothing the pensioners belonging to that Hos- pital.

His Predecessor, he observed, had enjoyed a profit of 700l. arising from this contract; and yet to do his Predecessor justice, he had not made a bad bargain for the public; but since he (Mr. Burke) had come into office, he made a new contract, upon much harder terms for the contractor; but as the contractor was not a Member of Parliament, but the person himself who was to furnish the clothing, he he was able to live by the contractor, and yet the public would gain 600l. more upon it than Mr. Rigby had gained; so that in fact both sums added together, there would be a saving upon the contract of 1300l. which saving, instead of appropriating to his own use, he would bring for the use of the public, to make part of the ways and means towards raising the supply.

The Committee having gone through the different clauses of the bill, without any debate, rose, and the House adjourned.

DUBLIN, July 1.

We hear that the Rev. Doctor King is prebated to the Dean of Kildare, vacant by the death of the Rev. Edward Ledwith,

that her Imperial Majesty the Empress of the Russias is determined not to involve her sub- ject in any war with any of the belligerent powers, let the issue of her mediatory nego- tiations turn out as it may.

By a private letter yesterday received by a respectable gentleman in this city it is posi- tively asserted, that five Spanish ships of war have been captured after an obstinate engage- ment, by the Admirals Lord Rodney and Hood. It is to be hoped that a confirmation of this agreeable intelligence will be announ- ced in the course of a few days.

Yesterday at the Commission of Oyer and Terminer, the following persons were tried & found guilty of robbing Mr. Ben. Haughton, at the corner of Marybone-Lane, the 29th of April last; John Wall, alias Jack the Smal- ler, John Murdock, James Ronney and Ber- naby Ledwith. The elder of the two last was no more than 15 years old, the younger about 13. On account of their extreme youth, they were recommended as objects of mercy.

At the commission of Oyer and Terminer, and general gaol delivery held for the city and county of Dublin, John Norke was found guilty of forging two drafts, in the name of Mr. Penrose of High Street, and uttering them to Messrs. Homan & Annelly. — John Corter, for burglariously breaking into the dwelling house of Mr. Dobson; and Ed- ward Curley, for a street robbery, were se- verally capitally convicted, and will on Satur- day receive sentence of death.

Kilkenny July 6. The 5th regiment of foot have received the route to march to Carlow next Monday morning, where they remain until further orders. The Mayor and Citizens and different Volunteer corps of this city, sent memorials to the Lord Lieutenant and General Burgoyne, commander in chief, requesting that this regiment should remain here for the ensuing year, in grateful testi- mony of their good conduct, and the union and harmony which subsisted between them and the inhabitants; but this request was not complied with, which is surprizing, as the volunteer corps expected such a compliment by their mounting guard on the prisoners of war, at the request of Government, during two different encampments of the regulars, and for their care and attention to that duty, received the thanks of Sir John Irwin, the late Commander in Chief.

We hear the Ennis Volunteers are to have a general field day at Tureen, within 2 miles of this town, on Sunday the 21st instant, and that they are to be met by the County Clare Horse, and the Inchiquin Fusiliers, in order to practice the plan of the Limerick review.
