labour.—Thomas Hewson, for breaking a Bar
of Iron, to be publicly whipped.—And Tim
Carty, for breaking into the wine-cellars of
Hugh Gough, Esq; to be imprisoned one year.
The Bellies in the County, is not yet over.

turday last, from Mr. James Russell.
