DUBLIN, Nov. 30.

General Gates died about two months since, as did his Lady, and Son, who was a very promising and rising military genius. The General died without a will, and his effects go to the next of kin.

Notwithstanding the mildness of the season, and the daily arrival of large quantities of coals, yet by mismanagement they are kept up to the enormous price of 24s per ton; this ought surely to induce the people of this country to raise coals for their own consumption.

Such is the present untoward state of politics on this side the water, that positive orders have been issued from one of the highest departments in the Castle, that no new arrangements whatever should take place, as they could not be consistent of the present Viceroy remaining here another fortnight.

What will the babblers in favour of our free constitution, as largely established by simple laws, say now, in defence of their doctrine, when the week before last, Lord Mansfield, Chief Justice of the King's Bench, in England, absolutely and solemnly decided upon an Irish Appeal, lodged in that Court.

Notwithstanding the repeal of the 6th of Geo. I. notwithstanding Mr. Grattan's act to set aside the writs of error from the King's Bench here to the King's Bench in England, Lord Mansfield, in the case of *Hall v. Maganiff* Law, has had the presumption to entertain a writ of error and to decide upon it.

A positive answer is received at the Castle, respecting the meeting of our Parliament, that for reasons (which it is said, if publicly known would in all probability increase the alarms of the kingdom, is justly awakened, by the late proceeding on a writ of error from Ireland in the King's Bench in London) the Irish Parliament is not to meet the ensuing Spring, nor will the present Parliament ever meet again.

His Majesty's letter is arrived for placing the 10th regiment of foot, or volunteers of Ireland, commanded by Lieut. Col. Commancheur Lord Rawdon, upon the military establishment of this Kingdom from the 1st of Oct. to last.

Resolved, That we Address the Representatives of this City in Parliament, to be Vigilant in forwarding an explicit and unequivocal Bill of Rights in this Kingdom, that we may avert (as far as in us lies) the Possibility of being upbraided by Posterity for leaving unfinished, a just and Glorious Work, so nearly completed; and thereby preventing the fatal Consequences that may ensue, by leaving our Constitutional Rights undetermined, and therefore unsafe.
