

On the morning of the 21st, having two batteries ready to open on them, and a third, which, though not complete, could have annoyed them greatly, besides two galleys with 20 four-pounders, I gave his Excellency once more an opportunity of saving the lives of his men from the horrid consequences attending a work being carried by storm. Upon which his Excellency surrendered the garrison.

"Yours, &c. A. DEVEAUX."

Articles entered upon between Don Antonio Claraco Saiz, Governor of the Bahama Islands, &c. and his Honour Andrew Bontour, Colonel and Commander in Chief of the Expedition.

Article 1st. The Governor's house and public stores to be delivered up to his Britannick Majesty.

2d. The Governor and garrison under his command, to march to the Eastern Fort, with all the honours of war, remaining with two cannon and two shots per day, with permission to hoist his Catholic Majesty's flag. Provisions for the troops, sailors, and sick in the Hospital, are to be furnished at his Britannick Majesty's expence, as also vessels prepared to carry them to the Havannah, and a vessel to carry the Governor to Europe.

3d. All the Officers and troops of the garrison belonging to his Catholic Majesty are to remain in possession of their haggage and other effects.

4th. All the vessels in the Harbour belonging to his Catholic Majesty are to be given up, with every thing on board the said vessels, to his Britannick Majesty.

5th. All effects appertaining to Spaniards to remain their property, and the Spanish Merchants to have two months to settle their accounts.

6th. His Excellency, with the troops under his command, to pile their arms precisely at four o'clock, between the fortification and the pickets, after which his Excellency will march out 300 paces without the pickets, and halt the troops, until the British troops take possession of the garrison, after which an Officer will be sent to conduct them to the Eastern Fort, where the Officers and troops will observe the conditions specified in the 2d article.

On Sunday evening last, between eight and nine o'clock, the prisoners confined in the county goal for various felonies, twenty in number, were discovered by Mr. Holmes, gaoler, endeavouring to effect their escape: On a close inspection it was found that many of them had sawed off their bolts, and had nearly undermined the condemned hole, from whence they would, had they not been so fortunately discovered, have all enlarged themselves in less than an hour—Mr. Holmes had them immediately located, and seized a number of iron crowes, files, saws, chisels, &c. with which they had been furnished by Mary Canfield, (one of the prisoners wives) and others. This is the second attempt of the kind that has been discovered and defeated within three months, by the vigilance and attention of Mr. Holmes.
