some Wool; all to be confined 3 years to hard  
labour.—Thomas Hewson, for stealing a Bar  
of Iron, to be publicly whipped.—And Tim  
Carthy, for breaking into the wine-cellar of  
Hugh Gough, Esq; to be imprisoned one year.  
The Business in the County, is not yet over.

Mr. Hill acknowledges the receipt of five

Rev. Mr. Wardlaw, in aid of the Charity Ser-

turday last, from Mr. James Russell.
