

Mr. COXEN said, he was surprised to see a man, rising up with the violence of a Maniac, to tell us that this Bill ought not to be received while the convention was sitting; but that convention nor the Volunteers in general, you will not find your Enemies, they have no other enemies but the enemies of their country. "That a reform has long been necessary the History of this Country," said he, "evinces, why were you so long Slaves, but because the Parliament wanted a Reform? Why just after your hearts throbb'd at your new acquired constitution, at the Glory of Ireland, did you sink that Glory in the Slaver of an adulatory Address, but that you wanted a reform. The man who so violently opposes this day a reform was once the patron of such a measure, but Peace, we shall soon behold him seated where no storm shall fret him."

"What have we been doing since we met? we have been talking of retrenchment and running a course of the most profligate profusion, while our miserable fellow-creatures are roaming the streets for bread, [here he gave a most pathetic picture of the distress of the poor.] But some of our new statesmen would guide the Government if it was as easy to be managed as a carriage with four horses by an expert Charioteer. Your argument, that if the measure comes from Volunteers you will reject it, is a Denunciation that you consider them as enemies: I caution the House not to make a public declaration of war!"

Mr. CONOLLY. As this Bill comes from a body of armed men, I will heartily join in scotting it from the House.

The question was then put on receiving the Bill.

Right Hon. THOMAS CONOLLY then moved "that an humble Address be presented to his Majesty, expressive of the blessings they enjoy under his Majesty's auspicious government; and to assure his Majesty, that they are determined to support, inviolate, the present constitution, with their lives and fortunes;" the question being put to agree with this Address, it was carried without a division as the patriots had previously left the House.

And at half past three o'Clock, Sunday morning, the House adjourned to Monday.

Saturday, Nov. 29.

The Chair being taken by Earl Charlemont, as usual, the Secretary read the 17th Resolution, containing the Oath; when Mr. Callen

James Dawson, and John Talbot Ashenhurst, Esq; and likewise to the different Dublin Corps of Volunteers that mounted guard each day. And then they adjourned 11 1/2 P.M.
