Extract of a letter from Antwerp.

"The workmen are employed without intermission in fabricating 10,000 tents. All the companies of Infantry in the Austrian Low Countries are augmenting from 100 to 150, and even to 200 men; and those of the Cavalry are also increasing in proportion."
