

A private letter from the Buffalo on Saturday, says, that fresh orders issued there that no more ships of the line should be put out of commission, but that there is to be at that port, and at Plymouth, some men of war, and frigates, kept ready to put to sea on any emergency.

On Thursday evening a quarrel arose between some of the crew of the Buffalo man of war and the Hyzra frigate at Woolwich, upon a desperate battle ensued, in which three of the Buffalo's men had each an arm broke, and some of the Hyzra's men were terribly bruised. On Friday they landed, in number upwards of 100, armed with bludgeons, pokers, &c. and paraded the streets, threatening revenge on the Hyzra's people if any came on shore in the evening. The Cook's Mate went on shore, and was killed by them. On Saturday all was quiet; but on Sunday evening a party of both ships met at the Jolly Tar, a Public-house, near the Church, when they renewed the action, and six of the Buffalo's people were so much bruised that they are not expected to live; and ten of the others are taken on board the Hyzra sorely bruised. Two of the ringleaders are in irons on board the Hyzra.

A man has lately been broke upon the wheel in Languedoc, for various acts of lust, Barbarity, and murder. This monster, who had retired at the age of twenty-two to the mountains of Aure, always went armed, and was the terror of the neighbourhood. He is said (Gazette des Tribunaux, Paris) to have spared neither man, woman, nor child, and to have eaten the flesh of those he had put to death. He was a very strong, dark complexioned man, and extremely vicious, particularly with regard to women, from his earliest infancy. He was executed the 12th of December, 1782, and went to execution with a very serene countenance. They speak of upwards of eighty women he had first ill-treated, and then eaten.

**DUBLIN, April 15.**  
We are assured that a Volunteer Corps in the North of this Kingdom, lately sent a Sword as a Present to Congress, with this Inscription: "SUN LIBERTATIS."

A few days since his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant ordered the several books or accounts &c. of the Court of Chancery to be laid before him. In consequence of this investigation, we hear, that one of the Masters of that Court absconded from this city on Monday last, and has not since been heard of. The sum deposited in his hands, upon Chancery suits, which he appears to have made away with, is very considerable, and will fall heavy on the respective suitors. He had privately conveyed away all his effects from his house before he left Dublin.

The examination of the Chancery accounts has proved a second Barrack-board business. Earl Temple's unwearied labours at this moment prove more than any thing, his disinterested zeal for the service of Ireland, and shew that though he has already sent over his resignation, yet he has not discontinued his services to this country; but means to exert them for the detection of frauds, and bringing plunderers to justice to the last moment of his departure.
