

of your regard and affection.  
The most acceptable part of my duty, is the report which I shall be enabled to make to his Majesty of the loyalty and affection of his faithful Irish; and I shall state with real pleasure, the sense which his Roman Catholic subjects have shewn, of the blessings they enjoy, which are so much due to their attachment to his person, and his happy constitution.

May the same spirit of liberal toleration secure the internal happiness of Ireland, by encouraging that obedience to the laws, that social union, and that system of industry, which I trust, are equally the religious and civil duties of every subject of this kingdom.

On Tuesday the 6th inst. the Congress of 250 Tons, William Cooevers, Master; and on Wednesday the 7th, the Hibernia, Thompson, sailed from Newry to Philadelphia, with most valuable Cargoes of Linen, Woollen, and other goods of Irish manufacture: This intelligence must give sensible pleasure to every lover of his country; but what throws a disagreeable shade on the picture is, that no less than two hundred people of property, and Manufacturers who paid for their passage, have emigrated in these vessels, and gone to reside with their families in America.

Departing Viceroys, for time immemorial, left this country with those feeling marks of their regard for its best interests, that succeeding generations bore the most ample testimony of their zeal for humble friends and prostrate followers, the Irish pension-list groaned under the successive burthens of venal Chief Governors and corrupt Senators—After the most minute enquiry, not a trace of this infamous traffic can be discovered to shame the revered name of Temple—not a pension granted—not an useless place created—but an act enrolled in the first year of Ireland's independence, that after ages will venerate with gratitude. Lord Temple has positively stipulated with the Admiralty of England, that that intelligent seaman and active commander, Capt. M'Bride, of the Artois frigate, attended by two cutters, should make an actual survey of all the coasts, bays, and harbours, with the cod fishing-banks, &c. &c. on the north-west coast of Ireland.

Letters from Havre and other western ports of France advise, that fifty vessels on that coast were preparing to resume the mackerel fishery in June next on the coast of Ireland. It is extraordinary that we still obstinately neglect our summer fisheries though they are so advantageous, that of the fish (mackerel) caught by the French upon our coast there was upon an average, yearly before the war, 6000 barrels sold in France. Even Spanish vessels from Biscay and Galicia are employed: but Dutch boats are almost numberless; who all come to possess themselves of the wealth our seas contain, and which from blindness or indolence we refuse to avail ourselves.


