

fed at the situation in which he was in some priety of a borough, where he was in some measure, self-elected, he declared, however, he was ready to sacrifice his franchise, provided no attack should be made on the other boroughs. He said that the borough influence was not without its merit; it had opposed the influence of the counties, when the Knights of the Shire attempted to carry the influence of the democracy too far, and build an unconstitutional power on the ruins of the monarchy; he should however be sorry to see the influence of the Crown for great in that House, as that the former could protect and keep in office, in spite of the people, bad Ministers whom they justly and properly wished to have removed.

Mr. Byng said he certainly wished for much more than the resolution proposed to give; but since he could not get all he wanted, he would take what he could get, and therefore he would vote for the resolution of the Right Honourable Gentleman. He had this day presented a petition to the House, signed by several thousand inhabitants of the Eastern part of London, called the Tower Hamlets; they paid near 3,000l. a year to the land-tax, which amounted to very near 2,000l. a year more than the whole county of Cornwall pays; and yet the latter sends 44 Members to Parliament; while the Tower Hamlets do not send one.

Lord Mulgrave spoke against the resolution, and said he would vote for the order of the day.

Lord North began by declaring that he would vote for the order of the day; as to the first of the resolutions, which had actually been moved, it was totally unnecessary, as there were then depending in the House two bills, one brought in by a noble Lord (Mahon) for the express purpose of preventing bribery and expenses at elections. He said that it was with a wife and prudent view, that innovations in the constitution should be attempted, and would lay it down as a maxim, that innovations ought to be first exhibited of the evil complained of. He himself, he said, exhibited in his own person a refutation of a million of such proofs as he had heard advanced; for he was at once the proof and the victim of the power of Parliament. Rejecting therefore, as he did, the idea that such an evil existed as was complained of, it was no wonder that he opposed any innovation founded on a chimerical apprehension. There were in England and Wales fifty-two counties, and yet there were petitions from no more than fourteen. The petition from the county of York; great and extensive as it is, contained only 6000 names; the petition from the county of Suffolk was signed only by the Sheriff; he was ready to admit that this was a proof that the Sheriff of Suffolk wished for a
