to hear, that a regard for the honour of the
nation, and gratitude for the glorious beha-
viour of our brave garrison, have prevailed
with the majority of the Cabinet, and made
them resolve to send a most powerful fleet to
the Mediterranean; for this reason, as the
Jamaica fleet is safe arrived, Lord Howe is
to proceed immediately with 30 sail of the
line to Gibraltar, with orders to fight the
enemy if they should venture to oppose him,
in effecting the relief of that fortress.

Though his Lordship is to carry out 30
sail with him, he is not to bring back so ma-
ny; he is to detach eight ships to the West
Indies, in order to maintain that superiority
which Rodney gave us in that quarter of the
world, by his memorable victory on the 12th
of April. All the ships that can be got ready
during the absence of Lord Howe, are
to be employed against the Dutch, and to
sail for the Downs, the general rendezvous,
as soon as they can get men.

Lord Rodney on his arrival, which is ex-
pected in the course of a few days, means to
retire from the noise and the dangers to his
private estate in Hampshire, where he will
spend the remainder of his days in tranquility
and competence. The honours which he has
acquired will be allowed to flourish with un-
diminished lustre, when he is no longer an
actor of the scene, nor a competitor for fur-
ther appointments. Preparations have been
made for his reception, and within the last
fortnight his wines and liquors have been
laid on. May every gallant man, after such a
life of enterprise and service, enjoy the same
utrum cum dignitate.

A daily paper says, a person died lately at
his seat near Norwich, whose death-bed re-
pentance was a remarkable one. For some
time before his death he was in great agonies
of mind, and at last sent for a Clergyman, to
whom he confessed, that in his former busi-
ness of a wine-merchant, at London, before
he quitted trade, he made a fortune by re-
covering four wines with a preparation of it
he had done to many contrivances by this
practice, and the cruel death he had put
many persons to, he was sensible he had sent
many thousands to their graves! The Cler-
gyman was shocked with the account, and
considered it with so much horror, that he
gave no comfort. The man thought he saw
spectres, talked of nothing but ill, and ex-
pired in agonies of apprehension.

ESOLVED unanimously, That the fol-
lowing Addressee be presented to his Grace
the Duke of Portland, Lord Lieutenant Gen-
eral and General Governor of Ireland, by such
Gentlemen of the Provincial Committee as are
in Dublin.

"May it please your Grace,

"WE the Delegates of the Volunteer Corps
of the Province of Munster, embrace this
Opportunity of Expressing the entire satis-
faction we feel in the appointment of your
Grace to preside over the Government of
this Kingdom, being firmly convinced, that
the Virtues of our Sovereign will be no way
diminished when represented by one of your
Grace's distinguished political Principles and
private Excellencies. Permit us therefore,
to express our evident Wish that your Grace
may continue to Govern this Land, and to
accomplish that system of Commercial and
Political Liberty, which the dawn of your
Administration gives us reason to expect.
In order well this veneration for your
Grace's Character and Conduct, give us leave
to entertain the fixed hope, that the public
rumour of your Grace's speedy departure
from the Government of this Land, origi-
nated only in the apprehensions of trifles."

Resolved. (Sixteen Corps dissenting) The
annual standing review has been given to
the Association in the British House of
Lords, to apprehend a violation of the late
Compact between Great Britain and this
Country, yet such is our confidence in British
Honor, that we will not at present, suspend
our Exertions to raise the Twenty Thousand
Men Voted by the Irish House of Commons,
for the naval service of Great Britain.

Resolved, That when the Volunteer Asso-
ciations of the other provinces of Ireland de-
clared their entire satisfaction at the situation of
this Country, we agreed with them in all their
Sentiments of Loyalty Gratitude, and Affection;
but as our Constitutional Security, may be
affected by the present unsettled State of British
Councils, more particularly, as a Doctrine af-
fecting a power of external Legislation over
this Country, has been lately permitted to pass
uncontradicted in the House of Lords of Eng-
land, a Doctrine inimical to the Rights of Ire-
land, and which, if carried into execution,
would be a direct Violation of the late Compact
between Great Britain and this Country, we
therefore think it necessary to adjourn this
Meeting without any further proceeding; and
that the Provincial Committee be requested to
convene the Delegates, when it shall appear
expedient.
