There have been frequent boards of ord-
nance held this week, for the distribution of the
artillery going to Ireland.

A letter from Gibraltar says, that General
Elliot has nearly compleated the works round
the fortifications, which are now judged im-
pregnable. The men who have been at work
on the fortifications will be employed in build-
ing houses in the room of those knocked down
during the siege, as a number of families are
arrived, and there are not houses sufficient for
them to reside in.

Some private letters from Paris, received
yesterday, speak of the situation of the French
merchants in a very serious light. France
was hardly ever in a more alarming bankrupt
situation. Could the Spaniards, by any extra-
ordinary stroke of policy, be detached, and
the interest of the house of Bourbon now se-
parated (for which there was never a more
favourable opportunity) the French monarchy
would receive a blow from which it would
hardly ever be able to recover. It happens
unluckily that the countries to whose interest
France's destruction would be particularly
advantageous, are in no condition at this time
even to attempt such a measure. The French
do not complain openly, but the American con-
nections have ruined all their trading people;
and unless the Spaniards open their treasury to
relieve their distresses, the government and na-
tion must of necessity become bankrupt; for
the Americans are in no condition to pay their
debts, and the Dutch, hitherto looked upon as
a rich and thriving nation, after only a two
years war, find themselves in a situation more
critical than any that has occurred for a century
and a half. The French paper credit is
so bad in the North, that their agents meet
with the greatest difficulties in procuring stores
for their dock-yard; this last is a most awk-
ward circumstance for Great-Britain, whose navy
is still rising to a greater height of power and
respectability, while that of her rival will of
necessity dwindle.

A letter from Lisbon, by a ship arrived in the

river, says, that their fears about the earth-
quake are now subsided, as they have felt no
more of it since two or three small shocks some
time ago, which did no material damage; but
the late stormy weather has done a great deal,
not only on shore but at sea; for along the
coasts have been seen pieces of wrecks, and
some dead bodies, floating upon the surface of
the water.

Thursday morning were found in the trunk
of a hollow tree, by a man belonging to a cow-
keeper at Kingsland Road, in one of his ma-
ster's fields, the bodies, or rather the remains,
of a woman and male-child, with their bowels
out, and the skin and flesh entirely dry. By
all appearance, it is evident they must have re-
mained there a considerable time.

In spite of all the attention of the Emperor
of the port of Trieste, trade is in so low a state
here, that many merchants and mechanics have
left the place within the last six months,
and others are preparing to follow.

The inhabitants of the devoted city of Ge-
neva, live in the most unfeeling and uncomfort-
able state imaginable; in conversation even they
are obliged to be strictly on their guard, least
they should be given to their military Go-
vernors, who are ready to interpret every thing
at passes into an intention of revolution and
treason.

DUBLIN, Oct. 25.
Yesterday at the Commission of Oyer and
Termination, Henry Nugent, and Thomas Nu-
gents, were tried, and severally acquitted on a
charge of counterfeiting and vending stamps, in
order to defraud his Majesty's revenue.
It is confidently reported, that Mr. Flood is
appointed Provost of Trinity College, Cam-
bridge, a place of very considerable emolument
in the gift of the Crown. If this intelligence
should prove authentic, all that can be
said is, that Ireland is a quick soil for patri-
otism—it soon vegetates—arrives to speedy
maturity, and at last hastily perishes.
