

It is asserted, that the Sublime Porte is exerting still greater efforts to put herself in a good state of defence than ever to act offensively, since she is informed that Russia, finding herself in possession of the Crimea, has in view the joining the Black Sea to the Caspian Sea, by means of the Don or Tanais, the Wolga, and a canal, which is to join the last mentioned river with the Neva.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, Sept. 27.
 "From the 7th to the 12th inst. 17 vessels laden with salt-fish from England and Ireland, have entered the port of Dunkirk. In the port of Marseilles 17 others have entered between August 26, and September 13. The Commerce of Bourdeaux is at a stand, the Merchants waiting till the vast quantities of goods sent to the Antilles are disposed of."

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant will not deliver his speech to both Houses of Parliament, on Tuesday next—when he goes to the House of Lords, his business on that day will be only to open the session, and order the Commons to proceed to the Election of a Speaker: On the next day he will come again to the House, when the Commons will present their new Elected Speaker, when, if approved, his Excellency will pronounce the speech. The Lord Lieutenant will then return to the Castle, and the Houses proceed to the voting of the Address to his Majesty and the Lord Lieutenant, which on the next day, Thursday, will be delivered in the usual form, after which, an adjournment for eight days, it is thought, will, as heretofore take place, in order to prepare the public accounts for the inspection of the grand Committees.

It is positively asserted, that the Right Honourable Mr. Pery will be immediately called up to the House of Peers, as a Gentleman of the most distinguished abilities; and as a constitutional lawyer, his pretensions to hereditary honours is acknowledged; but what constitutional virtues, abilities or service, can any one of the late WORKLESS batch have a claim to?
