

POSTSCRIPT.

This Night arrived Three British PACKETS, From the LONDON GAZETTE.

Whitehall, March 4.

THE King has been pleased to grant the dignity of a Baron of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Hon. Francis Rawdon, (commonly called Lord Rawdon) and the heirs male of his body, by the stile and title of Baron Rawdon, of Rawdon co. York. Also the dignity of a Baron of Great Britain to the Right Hon. Thomas Townshend, and his heirs male, by the stile and title of Baron Sydney, of Chislehurst co. Kent. Also the dignity of a Baronet of Great-Britain to Lieut. Gen. John Dalling, of Burwood co. Surrey, and his heirs male.

L O N D O N, March 4, 5, & 6.

The reports of the Duke of Portland succeeding Lord Shelburne, was revived this morning; and his Lordship is said to have gone to the Treasury to make a final adjustment of his official business.

It is also reported that Lord Thurlow has resigned the Seals, and is appointed Premier, at the express desire of the King.

Lord Howe continues at the head of the Admiralty, as Lord Keppel retires.

Last night an express arrived from Plymouth, with an account of the arrival of a vessel from Philadelphia.

Orders were yesterday sent to Gen. Faurel in Hanover, to stop his progress in raising troops for foreign service, in Germany.

Letters from the West Indies mention, that Admiral Pigot was cruising off Old Cape Francois, to prevent the Squadron under M. D'Estaing from joining the force already at the Cape. From the arrangement Pigot had made, it is said D'Estaing could not get to the Cape, without engaging the British Squadron.

Two Dutch ships from Flushing arrived yesterday morning in the river, and made entries of their cargoes at the Custom-house.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Monday, March 3.

The Secretary at War moved, that the estimates of the ordinary expences of the army should be referred to a committee of supply.

No Member replying but Mr. Hartley, who opposed the motion, the question was put.

Against it ————— 10

The Secretary then moved, that 647,145*l.* 1*s.* 3*d.* be granted for the subsistence of the foreign troops in our pay for 120 days, dating from the 24th of December last.

Whereupon a conversation took place concerning the provincial corps in North America, which the Secretary at War said were to be put on the establishment. This did not meet the approbation of Sir P. Clarke, as the officers in these corps, he said thus became entitled to rank in the army, and to half pay.

Mr. Secretary Townshend said, it was but just that those men who had fought our battles, and risked life and fortune for us in the present war should have half pay. There were only three of these corps, Col. Tarleton's, Col. Simcoe's, and Col. Fanning's, and the last of these Gentlemen had served since the year 1777, at the head of four different regiments.

LIMERICK.

Sir H. HARTSTONGE in the Chair.

Resolved, that in September 1781, the sum of 18*l.* 15*s.* 1*d.* was due to this charity, and remained in the Treasurer's hands, and a balance of upwards of 20*l.* appears to be now due to him; that from a return of the bedding, and linen in the House, it appears not sufficient to accommodate properly half the objects therein.

Resolved, that from the above state of this Charity, an application be immediately made to the Lord Bishop of Limerick, that he will be pleased to order charity sermons to be preached, pursuant to act of Parliament, throughout this diocese for the benefit of this Charity. The public is earnestly requested to consider, that from the increasing expences of this House, and the numbers still applying to be admitted, this House cannot be supported, unless the funds are increased by charitable contributions from the public.

Resolved, that a return of last year's charity sermons be laid before the Bishop, and that until the produce of the next sermons be known, the Governors and Governesses be requested to be sparing in recommending any objects, the number in the House at present being 203.

Resolved, that as the late and present very distressed times have brought a great number of beggars into this City, many of whom, tho' strangers, have from motives of humanity been admitted into this House, the Governors are determined to badge the real objects of the City and Co. of Limerick, and to send home the natives of other Counties, to be punished if found to return here, the Governors being extremely anxious to lessen by every prudent means the number of Poor in our streets.

Resolved, that the proceedings of this day be advertised in all the Limerick newspapers.

Resolved, that the thanks of the Governors be given to the Rev. Francis Hewson, for his charitable offer of acting as assistant Chaplain to this House, and that he be elected a Governor of this Corporation.
