Sligo, March 31. Wednesday, a well-dressed man was found dead on the great mountain Westward of Coolany, about eight miles from hence, by two boys who were herding cattle. — His eyes were picked out, supposed by the ravens, and his face greatly disfigured, his body in a very putrid state, the part of his cloaths next the ground quite rotten, and his person not known; there were found in his shoes a pair of silver buckles, and in the pockets of his furtout two shirts and three pair of stockings. It is imagined that he was a traveller, and had been crossing the mountain to or from Ballina, and being a stranger, missed his way, and unfortunately perished through fatigue and the inclemency of the night.—From the above circumstance, there is reason to suppose that he had lain there a long time, and that neither his relations or friends reside in this part of the country; therefore, as they may be in search of him, we publish such particulars as we could collect of his unhappy fate, with a view of the leading to a discovery.—The body was decently interred in the next church-yard, by the Country people.

Kilkenny, April 4. Monday J. Downes and Thomas Broderick, otherwise Brooder, were capitally convicted in the county court of feloniously committing a rape on Elizabeth Kear-

their beds, and to convey them to prison without interruption from the lawless mob that is known to infest that quarter; but while the Volunteers were taking some refreshment and rest at Broadford, those were apprized of their intention and approach; however, they caught one prisoner in bed, whom the alarm did not reach; by this time the other rioters with horns and shouts, assembled their clans on the mountains, who were armed with pitchforks, swords and stones, (which their women supplied) attacked the Independents on their return, after a fruitless search, accompanying their onset with loud yells, and expressions of rage and barbarity. The small, but gallant party, undismayed at their menacing gestures, and the vast superiority of hundreds to twelve alone, were present to themselves in this hour of danger; and though stones were poured on them from the hills, secured their retreat, brought off their prisoner, killed one, and wounded numbers of the assailants, who at last dropped the pursuit, after having continued it for four miles. To perfect the public satisfaction on this occasion, none of the Independents were materially hurted. Such proper and determined conduct; such spirited exertion for the internal peace of the kingdom does infinite credit to the Volunteer Cause. The inhabitants of the county of Clare, will, no doubt, be much rejoiced at this event, which it is hoped for the honour and prosperity of that County, will animate others to a similar zeal for the improvement of its police.
