To say the truth, as a citizen of the world, the deep ought not to have any mistress; or, to change the allegory, the deep should not be a monopoly, or reserved spouse, but a common mistress to all maritime nations.

Irish Parliamentary Debates, HOUSE OF LORDS.

Friday, November 14.

Lord Morris moved, "That the proper Officer do lay before this House, a patent by which the office of Clerk or Master of the Rolls was granted to the Right Hon. Richard Rigby, in his late Majesty's reign, and also a list of all the patents of the offices of Clerk or Master of the Rolls, from the commencement of the reign of Henry the Seventh to the present time inclusive, distinguishing which have been had for life, and which during pleasure."—Ordered accordingly.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Saturday, November 15.

The House, according to order, resolved into a Committee of ways and means, in which the Attorney General continued his official motions, for the continuance of several entries from the 25th of December next, to the 5th of March, 1785, without any material alteration, which being agreed to, the House adjourned.

Mr. Foster reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and desired leave to sit again.—Ordered to sit on Monday.

Mr. Corry made several severe observations on the conduct of some Gentlemen who on the preceding night had, by insinuating on the order of the day in a most indecent, not to say unparliamentary manner, prevented him from making his intended motion for an address to His Majesty, by obstructing the order of the day, made of proceeding which, if drawn into account, might always be practised when any motion was intended that was not agreeable to Gentlemen on the other side of the House; which reason he found himself under the necessity of protesting against it, as a breach of privilege of speech which the Speaker denied from the Throne at the beginning of session. He then gave notice, that he would on Wednesday next, move an address to His Majesty on the Prince of Wales having turned his one and twentieth year.

Mr. Parnell presented a petition from persons subscribing, concerned in the carrying of woollen yarn in the Queen's county, setting forth that there has been a great deficiency in the exportation of woollen yarn from England; praying an encouragement on port.—Ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. PHILIP ROCHE, JOHN, requests, that the COMMITTEE for Importing Corn, may attend at the Council Chamber, on Saturday next, respecting the tax on private persons who should brew beer or ale, and requested so wanton and unproductive a tax.

The Attorney General said, the principal objection that was adduced, of the excise officers having entry into private houses, would be removed by a composition, or collected by the money collectors, as the duty on carriage.

Last week a dispute happened between Mr. John Acheson, of Annalong, near Newry, and one Williams, a revenue Officer, which rose to such a height, that Mr. Acheson struck the latter with a stick, who, retreating a few paces, hit him with a stone so violently on the head, that he knocked him down, and fractured his skull; in consequence of which he expired two days after. Williams has since been taken and lodged in Downpatrick Gaol. The untimely death of Mr. Acheson is much lamented, as he was a man universally esteemed.

On the 17th of August last died, on his passage to Philadelphia, Captain Charles Forrest, in consequence of a wound he received on the 24th, from Francis Hardgrove, one of the passengers, whose riotous and unruly conduct had occasioned so much disturbance on board, that after many remonstrances, the Captain was under the necessity of ordering him into confinement; but his violent and desperate behaviour having prevented the Captain's orders from being executed, he himself went to see them obeyed, on which the fellow unexpectedly rushed upon him, in the dark, and with a bayonet gave him the fatal wound of which he died.
