HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Monday, Nov. 10
Sir Henry Hartington presented a petition from the High Sheriff, Grand Jury and Freeholders of the County of Limerick.—Referred to a Committee.

He then moved that a supply of 1,400,000l. be granted to his Majesty for fifteen months; that from the 25th December, 1783, to the 25th March, 1785.

Sir Edward Newenham opposed the length of the term, and moved that the words six months be inserted, instead of fifteen.
Mr. Hartley said, he was instructed by his constituents to oppose any Bill of Supply for a longer term than six months; and therefore seconded the motion for amendments.
