

POSTSCRIPT.
(Friday's Packet—By Express.)

LONDON, September 6.
We are happy to inform our readers, that Government received dispatches on Thursday from Gen. Elliot of the most agreeable nature, respecting the state of Gibralter; the garrison being in high spirits, and amply supplied with provisions from Barbary. He concludes his letter by mentioning, that if he receives the supplies with the grand fleet, by the middle of October, he will bid defiance to the whole host of Bourbon for 18 months.

There are letters in town, from Faro, dated the 16th of August, which mention that Gibraltar is completely blockaded by sea, the number of men of war moored across the harbour being 14 sail, and ten or a dozen are cruising without them; of these number, 6 or 8 are French.

By a Portuguese vessel arrived at Plymouth, from Lisbon, we learn, that on the 22d ult. French merchantmen or transports, under command of 4 Frigates, it is supposed they were the latter, bound to America with troops from the Isle of Aix.

A report prevailed last night, that an express arrived over land from India, with disagreeable intelligence, but upon enquiry at the India House, we do not find that it deserves the India credit. The Directors are in daily expectation of the arrival of a packet from Madras, with dispatches from Admiral Hughes, giving an account of the late action with Mon. Suffren.

Accounts are received that the Dutch fleet were to sail from the Helder, the 27th of last month, consisting of 19 sail of ships, one of 75 guns, four of 68, five of 64, three of 60, two of 56, two of 48, and two of 38, besides Sloops, &c.

The French fleet which sailed for the East Indies from Brest the 20th of last month, consist of Le Protecteur of 74 guns, L'Actis 74, Le Dragon 64, armed en flote, Le Moniteur, a few frigates of 36, and Le Vaupon, of 26 guns, with six sloops.

It was yesterday reported, that Capt. Lipington, after being delivered to the American Army, was brought to a court-martial, tried and condemned.

An express was yesterday forwarded to Sir Charles Agil, brought over in the Gen. Carlton, with the agreeable news of his son's release, and that he was on his return.

Yesterday an express was received from Varna, with an account of the fleet under Admiral Milbank being off there on Monday afternoon.

On Saturday arrived in town from Madrid Col. Pringle, of his Majesty's 5th regiment of foot, one of the Officers left with the Spaniards, as a hostage for the safe return to Minorca, of all the transports which brought the garrison of St. Philip to England.

Extract of a letter from Portsmouth, Sept. 3. "The extraordinary accident at Spithead carried me down to the spot, and I have no doubt but the disaster was occasioned by carelessness, as the ship was beached beyond all former practice, and with all her guns out. Upon her being first perceived to go, an Officer ran up hasty to Capt. W and imparted his suspicions, who immediately ordered him to bring the ship. The Admiral's

The Humble Address of the GOVERNOR, HIGH SHERIFF, and GRAND JURY, of the COUNTY of LIMERICK, at Summer Assizes, 1782.

May it please your GRACE;

W HEN a Noblemen of your Grace's unsullied Character, Purity of Principles, and known Attachment to the Cause of Freedom, and of the Rights of Mankind, was called upon by your Sovereign to take upon him the Government of Ireland, we consider'd your Grace as the Harbinger of the Restoration of the Liberties of this long Oppressed and Neglected Country; — not have we been deceived in the Fondest Expectations we had formed of your Excellency.

Under your Grace's Auspices, we behold our Rights Asserted, and our Constitution Vindicated.—In the room of Jealousy and Discontent,—Satisfaction and Harmony prevail, and we are become United to our Sister Kingdom, by the only Ties which can render that Union Indissoluble. Common Interest, and Common Liberty, with their Necessary CONCERNANTS RECIPROCAL FRIENDSHIP, and MUTUAL CONFIDENCE.—

We should therefore deem ourselves wanting in our Duty to our Sovereign, and to our Country, did we not testify to your Grace, the great Respect and Gratitude with which we must behold a Chief Governor, who has been so highly instrumental in forwarding a Reviving, so essential to the Prosperity of Ireland, so Honourable to the Wisdom and Justice of Great Britain, and which in the End must prove Beneficial to Both Kingdoms. These are the incalculable Benefits which have marked the short Period of your Grace's Residence amongst us.

The choice your Grace has made of those whom you have honoured with your Confidence, and called to your Council, cannot fail to be as acceptable to the Nation, as it is demonstrative of the Purity of your Intentions, and the Wisdom of your Measures.—

How much therefore must we Revere that Chief Governor, who seems to have Consideration who are possessed of the Confidence of the People, as of Right entitled to his Office.

The Favour and Friendship of the Great Refugees of British Freedom, has already distinguished the Name of BENNINGTON, and our dear Country, when they reflect on the important Era of the RESTORATION of the RIGHTS OF IRELAND, must with an increased Respect, Honour and Reverence be intimately connected with it.—

They must ever look back with the warmest
