To perfect the public fairfaction on this occasion, none of the Independents were materially hurted. Such proper and determined cooduct; fuch spirited exertion for the internal peace of the kingdom does infinite credit to the Volunteer Caule. The inhabitants of the county of Clare, will, no doubt, be much rejoiced at this event, which it is hoped for the honour and prosperity of that County, will animate others to infimilar zeal for the improvement of its police.
