

speech indeed, which was very little understood. The General spoke so low, and besides stood under the gallery, by moving, that a list of the Officers' names, of the rank they held in the army before their appointment to such corps, and a copy of the stipulations on which they had been raised, should be laid on the table.

Sir Cecil Wray seconded the motion; he felt it extremely proper, and, in his opinion, the letters of service were the criterion by which those corps should be provided for. If they were entitled to be put on the British establishment by their original stipulations, certainly they ought to be put on it; if, on the other hand, it was a matter of favour to those corps, or the Officers of them, that partiality notwithstanding their merits, might perhaps operate to the disadvantage of the service; and he would wish not to be considered by his support of the Hon. General's motion, to fall within the description given by his Hon. Friend (Mr. Hussey) on a former debate, that those who had said nothing, had been for the Loyalists by the provisional articles, and had exclaimed against Ministers for it; when they found that any thing was done for them, were equally discontented. He said, for his part, he was influenced by no motive but one; that he considered the service might be injured by it, and he would, as much as any other man in the House, rejoice to see the Loyalists provided for.

General Conway said it was impossible for him to follow the Hon. Mover of the motion; he would only observe that the distinguished exertion of the five corps who had been rewarded for their uncommon gallantry, by being put on the establishment, was so universally known, as well in this country as in every other corner of Europe, that he could not, without surprize, hear the least discontent at it. The General explained all their different claims to such a distinction, and when he would mention the names of Dalrymple, Simcoe, Tuleton, Panning, &c. he trusted their deserts were sufficiently acknowledged, to warrant what had been done for them. The General made some further observations, and said if he had known the cause of the motion, he should not feel any objection.

The Secretary at War could not learn from what had fallen from the Hon. Mover, what principles his motion was founded on, and like his Hon. Friend, if he did not think something private was the motive, he should feel no objection; however, if it was the wish of the House, he had nothing material to oppose to the motion.

A short conversation took place, and the motion passed without a division.

Friday, March 14.

Mr. Fox gave notice to the House, that he would on a future day move an address to his Majesty, that he would be graciously pleased to give up Gibraltar, on obtaining an adequate return for it.

Sir Cecil Wray moved, that an humble address be presented to his Majesty, praying that he would be graciously pleased to order a copy or extracts of all letters from the Commander in Chief, the Secretary at War, or any other of his Majesty's Ministers offering half-pay, or any other encouragement to the regiments, or

war establishment of the army, that were in April; and as this bill was to regulate that army, it was intended it should be in force only to the said period. In the mean time the estimates for a peace establishment would be laid before parliament, and then a new mutiny bill would be brought in, to regulate that peace establishment. This bill differed also from the last, as it made no provision for the Government of troops in Minorca, because that island was no longer our's. He observed that the bill must be passed without delay, as the mutiny act would expire on Monday fortnight, with respect to England, though it would be in force till the year 1784 with respect to troops in the plantations, and till the month of May next with respect to the forces in Jersey and Guernsey.

The Bill then passed through the committee without debate, after which the house adjourned.

DUBLIN, March 22.

It seems that the crops of wheat in America have been uncommonly fruitful, and that very large cargoes of it may be expected to arrive in the river in the course of a month, which will afford the poor at this time of scarcity, a seasonable supply.

A letter from a respectable quarter, by yesterday's packet, says, that our excellent Viceroy is left at full liberty to remain in his Government, or resign it, by the new Ministry; if he retires, his Grace of Devonshire succeeds him.

The Parliament of this kingdom, which stands prorogued to Tuesday the 25th instant, is further prorogued to Tuesday the 6th day of May next.

This day Mary Purfield was strangled and burned, at Gallows-green, near Kilmainham, for setting fire to and destroying the house and offices of Mr. Morgan, at Blancherstown. It is said, that the provocation given to this unfortunate woman to commit this dreadful outrage was near four years since, all which time she waited for an opportunity to be revenged, which she at length too successfully met with.

We are just intorined, from indubitable authority, That Earl TEMPLE is positively to relinquish immediately his Government, for his departure was ordered this day, at twelve o'clock. A piece of intelligence that we are certain, must sensibly afflict every true Irishman.

A handsome star, neatly sculptured, and silvered, representing that of our Irish chivalry, is erected in the Castle, at the east end of St. Patrick's hall, under the gallery.

A new coinage of halfpence is commenced at the Tower of London; they are of the present year, and larger than any yet struck off. A new silver coinage will also soon be begun.

A Meeting of Delegates from numerous corps was lately held at Belfast, to determine on a review for the ensuing summer, and to elect a General. They have accordingly resolved to have an encamped Review on the plains of Broughshane, about 20 miles from Belfast, and have again honoured Lord Charlemont to command at the grand exhibition.
