

Yesterday morning Major Hartley, brother of Mr. David Hartley, set off for the Hague from Mr. Fox's office, with the ultimatum of the determination of the British Cabinet relative to the peace.

Yesterday (Thursday) Mr. David Hartley was at the levee at St. James's, and had a long conference with the King on the subject of his Commission to Paris, to sign the Treaty with the United States of America.

We are informed that apartments are ordered to be fitted up at St. James's for the reception of Princess Albertina of Mecklenburgh, her Majesty's Sister, who is soon expected on a visit to this Court.

The Russian Squadron from Cronstadt, is certainly expected in the Downs the beginning of next month, as they are to leave the North before the frost sets in.

Le Marfellois, Le Diligente, and Le St. Michael French 74 ships of war, have been all recently fitted for service. Le Tempete bomb ship blew up last Sunday evening.

Extract of a letter from Plymouth, Sept. 9.

"Sailed for Portsmouth the Assistance, 50 guns; she is to go on foreign service.

"Since my last, the 50th regiment of foot embarked for Ireland."

By the fourteenth resolution of the Ulster Volunteer Delegates at Dungannon the 8th inst. we find that the convention committee are instructed to prepare, and carry with them to the Grand convention, which is proposed for the 10th of November next, at the Royal Exchange in this City, an account as near as possible of the number of Protestant and Roman Catholic inhabitants in the province of Ulster, and a comparison of their comparative property, with an intimation, no doubt, of giving our brethren of the Romish persuasion, such a participation of the privileges enjoyed by Irish subjects of other denominations, as are consistent with our constitution and the established religion of the realm. It may not therefore be amiss to present at this time to public view, the number of Protestants and Roman Catholics in the four provinces of Ireland, as estimated by a curious observer in 1776:
