Yesterdays arrived at Portsmouth, the fol-

Extract of a letter from Gibraltar, July 25.

"This being St. James's day, the patron
or tutelar Saint of Spain, the Dons, in ho-
nour of the day, saluted us with the most
infernal fire that we had received for many
weeks, but with little effect, as we had only
one Hanoverian corporal wounded; he had
his left eye struck out by a splinter of a stone,
as he was relieving the guard, which he ef-
fected, before, he went to be dressed. The
Hanoverians are fine soldiers, and submit to
the greatest fatigue without murmur.—
Our gallant Governor visits every post in the
garrison every night, unless prevented by
illness. The whole garrison was greatly
alarmed for him last week; he was four days
confined to his bed with a slight fever, occa-
sioned by fatigue, but thank God he is now
as well as ever, and making every necessary
preparation to give the Dons a warm recep-
tion if they should make an attack."

Should the Baltic trade be met by a part
of the Dutch fleet, which is generally feared,
it is supposed most of them will be captured,
as the convoy which escorts them is greatly
inadequate to its protection at this time.

The keel of the impregnable of 90 guns,
laid down in Deptford yard only 3 months
since, is to be ready to launch by February
next.

One principal bar and obstacle to the com-
pletion of any propositions from General
Carleton to Congress, are the terms to be
given the American refugees, of which there
are not less than 4000 or 5000, either in pay
as embodied men in America, or pensioned
in England; General Carleton contends,
that these unhappy people should be again
admitted into their country, and get their
confiscated property; but the Congress say,
that the restitution of their property is impos-
sible.

Ministry are much embarrassed as to what
shall be done for the American refugees, in
case of an accommodation with America. It
is said that a committee of three or four
men well acquainted with the affairs of Amer-
ica, will be appointed as a board to adjust
and regulate the salaries and pensions to be
paid them in future, some of which are
thought to be too exorbitant, and superior to
any losses these people have suffered, or the
property they possessed in America.

There is certain intelligence in town, that
the Majestueux, and another first rate of the
French fleet, were so leaky as to be obliged
to make for port; therefore, it will be im-
possibly for the French to give that assistance
to the Spaniards in their return to Cadiz,
which they afforded them in their voyage to
the channel.

D U B L I N, Aug. 15.

Capt. McCarty of the Adventure lugger
of this port, is just arrived in this Bay from
Charles Town, South Carolina, which place
he left the 13th of July with 35 passengers.
The Captain reports, that he was boarded on
Monday evening by a Lieutenant of a
frigate, commanded by Capt. Hardy, who
mentioned their having fallen in with Adm.
Barrington, who had taken a fleet of 35
sail of French transports, with 5000 troops
on board, bound for the East Indies, under
a convoy of a 74, a frigate, and a large ship,
armed en flute. They saw the Leeward Il-
land fleet on Tuesday evening, coming
North about. The Captain says, that the
weather had been very hot in South Carolina,
and the troops sickly; that Savannah was
evacuated, and it was expected that Charles
Town would soon be abandoned.
