ave, for many months past, strongly urged the meeting of our Parliament; yet we still see it procrastinated to a moment that shall best answer the schemes of a ministerial junto. What reason can now be urged, why Ireland should not be indulged with annual Parliaments as well as Great Britain?

A correspondent who is firmly convinced in general of the spirit, wisdom and attention of his countrymen, would ask them, nevertheless, whether the insult so tamely suffered from the Portuguese still refusing to admit our manufactures to their markets, can be considered in any other light than that of a national reflection. The Americans nobly entered into a resolution, not to drink tea, when it was attempted to be crammed down their throats. Why should Ireland encourage the trade of Portugal, by drinking her port, when she shuts out our commerce. We have plenty of liquors, and several of our own with which we might well be content, till such time as the ungrateful Portuguese were brought to their senses, by our refusal to drink their wine, or even to admit their ships into our ports.

The harmony that has always subsisted between the Military and Volunteers never appeared more engagingly pleasing than previous and during the Review. The Dublin Light Infantry, who mounted at the Exchange on Saturday to receive the corps as they arrived from the country, turned out to salute the Castle Guard in the morning, which was returned in a proper manner by the military.
