Sir JOHN BLAQUIER said, that though he had voted against the Address for increasing the Lord Lieutenant's salary, as he thought the present Stipend sufficient; he was not of the same opinion in regard to that of the first Secretary, whose salary and emoluments of course were by no means adequate to the Toils and Expenses incidental thereto. That for his part he had been more than rewarded by his salary. That as to the present Secretary, he had scarce an acquaintance with him, nor did he expect any favour from him, and therefore whether the Motion met his approbation or not would move.

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, that he will please to transmit to his Majesty the Names of the Principal Secretaries, and the Emoluments of the Principal Secretary are inadequate to his trouble and expence, and praying his salary may be increased 2,500l. additional."

Capt. T. BURGH seconded the Motion.

Sir EDWARD NEWENHAM opposed it, and in an argument against it, observed, that if the salary and emolument of Secretaries were adequate, they were all well rewarded afterwards by appointments to lucrative Sinecures, which they spend out of the kingdom.

The ATTORNEY GENERAL said, these Sinecures Placed given as rewards to Secretaries, with him a strong argument for increasing their salary, that being fully paid while in office, there might be no excuse for those indentations afterwards; for there was at present no Officer of the Rolls, a Chancellor of the Exchequer, a Vice Treasurer, and other great offices enjoyed by men who had been Secretaries, and spent every Shilling out of the kingdom.

Sir CURVE pronounced an Eulogium on the present Secretary, and said he hoped we should in future have Men of Talents and not Blocks.

ALEXANDER MONTGOMERY opposed the Motion.

Sir PARSONS followed him, and observed, that the Lord Lieutenant and his Secretary were like the Bishops of old, who used to cry for promotion, Nolo EPISCOPI.

Sir KEARNEY was also against it.

Sir WESLEY POLE moved the increase should be only 1500l.

Sir JOHN BLAQUIER offered to compromise the Matter, by reducing the sum in his Motion to 2000l.

and such an election, he hoped, would never be seen again. The number of Freeholders who voted were about 1000, and a number of those were 400 Freeholders, sent by a great Peer to a Right Hon. Commoner, from the distance of 70 miles, and who had never seen their freeholds, perhaps, but once, that they had perched on it, and then flew away again. About a hundred of such miscreants voted at that election.

Mr. George Ogle declared he was unconnected with boroughs and owners of boroughs, but it was his duty to obey the instructions of his constituents, and he would obey their instructions in that or any other assembly, and they had advised him to take care that compensation should be made to those whose property would be affected by the reform. He read the instructions, and moved an amendment in these words:—"Having due regard to the interest of such individuals as may be injured thereby"

Mr. HATTAN said, he would oppose compensation to any man who had usurped an unconstitutional right.

Major MOORE. Though he certainly denied the right of compensation being made for the long withholding the rights of franchise, yet he was very well satisfied it should be referred to Parliament.

Mr. OGLE then withdrew his amendment referring himself however, to make his objections in another place.

Mr. HACKET removed his objection, by convincing him that they fully came within the description of voters, and were not excluded for non-residence.

The first resolution was then put and agreed to nem. con!

The second resolution was then read, it went to this point, that every person, to entitle him to vote, must reside six months out of the twelve, previous to the test of the writ.

Mr. O'HARA was of opinion, that the registering the freehold twelve months before the election would answer every purpose.

The third resolution was then read, which required that every freehold should be registered 12 months previous to an election. Passed unanimously.

The fourth Resolution passed.

The fifth Resolution was then read, which alluded to decayed Boroughs—it was thought by several gentlemen from the lateness of the hour it would be proper to postpone the consideration of this Resolution to Monday next.—but if agreed on, to proceed.

Lord FARNHAM was of opinion, that the corporations should be thrown open and the number of freemen enlarged. The Resolution then passed.

Monday, Nov. 24.

About 11 o'clock, Gen. Earl CHATELAIN took the chair, when the Convention resolved itself into a General Committee.

Rt. Hon. WILLIAM BROWNLOW in the chair.

The sixth Resolution was then put and passed unanimously.

During the consideration of this Resolution, as if acted by a warmth of patriotic energy, and that disinterested magnanimity which exalts the character of Irishmen at this glorious period of liberty and liberality—Lord CHARLEMONT, Lord ALDBOROUGH, the Hon. Hugh MASSY, Mr. BERNARD, Col. FLOOD, and Sir VESLEY COLCLOUGH, came forward and voluntarily made an offer to give up their share of any right they might have in any borough, for the great purpose of extending the freedom of election, and thereby giving a great foundation to the Parliamentary Reform.

Seventh Resolution was then read; passed.

Eighth Resolution was then read, and after a very desultory conversation, it passed in the affirmative.

Mr. LYSTER then moved, that the thanks of the Volunteers of Ireland, represented by their Delegates in the National Convention, be given to those Noblemen and Gentlemen, Earl of CHARLEMONT, Lord ALDBOROUGH, Hon. Hugh MASSY, Mr. BERNARD, Colonel HENRY FLOOD and Sir VESLEY COLCLOUGH, Bart. for their generous sacrifice of private property at the altar of public virtue. Unanimously agreed to.

Earl of BRISTOL moved, that this Resolution be published twice in all the Dublin papers.
