Sir Henry Hartstonge, requested it might be deferred till Tuesday next.
Mr. Dennis Browne moved, that the proper officer do lay before the House an account of the number of troops that were in the kingdom on the first day of this month—also an account of the names and number of staff-officers in the kingdom, with the amount of their pay.

Mr. Foster moved, that the House do resolve itself into a Committee, on Monday next, for taking into consideration the supply to be granted to his Majesty.
Sir Henry Cavendish requested it to be delayed till Tuesday next. Ordered for Monday.
The House adjourned to Monday.

The House of Lords met yesterday, and adjourned till Friday next.
It would seem as if G—nt were not without their apprehensions, the garrison of Dublin being augmented to six regiments. The 21st Regiment lately arrived, are expected to march in this day!

The Rotunda is appointed for the meeting of the Grand National Convention to sit in previous to which they are to assemble at the Royal Exchange, on Monday next. At ten o'clock in the morning the several corps of Cavalry, &c. will line the streets.

Yesterday afternoon about three o'clock, a melancholy accident happened at the House of Mr. Neil, schoolmaster, in Goat-alley, the roof of the building appropriated to his pupils having fallen in, by which several of the children were very dangerously wounded, and three or four, we learn so dreadfully, as to preclude every hope of recovery. Some alterations intended for the enlargement of the school, in which the workmen, it is said, were negligent in propping the superincumbent weight, occasioned the above terrible disaster.

Mr. Neil himself received some dangerous contusions, and overwhelmed with an agonizing sense of the misfortune which had befallen his charge, was for some hours deprived of his reason.

Letters from L'Orient advise, that the French East-India Company were resuming their equipments with new vigour, and that orders were preparing to be sent to Ireland for beef. A circumstance that must be very pleasing to such of our readers as are any wise concerned in the grazing business and provision.

On Saturday the 1st of November, died suddenly, Miss Clancy, daughter of the late William Clancy, formerly one of the most considerable merchants in this city.—The circumstances related of this lady's death are very extraordinary: On the morning of her decease she told the family she had passed a disagreeable night, having dreamed that her eldest sister (a widow lady who resides in the neighbourhood) was dead, and that her ghost appeared to her, warning her of an immediate dissolution; at first she refused to credit the ghost, but she persevered in asserting, she had but a few hours to live. This dream affected her, but she was rallied out of her fears. She some morning visits and then retired to her chamber. At dinner she was very cheerful, suddenly dropping her knife and fork, com-

Upon this solemn occasion, all classes of men of every persuasion, seemed to vie with each other in zeal for the general cause.
The chapel of the Roman Catholics was open for the reception of the Delegates, and the Presbyter and Quaker were ready to accommodate them:—But the magnitude of that noble and beautiful structure the new Cathedral, granted by the liberality of the clergy, was best adapted to the numbers and occasion of the meeting.

The grandeur of the scene upon the Delegates entering the church, cannot be described.—The Ladies ranged in the galleries—the Volunteers under arms filling the aisles—and the concourse of people which this important business brought together, formed a coup d'oeil not to be conceived by those who did not behold it.
