

A letter from Ostend says that the corn vessels from Diestwick, bound for London, are ordered to remain in that port till further orders, on account that there are no warehouses to receive the cargoes.

The draught that was ordered to be made from the three regiments of foot guard, is suspended till further instructions are given from the War-Office on that head.

All the efforts of the States of Holland to appease the popular disgust on account of the war, have hitherto failed of their desired effect; and the last letters assert, that the murmur of the people, arising from the loss of trade, of the intolerable burthen of taxes, had risen, and an alarming sight, that an insurrection is to be, but for the very timely interference of the King of Prussia, in support of the authority of the Prince of Orange.

### D U B L I N .

The Parliament of the Kingdom, which stood prorogued to the 23d inst., is further prorogued to the 25th of March.

The number of appeals to the Irish House of Lords which now lie over in account of the further prorogation of Parliament, is a matter of vast moment, and in which the interest of many individuals is most deeply interested.
