 THE following Resolutions were unani-
 mously agreed to:
 1st. Resolved, That we coincide with the Re-
 solutions entered into at the Dublin Meeting,
 on the 26th of Sept. last.
 2d. Resolved, That previous to the next
 Meeting of Parliament, we will present an Ad-
 dress to the Representatives for our County,
 stating our Grievances from the late Revenue
 Bill; and as any Law that Oppresses the
 Distiller, must in like Manner operate on the
 Farmer, we hold it the Duty of the Freehol-
 ders of this County, to Address their Repre-
 sentatives, praying a Repeal of said Act; and
 requesting their Endeavours in procuring a
 more equitable Law.

3d. Resolved, That since the last Revenue
 Act took place, we observe the daily increase
 of private Distillers in most Parts of the Coun-
 ty, to the great Disadvantage of such of us as
 cannot avoid Distilling for some Time, having
 Cattle, Grain, &c. on Hands, and that we
 are determined to give the Excise Officers in
 our different Districts, every Assistance in our
 Power, to have the Laws against private Dis-
 tillers executed with the utmost Rigour, if
 they do not desist before the 20th of Nov.
 next, and as we do not wish any Gentleman
 on whose Lands such Persons live, should in-
 cur the Penalties which such Prosecutions
 would subject them to, and Request that they
 will oblige this our Resolution.

4th Resolved, That in future we will not
 employ any Factor in the City of Limerick,
 who will receive Spirits from an Unlicensed
 Distiller.
 5th. Resolved, That these our Resolutions
 shall be published in the Dublin Evening Post,
 Clonmell Gazette, and Limerick Chronicle.
