Cork, September 3. By two vessels arrived  
here last Friday from New York and the West  
Indies, our correspondents from New York,  
and St. Jago de la Vega, have favoured us with  
News-papers to the 21st of July, from which  
we have taken the following.

Kingston, July 5. General Robertson, Go-  
vernour of New York, with a number of Bri-  
tish Officers from thence, arrived at Port-  
smouth, in the Hussar, the 14th of May.

Letters from India, dated the 24th of Janu-  
ary, received the 10th of May, over land, an-  
nounce an action to have happened in Decem-  
ber, between Col. M'Leod, and Tippoo Saib,  
in which the latter was entirely defeated with  
a considerable loss; that of the Company's  
forces being very trifling. The letters also  
mention the storming of Onore, by General  
Matthews, the 5th of January, in which the  
Killidar and 1200 men were made prisoners,  
and near 300 killed and wounded. Sir Rich-  
ard Bickerton had arrived at Bombay the 28th  
of Nov. with five ships of the line; and about  
the middle of December Admiral Hughes in  
the Sultan, with the eight ships of his Squadron,  
had returned thither, having been blown out of  
Madras Road in a gale of wind, which had  
dimasted the Superbe, then the flag-ship.  
Three other ships had been left at Goa to refit.  
The French Squadron, had suffered consider-  
ably in the same gale of wind; one was  
wrecked, and the rest gone to Adheen to refit.

His Majesty's packet-boat Grantham, Mr.  
Charles Oaite, master, sailed from Port Royal  
on Tuesday, with the mails for Great-Britain.

New-York, July 16. Last Saturday sailed  
for England, his Majesty's ship Nonuch, of  
64 guns, commanded by Capt. Trufcot, in  
which were passengers the Lady and family  
of the Hon. Andrew Elliot, Esq; Lieutenant-  
Governour of New-York.

The same day sailed the Eohn transport,  
having on board as passengers, Harry Burrard,  
Esq; member of the British Parliament for  
Lynnington, and John Rotton, Esq; both Cap-  
tains in the 60th regiment; the latter Aid de  
Camp to his Excellency General Sir Guy Carle-  
ton.

On Monday failed the Swallow Packet,  
Capt. Green, for Falmouth;—and yesterday  
likewise failed his Majesty's ship Garland, of  
24 guns, commanded by Capt. Calcot; in her  
Maurice Morgan, Esq; Secretary to his Ex-  
cellency General Sir Guy Carleton, went pas-  
senger.

Yesterday embarked for Bremerlehe, in  
Germany, the 3d regiment of Waldeck, com-  
manded by Lieutenant-Colonel Horne, the Free  
battalion of Hesse Hanau, the Corps of Anhalt  
Zerbst, and the Anspach Yagers.

The same day arrived his Majesty's sloop of  
war the Hornet, from St. Mary's river in East  
Florida.

The Hornet sloop, Captain Francis Tindley,  
with the Magicienne, brought back under  
their convoy from Jamaica, a number of Loyal  
Carolians (who had retired to that Island)  
from Charlestown, but on arrival off the Bar,  
not being permitted to land there, the Hornet  
conveyed them up to Savannah, in Georgia,  
where they were kindly received, and are now  
comfortably settled.
